C. H. Best. Dr. Hoar was enabled to take a concentrated course in Nutrition Research Methods at Toronto University. He returned to U.N.B. in August, 1943. Our own University provided much of the pasic equipment required, and N.R. C. contributed \$2,000, to pay for technical assistance and special supplies. Miss Marjorie Barberie '41 was engaged as Research Assistant in August 1943, and has already completed the original project--an Investigation of the riboflavin content of Atlantic Coast Fish. Many hitherto unknown facts about B2 in fish have been discovbe published shortly in the Canadian Journal of Research.


