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





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A few years ago Herr Bruno Pöhlheim, the distinguished

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the world-renowned Cyclorama of Jerusalem on the day of the Cru-
cifixion, which has been open to the public in the city of Munich

for the past four years. Now, while the originators of the Cyclo-
rama in Montreal did not strictly copy the great work of Herr Brune
Piglhein, they did develop the central thought of his creation, and
profit by the results of his years of study and investigation. The
best artists obtainable were employed. The canvas, four hundred feet
long by fifty feet high, was painted in a building specially erected for
it. A railroad track was laid at its base and cars put upon it, from
which the artists did their work. They used three and a half
tons of paints and oils. The original painting cost nearly \$100,000.

The Cyclorama presents the Holy City as it was rebuilt and beautified by Herod the Great. The temples and palaces, walls and towers, gates and gardens, show Roman and Grecian culture.

The country around Jerusalem was taken from photographs. The Mountains of Moab, east of the Dead Sea, from which Moses viewed the Promised Land Mizpah, north of the city; Mount Zion, Mount Moriah, the Mount of Olives, the Hill of Evil Council, with all the other hills, valleys and plains, are correct in every particular. Then there are the surging multitudes

in their gorgeous robes, the donkeys and camels in their curiously constructed trappings, the caravan on its march or in camp, the street-side merchant and water vendor, the leper and beggar, all of which afford a most perfect view of Oriental life. And to crown the whole scene with a living portraiture of that transcendent event on Golgotha, when the sun withdraws his light, and the reeling earth and opening graves proclaim the Son of God, creates at once the most sublime and touching spectacle ever witnessed by man.


