



PREFACE TO FOURTH, EDITION.

The difficulty of ascertaining the law from the network of original and amended statutes, both of the Dominion Parliament and the Ontario Legislature; and from the various Orders in Council suspended and re-enacted, is the reason for the issue of this Digest.

Since the last edition the laws relating to both game and fishing have been consolidated, and again amended, while many new Orders in Council have been passed. The numerous changes in the laws have necessitated this new edition, which is considerably increased in size and in the number of headings and cross references.

The Digest is a synopsis of the whole law, so far as it relates to the various animals, birds and fish protected by it, and is intended both as a handbook for the guidance and protection of sportsmen, and also as a book of reference for those whose duty or privilege it is to enforce the laws for the protection of the game of this Province.

ANGLING-See FISHING.

ANIMAL—Persons not resident in Ontario may not hunt or kill any animal without a license. (G.P.A. s. 4, s-s. 1).

See GAME ANIMAL-LICENSE.

BAIT-Small trout may be used by fishermen for backg traps. (R.S C. c. 95, s. 9, s-s. 4.)

BAITED LINES-See TRAPS.

BASS—Open season June 16 to April 14 in following year, both days inclusive. (D.O.C. 1895, p. lxxxvi.)

May not be sold or had in possession from April 15 to June 15, both days inclusive. (ib.)

Under 10 inches must be returned to the water uninjured. (O.O C).

Under 10 inches may not be sold. (O.O C.; S.O. 189), c. 34, s. 17.)

Not more than 12 may be caught in one day, by any person, of black or Oswego (or large monthed) bass, or 20 green bass. (O.O.C.)

- Black or Oswego bass may not be caught for purpose of sale, from Dec. 1 to April 15, both days inclusive, without a license. (ib.)
- May not be taken with spears, grapnel hooks, negog or nishagans. (R.S.C. c. 95, s. 14, s. s. 8.)

- BEAVERS-Open season Nov. 1 to April 1 in following year, both days inclusive. (G.P.A., s. 9, s-s. 1, (a)) But see below.
 May not be killed before Nov. 1, 1900. (ib.)
 - May not be received for transportation (or any skin or portion thereof), except from Nov. 1 to Nov. 22, unless accompanied by an affidavit of the shipper that it was legally hunted. (S.O. 1899, c. 33, s. 7.).

- **BIRD** Persons not resident in Ontario may not hunt or kill any bird without a license. (G.P.A., s. 4, 's-s. 1.)
 - Native wild birds may not be killed. injured, or caught, except hawks, crows, blackbirds and English sparrows, and game birds in their open season, but robins attacking fruit may be killed. (R.S.O., c. 289, s. 2.)
 - No bird may be taken, exposed for sale, or had in possession, except hawks, crows, blackbirds, English sparrows, cage and domesticated birds, and game birds in their open season. (ib. s. 3.)
 - Nests, young or eggs of any bird except hawks, crows, blackbirds and English sparrows, may not be taken or destroyed at any time. (ib. s 4.)
 - **Ornithologists and biologists** may obtain from the Chief Game Warden a permit to take, for the purpose of study, birds and eggs other than those above mentioned. (ib. s. 6.)

BREEDING—Game put or bred on lands for breeding purposes may not be hunted without consent of owner of land. (G.P.A., s. 17.)

BROOK TROUT-See SPECKLED TROUT. CARIBOU-See DEER.

CHIEF FISH AND GAME WARDEN-Edwin Tinsley, Parliament Buildings; Toronto. (O.O.C., May 2, 1895.)
 Appointed by Lieut.-Governor in Council. (G.P.A., s. 22.)
 May appoint Deputy Wardens on authorization of Fish and Game Commissioners. (ib.)

Is a Justice of the Peace for the purposes of "The Ontario-Game Protection Act." (ibas-s. 2.) See WARDENS

CROWS may be killed at any time. (R.S.O., c. 289, s. 2)

CRUSTING -See DEER.

CUSTOMS - See NON-RESIDENT.

- DEER-Open season Nov. 1 to Nov. 15, both days inclusive, but no moose, elk, reindeer, or caribou may be hunted before Nov. 1, 1900. (G.P.A., s. 6, s-s. 1.) But persons who put or breed deer on their own lands (and the licensees of such persons) may hunt such deer between. Oct. 1 and Nov. 15, (S.O. 1899, c. 33, s. 4.)
 - **Only 2 deer may be taken** in one season by one person. But this does not apply to deer which are private property. (G.P.A. s. 6, s-s. 3).
 - License required to hunt-See LICENSE:
 - Hunting by crusting, or when deer are yarding, prohibited. (G. P. A.;, s. 6, s-s. 4.)
 - In Indian Peninsula deer may not be taken in the water, or immediately after leaving it. (ib. s. 5; S.O. 1899, c. 33. s. 3.)
 - **Transportation prohibited** of any wild deer, or its head, skin or venison, unless a shipping coupon (see **LICENSE**) is attached thereto. (S.O., 1899, c 33, s. 7.) But a common carrier may transport any mosse, caribou or deer, or its head, skin or venison, if the same is accompanied by a declaration that it was killed in some other Province during the open season in such Province. (G.P.A., s. 8.)
 - No person may receive for transportation any wild deer, skin or portion thereof, except from Nov. 1 to Nov. 22, unless, in addition to the coupon above mentioned, such deer, etc., is accompanied by an affidavit of the shipper that it was legally hunted. (ib. s. 7.)

May not be taken or killed for exportation or be exported from Ontario, but a non-resident who holds a license may export the two deer allowed to be killed by him. (ib., s. 14, s.ss. 2. 3.) But see below.

Export prohibited of a carcass or part thereof from Canada, except as below. (S.C. 1897, c. 16, s. 8.)

May be exported from Canada by persons not domiciled in Canada, when shot for sport and not for gain or hire, and under Provincial authority, subject to the following conditions:

1. The deer may be exported only at the customs ports of Halifax, Yarmouth, Macadam Junction, Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Kingston, Niagara Falls, Fort Erie, Windsor, Sault Ste. Marie, Port Arthur and such other ports as may be designated by the Minister of Customs.

2 Exportation in the carcass or parts thereof (except as to cured heads and hides) is permitted only up to the fifteenth day after the open season has expired.

3. No person shall, in one year, export more than the whole or parts of 2 deer, nor shall exportation be made by the same person, more than twice in a calendar year.

4. If killed confirary to Provincial law they may not be exported.

5. A permit of the Collector of Customs must accompany the shipment.

6. An export entry may be made on taking a declaration before a Collector of Customs that the above requirements have been complied with, and on production of the Provincial license or rermit. (DlO.C., Aug. 19, 1899)

Deer bred on a person's own land, or on land held by an Association of which he is a member, may be exported from Canada by making affidavit of above facts to local Collector of Customs. (D.O.C., Aug. 17, 1899.) Deer which are private property and killed by the owner, of with his consent, and upon his own lands, may be exported from Ontario. (G.P.A. s. 14 (3).) See also above.

DISGUISE — Persons masked or disguised may not have fire arms in their possession when near any shooting ground. (G.P.A. 5, 27.)

DOGS-Hounds or dogs accustomed to pursue deer shall not be allowed at large where deer are found, during close season for deer. (G.P.A., s. '6, s. 6, 2.) Hounds or dogs running deer during the close season may be killed on sight by any person, who shall not be liable to damages for so doing. (ib.)

DORÉ-See PICKEREL.

DUCKS-Open season Sept. 1 to Dec. 15, both days inclusive. (G.P.A., s. 7, s-s. 1, [d].)

Hunting from sail boats and steam yachts prohibited. (ib., s. 13.)

Killing by batteries, swivel guns and sunken punts prohibited.

See EXPORTATION-LICENSE-SALE-TIME-TRAPS. DUTY-See NON-RESIDENT.

DYNAMITE-See EXPLOSIVES.

EELS—May be caught by weirs and mill dams, but not so as to deprive other weirs of a share in the run of eels. (R.S.C., c. 95, s. 14, s-s. 4.)

May not be taken by spear or torch during October and November in any waters frequented by salmon or trout. (D.O.C. 1895, p. lix.)

EGGS Of game birds may not be taken, destroyed or had in ... possession at any time. (G.P.A., s. 8, s. s. 2.) But see below.

Of any bird except hawks, crows, blackbirds and English sparrows may not be taken, destroyed or had in possession. (R.S.O., c. 289, s. 4.)

Ornithologists and biologists may obtain from Chief Game Warden a permit to collect eggs at any time for the bona fide purpose of study. (ib. s. 6.)

ESSEX COUNTY-Deer may not be taken at any time. (0 O.C., Oct. 23, 1896.)

EVIDENCE—An accused person and the person laying the information are competent and compellable to give evidence at any hearing or trial under the Game Protection Act or the Ontario Fisheries Act. (G.P.A., s. 33; O.F.A., s. 56.)

EXPLOSIVES-Use of any explosive material to kill fish is prohibited. (C.O.C., p. 655; S.C. 1894, c. 51, s. 1.)

EXPORTATION—No game bird or animal may be hunted or killed for exportation or be exported from Ontario (G.P.A., s. 14, s-s. 3). But see **DEER**. As to Ducks, see **LICENSE**.

Wild turkeys, quail, partridge, prairie fowl and woodcock may not be exported from Canada. (S.C. 1897, c. 16, s. 8.) See DEER.

FINES-See PENALTIES.

FIRE ARMS—Killing of fish by, prohibited. (D.O.C. 1892, p. xxvi.)

FIRE WARDENS-See DEPUTY WARDENS.

FISH - May not be taken by nets, traps, night lines, etc., in Provincial waters, without a license from the Commissioner. But this does not apply to mullet, suckers or pike while they are running, where taken under a permit granted by the Commissioner. (O.F.A., s. 30.)

May not be killed by explosive materials. (C O.C., p. 655; S.C. 1894, c. 51, s. 1.)

May not be caught to use as manure. (S.C. 1894, c. 51, s. 5.) Young of fish may not be caught, sold or had in possession. (R.S.C., c. 95, s, 14, s-s. 9.) FI FI

If the "Guarantee" be approved by the Minister of Customs, Guarantee Certificates will be sent to the club to be presentedto Customs Officers (and returned to visiting members after inspection) as evidence of the deposit and approval of the Club Guarantee.

A special ticket of membership signed by the secretary of the club, and dated within one year from the time of its presentation to the Customs Officer, will be accepted by such officer as evidence that the person presenting the ticket is a visiting member of such club, resident outside of Canada.

Visiting members (non-resident in Canada) of any such club may bring with them such guns, fishing rods and sporting outfit as they require for their own use, and not for gain or hire, conditional on exportation within ninety days from the time of entrance, upon depositing their ticket of membership and furnishing to the Customs Officer at the Port of Entry in Canada a report (in duplicate) signed by him and containing a description of the articles comprised in his outfit, and giving the value thereof: but duty must be paid on ammunition and provisions brought in with such outfit. (For form of report see Schedule B, page 37.)

One copy of the report, stamped by the Customs Officer for identification, will be handed back to the party presenting it, so that a certificate as to the exportation of the articles may be endorsed thereon by a Customs Officer when they are not exported outwards and examined by a Customs Officer at the Port of Entry where they have been brought into Canada. SPEARING — Salmon, trout, maskinonge, winaniche, bass, pickerel, whitefish, herring and shad may not be taken by means of spears, grapnel hooks, negog or nishagans. (R.S.C., c. 95, s. 14 s-s, 8)

Minister may allow spearing in certain localities. (ib.) Spears, grapnel hooks, negog and nishagans prohibited without a lease, license or permit from Commissioner. (O.O.C.) See EELS-TRAPS.

SPECKLED TROUT-Open season May 2 to Sept. 14, both days inclusive. (D.O C. 1892, p. xxxvi.)

Note.—The Dominion and Ontario Departments of Fisheries do not recognize any distinction between Brook Trout, River Trout and Speckled Trout; therefore the season allowed for taking Speckled Trout is the season allowed for taking the fish commonly known as Brook Trout and River Trout.

TRAPS, nets, snares, gins, baited lines, etc., may not be set at any time to take any kind of deer, sable, black and grey squirrels, hares, grouse, pheasants, prairie fowl, partridge, woodcock, snipe, rail, plover, quail, wild turkeys, swans, geese or ducks; and such traps, etc., if found set, may be destroyed by any person without his incurring any liability therefor. (G.P.A. s. 12.) Nets, traps, snares, eages, etc., may not be set for any bird except hawks, crows, black birds and English sparrows, and such nets, etc., if found set, may be destroyed by any person without his incurring any liability therefor. (R.S.O. c. 289, 5.2.)

TRESPASS—No person may enter growing grain, or permit his dogs to, without permission of owner or occupant, or hunt or shoot upon another's land after being notified not to do so. (G.P.A. s. 19)

Owner or occupant may give notice to trespassers verbally or in writing, or by maintaining in at least two conspicuous places in every 40 acres, upon or near the borders of the premises to be protected, two sign boards, each at least 1 ft. square, containing the notice, "Hunting or shooting on these lands forbidden under Ontario Game Laws." (S.O. 1899, c. 33; s. 9.)

Fishing in leased premises prohibited. (O.F.A. s. 23) Fishing in private streams, etc., prohibited. (ib. s. 24.)

TROUT—Small trout for baiting traps may be used by fishermen. (R.S.C., c. 95, s. 9, s. 4.)






