But the Almanac is arranged to serve without essential variation for most parts of the Dominion.

ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1891.

During this year there will be four eclipses, two of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

I. May 23rd, there will be a total Eclipse of the Moon, partly visible as a partial Eclipse.

First contact with the Penumbra.....	10.42 mo. of May 23rd
Beginning of total phase.....	0.55 ev. "
Middle of the Eclipse.....	1.35 ev. "
Last contact with the Penumbra.....	4.27 ev. "

II. June 6th, there will be an Annular Eclipse of the Sun, visible as a partial Eclipse.

Begins on the earth generally, 2h. 3m. 4 sec. mean time at Greenwich, in longitude 132° 33' west of Greenwich, and in latitude 25° 15' North.

Central Eclipse, at noon, June 6th, in longitude 110° 6' east of Greenwich, and in latitude 71° 11' N.

III. November 15th, there will be a total Eclipse of the Moon visible.

First contact with the Penumbra.....	4h. 52m. ev.
Middle of the Eclipse.....	7h. 24m. ev.
Last contact with the Penumbra.....	11h. 07m. ev.

IV. Nov. 30th-Dec. 1st, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Sun, invisible here.

Begins on the earth generally, November 30th, 21h. 44m. mean time at Greenwich, in longitude 75° 26' west of Greenwich, and in latitude 35° 46' S.

Ends on the earth generally, December 1st, 1h. 18m., in longitude 10° 47' east of Greenwich, and in latitude 59° 17' S.

NOTE.—There will occur a TRANSIT OF MERCURY across the Sun's disc, May 9th, 1891, partly visible. External contact at ingress, 11h. 53m. 44s. mean time at Greenwich. External contact at egress, 16h. 50m. 25s. mean time at Greenwich

MARCH.—There are many curious notions entertained by some farmers about the best methods to adopt, with a view to aid the hens in producing egg shells. Soft shells are not desirable. The *Farm and Fireside* says in substance, that it is not proven that oyster shells or lime in any form produces egg shells, as there are thousands of hens that are not in any way provided with these. Carbonate of lime is insoluble, and the lime for the egg shells must come from that which can be digested and conducted to the eggs through the blood. Nearly all kinds of food contain lime in a soluble form by combination with vegetable acids, as well as in the form of inorganic salts, that are soluble. Therefore the process of covering the eggs with shells goes on without the aid of substances which are insoluble. Hard limestone water contains lime, and the hens can, by drinking it, secure more lime in a convenient form than from oyster shells. The soft shell is often due to over-fatness in the hen.

5th MAY.—In March we referred to the formation of egg shell, this month we offer a few suggestions on feeding fowls. It matters not whether we keep fowl stock for marketing, for breeding, or for fancy sales, furnishing cooked food for poultry is by far the better system in feeding any number of fowls. It is more economical than feeding wholly upon raw grains, and serves to keep the fowls in better condition. A portion of their daily food boiled or steamed assists in promoting the steady growth of fowls. Variety of feeding is also recommended; we mean both raw and cooked-meat, vegetables, scraps, green food, corn, oats, rice, barley, wheat, pounded bones, etc. Either for laying fowls, for breeders, or for growing stock, the varied feeding plan is always more beneficial. Considering the vastness of trade in fowls and eggs, it is well to be reminded of what pays best.

JUNE.—We like to give the best thoughts of the most experienced agriculturists on affairs of importance although reckoned common. On feeding cows, *Hoard's Dairyman* says: "I believe the cow herself to be a pretty good chemist, and that nature will prompt her to select her proper food if she has the opportunity. Therefore she should have as great a variety of food as possible. That she prefers a variety, take notice. If her pasture is all clover, except a little June grass or prairie grass in the fence corners, see how closely the fence corners are gnawed down while the clover grows up tall and rank. If in the winter she is fed on one kind of hay, no matter how good the quality, see how quickly she will leave it when offered some other kind—corn, fodder or even straw, and how greedily she will eat of the new kind of fodder, though its quality may not be of the best. Some fail in cows, especially in winter, by not varying the food.

JULY.—We have a word or two to say about the proper treatment of horses and colts. First, of horses. On good authority we remark that the stomach of a horse is small in proportion to the size of his frame, and therefore requires feeding often, and though three times a day is sufficient, four times a day is better. Horses should drink before they eat, because, owing to the conformation of the horse, water does not remain in the stomach, but passes through into a large intestine called the cæcum. If the horse be fed first, the passing through the stomach would be likely to carry with it particles of food and thus produce colic. Whatever a groom may say, let a horse drink just as much as he likes; if he be watered four times a day he will never take too much or very much. Horses are fed on dry food, and this with heavy work produces feverishness which a sufficiency of water prevents or tends to allay.

AUGUST.—And now with regard to colts. A colt of good parentage, both sire and dam, should be sound and able to stand and walk within fifteen minutes after it breathes. At the age of a week most farmers begin to work the dam and let the suckling follow around as best he can; and at the age of four months, the colt being then of sufficient age to wean, the dam has performed a good summer's work, worked perhaps as hard as her gelding mate with no colt. This method is radically wrong, causing heated blood, dangerous to both. The mare and colt during the first four months, at least, should be kept together in good pasture where there is plenty of good water and shade. Weaning is best at six months, rather than four. For the colt the most important time is its first winter; if it is starved or stinted, it never fully recovers; not only the size but the whole frame is injured, never to be regained.

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GENERAL POST OFFICE REGULATIONS

FIRST CLASS MATTER.

LETTERS.

Register all valuable letters.

In addressing letters add the name of the county in which the Post-Office addressed is situated; if to a city add street and number.

Letters for the United States should bear the name of the State as well as that of the Post-Office.

A letter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and must be forwarded according to its direction.

Letters containing gold or silver money, jewels or anything liable to Customs duties, cannot be forwarded to any country beyond the Dominion except to the United States.

Letters addressed to initials, or fictitious names, will not be delivered unless addressed in care of a resident or to some box in the Post-Office.

Letters bearing mutilated stamps, or stamps so soiled and defaced as to make it impossible for the sorting clerks to decide whether they have been used before or not, will be sent to the Postmaster General for his adjudication.

POSTAGE.

Letters addressed to places in Canada and United States,

3 cents per ounce or fraction thereof.

Great Britain and all European Countries,

5 cents per $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. or fraction thereof.

Letters addressed to places in the United States must be prepaid at least one full rate (3 cents), otherwise they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

Partly prepaid Letters addressed to places in Canada will be forwarded to destination, subject on delivery to double the amount of postage remaining unpaid, and letters on which no postage has been prepaid will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

Letters re-directed to places in Canada and the United States, *without being taken out of the Post Office*, are not liable to any additional postage.

REQUEST LETTERS.

Letters for places in Canada and the United States sent in Envelopes having printed thereon, on the address side, a REQUEST that the letters be returned to the sender if not delivered within a certain specified time, will be returned as requested if not delivered in the time stated.

LEGAL AND COMMERCIAL DOCUMENTS.

The Postage on Legal and Commercial Papers for the United States, Great Britain and all European countries is 5 cents for the first 10 oz., and 1 cent for every additional 2 oz. These Papers, when posted for delivery in Canada, must be prepaid at Letter or Parcel Post Rates—but deeds and Insurance Policies may be sent if prepaid 1 cent per 2 oz.

POST CARDS.

For Canada and the United States, one cent each. For Great Britain and all Postal Union Countries, two cents each. Reply Cards, for Canada only, two cents each. Nothing must be attached to a Post Card, nor must the Card be cut or defaced in any way.

SEPTEMBER.—The subject of wood ashes as a fertilizer is not a new theme. Every farmer ought to know something about it. One who is evidently well informed says, that 100 pounds of wood ashes contain 16 pounds of potash, worth 80 cents; $3\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of soda, worth 2 cents; 67 pounds of lime and magnesia, worth 8 cents; and 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of phosphoric acid, worth 26 cents. If we had to buy in the market in the cheapest form, the manurial materials contained in 100 pounds of ashes, the cost would be \$1.16. You cannot afford to throw away such valuable materials or sell them for a sixpence a bushel to the soap-boiler. Here is the value and there is the selling price. Draw your own conclusions. Even when the ashes have been leached to the last degree, till every soluble thing has been washed out, they still have value, for the phosphate and carbonate of lime and magnesia remain, and they are worth 34 cents per hundred pounds.

SECOND CLASS MATTER.

Newspapers and Periodicals published not less frequently than once a month, and posted from the office of publication for transmission to *regular subscribers* in Canada and the United States, are sent free of Postage; but copies addressed to Great Britain, *all specimen copies*, and all copies of publications published less frequently than once a month must be prepaid 1 cent for each pound or fraction of a pound.

THIRD CLASS MATTER.

Matter of this class must be so packed or put up as to be easily opened for examination, and there must be no correspondence enclosed.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

All Drop Newspapers and Periodicals (for delivery where posted) and transient Newspapers and Periodicals posted for transmission to places in Canada and the United States, must be prepaid 1 cent per 4 oz. or fraction of 4 oz.—weighing not more than 1 oz. each they may be posted singly if prepaid 4 cent each.

BOOKS, &c., AND MISCELLANEOUS MATTER.

The postage on Books, Pamphlets, Circulars, Occasional Publications, etc., addressed to Canada is 1 cent per 4 oz.—to the United States, Great Britain and all European countries, 1 cent per 2 oz. The Postage on Printers' Proof Sheets, Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings, Lithographs, Photographs, Sheet Music, etc., addressed to Canada, the United States, Great Britain, or any European Country is, 1 cent per 2 oz. School or College Examination Papers, distinctly marked as such. Municipal Assessment Rolls, Statute Labour Returns, and Municipal Returns in general may pass in Canada at the rate of one cent per two ounces. No Package must exceed 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. The limit of weight for Canada, the United States, and Great Britain is 5 lbs., for other Postal Union Countries 4 lbs.

Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbs, Roots and Scions, or Grafts, can only be sent to the United States as 5th Class Matter; when posted for delivery in Canada, the postage is 1 cent per 4 oz., and the limit of weight 5 lbs.

PATTERNS AND SAMPLES.

Actual Patterns and Samples of Merchandise, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, may be sent to any place in Canada for 1 cent per 4 oz. Goods sent in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, *not being actually Trade Patterns or Samples*, are not admissible as such. The limit of weight to the United States, United Kingdom, or any country in Europe, is *eight ounces*—postage, 2 cents for the first 4 oz., and 1 cent for every additional 2 oz.

FOURTH CLASS MATTER.

PARCELS.

Parcels should be plainly addressed, and there must be no correspondence enclosed.

Parcels for Canada must be prepaid 6 cents per 4 oz. They must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight nor 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth, and the sender's name should be written on the lower left hand corner.

Parcels not exceeding 5 lbs. in weight, nor 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth, may be sent to the countries marked "A" or "B" in the Foreign Postage Table, and to a number of other places not mentioned. For full particulars apply at Post Office, or see Canada Official Postal Guide. The postage on parcels for the United Kingdom or Newfoundland is 25 cents a pound or fraction of a pound. A Custom's Declaration of the contents and value of each parcel must be filled up at the Post Office by the sender. These parcels are forwarded by Canadian Contract Steamers only.

OCTOBER.—Concerning roads, good or bad, the difference to the farmer is very great. We have travelled over country roads a good deal, both in Ontario and Quebec, and have found many of them simply wretched. To the farmer good roads are a necessity and are worth more than they cost. We fear many people of this country do not fully realize the value of good roads, perhaps because they never saw a good one. According to the most careful estimation, it costs more to get the average bushel of grain to the railway station than from the station to the seaboard. Within recent years railroad transportation of farm products has been greatly cheapened, but transportation over country roads very little. It is high time to cheapen the latter by making the roads better. Producers pay the transportation charges, and they should be the ones most deeply and practically interested in making the roads better.

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FIFTH CLASS MATTER.

Comprises such articles of general merchandise as are not entitled to any lower rate of postage. Postage 1 cent per oz., or fraction of an ounce. Limit of weight, 5 lbs.; of size, two feet in length by one foot in width or depth. Matter claiming to be 5th Class *must be open to inspection*, and there must be no correspondence enclosed. Packages of 5th Class Matter may be sent to the United States for the same prepayment as is required within the Dominion, but the contents will be liable to Customs inspection and collection of duty in the United States. Sealed tins containing fish, lobster, vegetables, meats, etc., if put up in a solid manner and labelled in such a way as to fully indicate the nature of their contents, may be sent as 5th Class Matter within the Dominion; but no sealed matter can be forwarded to the United States under this head. Liquids, oil and fatty substances may be sent to places in Canada and the United States as 5th Class, if put up in accordance with the ruling referring to such articles in the Canada Postal Guide for 1890, page XIV.

REGISTRATION.

All classes of matter addressed to places in Canada the United States, Newfoundland, Great Britain or any Postal Union Country may be registered for a fee of 5 cents for each article in addition to the Postage, and *letters* may be registered to most of the countries not included in the Union.

Every article intended for registration *must be handed in at the wicket* and a receipt obtained therefor; *on no account must it be dropped into a letter box*. The registration fee should be paid by registration stamp.

The sender of a registered article addressed to any Postal Union Country may entitle himself to a certificate as to the disposal of said article by the Postmaster at the office addressed, on prepayment of an additional fee of 5 cents.

Registered articles cannot be forwarded unless the postage and registration fee are paid in full.

Registration stamps cannot be accepted in prepayment of postage.

POST BANDS AND STAMPED ENVELOPES.

One cent post bands for newspaper or book packet wrappers, and one and three cent stamp envelopes are issued by the Department, and may be had at the stamp vendors.

MATTER WHICH CANNOT BE FORWARDED BY POST.

Any explosive, dangerous or destructive substance, or anything likely to injure the mails or the person of any officer or servant of the Post Office.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

Deposits from \$1 upwards, on which 3½ per cent. interest is allowed, will be received for transmission to the Central Office of the Post Office Savings Bank. Pass Books, and every information, to be had on application.

MONEY ORDER OFFICE.

In sending money by mail, it is always best to transmit by Money Order, if possible. If sent by letter, it should always be registered.

Money Orders issued and paid from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

NOVEMBER.—Mr. Wm. Sardam, of Canaan Valley, Conn., grows enthusiastic when telling how he feeds apples to his domestic animals, and reckons his practice more profitable than selling for cider. He says: "I began with golden sweets and harvest apples, and then used the fall varieties as they ripened, and then put four hundred bushels into the cellar. I saved the Winter Sweets for a yearling colt, giving him a peck a day, and thus kept him in good condition. I have given half a bushel a day to each cow. The cows shrank in their milk as soon as the apples were stopped. I have worked in swedes, turnips, cabbages, mangolds and other vegetables, and noted the milk flow, and he adds: "I must say that apples are first rate milk food. But they must be ripe; green apples dry up a cow if she is fed on them regularly. I want to see all apples not saleable fed to cattle. Calves properly fed on fruit till April and then on wheat bran will turn out first class."
