On Board a British Cruiser, Wednesday, Nov. 20.—(6.45 p.m.)—(By the Associated Press).—Twenty German submarines, the first of the German fleet to surrender were taken over by the British thirty-six miles east of Harwich this morning. The transfer by Admiralty orders was made silently and without demonstrations. The German crews sullenly obeyed the orders that had been given them and to-night the U-boats lie moored under the British flag near a British submarine hase.

Buring the ceremony of surrender seaplanes flew low overhead, while American submarine chasers carried British crews to the undersea beats.

The scene that began about sunrise when the first submarine was sighted until late this evening when the last one was rounded up, might have easily been mistaken for fleet manoeuvres. The work was carried out with such precision that there were few signs of the momentous significance of it all. The crews of the British ships lined the rails, but the Germans seemed to be liftle interested.

When the enemy boats were sighted there were only two or three members of each crew on deck, but as the details of the surrender worked out during the morning and early afternoon more Germans appeared from below decks. They appeared a sullen, but well fed lot when the first British officers stepped aboard and curtly saluted. British sailors followed the officers and the Germans went to the forward deck as the British and German officers went below to examine the first ship to be taken over. The German commander briefly answered questions regarding the machinery, but said nothing else, Evidence of strain and deep chagrin was unmistakably written on the faces of some enemy officers. The machinery was generally in good shape, but the vessels were extremely dirty and devoid of all unessentials. Everything indicating the names of the craft had been removed, although the Germans, conforming to instructions, readily told the names of their boats.



## **Getting Back Three Million** Dollars,

HE PAPER CONTROLLER for Canada a few weeks ago added \$12 a ton to the price of news print paper—the kind used in printing the Courier. This addition, following closely upon several previous increases authorized by the Paper Controller, has meant to Canadian newspaper publishers a total increased publishing cost, in the matter of paper alone, in the past eighteen months, of three million dollars. This very considerable sum Cinadian publishers must recover from their customers, their readers and advertisers.

In connection with the earlier increases the readers of many daily newspapers have been required to pay \$1 or more per year for their newspapers, while the subscription price of very many weekly newspapers has been increased from 50 to 100 per cent. In many cases still further increases will be

But all the three million dollars increase in paper costs cannot be loaded on readers; some of this sum must come from the advertisers—this in the form of increased advertising rates. Advertising rates in Canada are, generally speaking, much lower per thousand in circulation than in the United States. Speaking on this point the editor of Marketing, a Canadian advertisers' newspaper published in Toronto, says in his last issue: "In meeting the Canadian publishers' calls for higher rates, advertising buyers should not fail to recognize that for years they have benefited by the publisher's undervaluation of his space, and should be the more willing on that account to recognize the present necessities." To all of which The Courier agrees.

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





Married Men and Those of Longest Service to Have First Consideration

London, Nov. 20 .- (Correspond nce of the Associated Press) .-Married men and those who have seen long service in the British armies will receive first consideration in the demobilization of British fighting forces, says Dr. Christopher Addison, Minister of Reconstruction. 'Pivotal' men, he said, would come

The demobilization, said the Min-ister, should be so conducted that millions of men in the navy and army would have an early opportunity of employment. Accordingly a plan arranged on industrial requirements had been prepared.

As men are demobilized they will be re-employed in the various industries from which they were with drawn to enter the army. There will be special facilities giving access to the land, said Dr. Addison. Gardens

Councils composed of employers and working men have been organized in forty or fifty different trades. Already these bodies are removing ources of irritation and bringing a spirit of solidarity, a better spirit than prevailed under former agreements, said the Minister.
