CASE GROWS STRONGER

Prosecution Confident of Conviction in the Hooper Poisoning.

ANOTHER FAKE DEATH NOTICE.

Did Hooper Discount His Wife's Death?—The Trial of the Case Promises to be the most sensational in the history of the County.

MONTREAL, Oct. 9.—The Hooper case is now the great topic in public and club circles. The startling revelations made by Dr. Charles Cameron, and R. W. Webb, the chemist, have brought matters to a head, and it is stated now in legal circles that one of the most sensational trials prepared. The fact that Hooper belongs to Ontario, and that his trial will take place in this Province, and is alleged to have committed the felony with which he is to be charged, will make the case an interesting one for all Canada, and that it will not be definitely settled in what district it is held at Port Hope. The trial will take place either at Joliet, St. Schastiguet or Port Hope, where she was buried. If the trial is held for the district of Terrebonne it will come off at St. Schastiguet. A despatch from Joliet states that C. A. Corneille, Q.C., Crown prosecutor of that district, has not yet been instructed, but he expects to receive some instructions at the close of the coroner's inquest at Port Hope.
