New Government Building.

WHERE OUR POST OFFICE AND CUSTOM HOUSE WILL FIND ACCOMMODATION.

The accompanying illustration is a fine representation of the new Dominion Government Building recently erected in Wolfville. Our citizens are justly proud of this beautiful addition to the number of handsome and substantial public buildings built in this thriving town during the last few years.

It is built entirely with smooth cut sandstone and occupies a commanding position in the middle of a lot about 300 ft. square on Main street opposite the new Royal Bank building and the Bank of Montreal.

Travellers say this is the finest post-office of any in the small towns of the Dominion.

The post-office department will occupy the first floor except one room reserved for a bonded goods warehouse in connection with the customs office, which will have commodious quarters on the second floor, where are also very comfortable apartments for the use of the janitor and his family, fitted with all modern conveniences.

The floors of the main entrance and lobby of the post-office, and also the entrance to the customs house, are laid with white enameled tile. The remainder of the floors throughout the building are hard-wood. The front and side entrances, as also the main staircase, are finished in oak, and the whole presents a very neat and substantial appearance.

The basement has several large rooms all having concrete floors. The boiler room contains two large boilers that supply the hot water heaters throughout the whole building.

There is a generous supply of electric lights and other modern conveniences.

The works approaching the building are laid with cement. Concrete with granite steps are at each entrance.

The driveway surrounding the building is built with broken stone and gravel.

A clock-tower is to be installed in the clock-tower prepared for it, and the post-office boxes in numbers sufficient to meet the demands of the citizens for some years, are expected to be ready for installation in a few days, and it is hoped the new year will find a long list of mail supplied by the opening of this magnificent building for the use of the public.

The Institution is well under way with the new library. When completed it will be one of the many handsome buildings that are being erected on the Hill. We are justly proud of the energetic advancement of Acadia. It means everything for the future of our town as a first class residential and educational centre.

Wolfville's Big Week.

Our Waterfront.

Although the season just closing has not been quite up to the average, business at our wharves has been fairly lively and at times they presented a very busy appearance. About 15,000 tons of freight has passed over the wharves of Messrs R. E. Harris & Sons and Burgess & Co since the season opened and there are still expected here two or three vessels with cargoes before we settle down for the winter.

Our harbour is neither as safe nor as easy of access as it should be. The points at several turns in the entrance have been building up, to some extent blocking the channel. As our



wharves are busy, handling cargoes over them cannot help but be expensive and slow. We need a railway siding run along the wharves parallel with the main line. This would provide berths for two or three large vessels where they could discharge or load directly on and off cars.

There is already an appropriation for work on our harbor and if our citizens pull together there is no doubt that our progressive Government will do their share toward making it as snug and convenient a little harbor as any on the Bay. If the improvements mentioned above are carried out the business done over our wharves should be doubled within a very short time.

Rev. Mr. Dixon on Nova Scotia.

Rev. R. F. Dixon, the esteemed rector of St. John's church, who is now on a visit to his old home in England, is finding time to enlighten the people of the old land about the province of his adoption. From a recent issue of the Cumberland News we copy the following:—

"Last week the Rev. R. F. Dixon, Wolfville, Nova Scotia, gave a lecture in the Mission Room at Burgh on the province of Nova Scotia, of which he has been a resident nearly twenty years. He also spoke of Ontario, where he has lived about twenty-two years. Mr. Dixon, in opening, said he was much impressed with the great advance of knowledge about Canada in England. He had visited the school in the village and he found the children wonderfully well acquainted with the geography and history of the Dominion. Incidentally he paid a very warm tribute to the work done by Mr. Bell, the principal, who was a teacher that any community might be proud of. Nova Scotia, he said, was beginning to attract a superior class of immigrants. It offered great chances for practical farmers, as ready-made farms could be had at very low prices, and many of them were very similar to those in England. It was, moreover, at least a week earlier than the European markets than the West, had an excellent climate, abundance of timber, and good water. He warned his audience against the habit too common among Englishmen in Canada of disparaging the country and refusing to take advice, but the prejudice against Englishmen was passing away, as Canadians were discovering that these 'backwoods men' were not representative Englishmen. This instance gave a definite demonstration of the climate, soil, production, physical features and location of the province. There were a few more questions and much interesting conversation.

Some Observations Respecting Apples.

In almost every part of the Annapolis Valley the work of planting more apple trees goes merrily on. Whether these efforts towards increased acreage will be crowned with success or failure, time alone can tell, but it would almost seem at the present moment that the same amount of time, energy and money expended on improving the quality rather than increasing the quantity of the Valley's output, would prove a more profitable investment.

The present season's apple crop is universally short, yet all the world's great markets report ample supplies, due almost entirely to increased acreage at home and abroad. These vast young orchards each year adding their crops to those of old established plantations, swell the total production to such unexpected proportions that it has become impossible to estimate the force hand with any degree of accuracy, a season's apple crop. This condition is true of practically every apple growing country, and we find that the English apple crop this year has far exceeded all estimates, entirely due to increased acreage, we are told.

The writer was told of an orchardist in Kent who had one hundred acres of the famous Cox Orange Pippin just commencing to produce. Nova Scotia apples have to compete with the home-grown article on the English markets pretty well up to Christmas. It must be admitted that the distance from here to those markets is a heavy handicap of which we cannot get rid.

At the commencement of the season prospects never looked brighter for the Nova Scotia grower who was fortunate enough to have a fair crop of apples. Like many another bubble, this one burst and the autumn varieties which went to English markets netted the shipper prices little better than last season, a year when the crop was second largest ever produced. There is no mystery as to the cause. First and foremost the weather conditions left everything to be desired. Positively hot weather prevailed throughout October and the high humidity capped the climax, with the inevitable result, rapid ripening of the fruit and ideal conditions for fungous to continue its development. This in itself would seem quite sufficient for the fruit growers to contend with but to make matters worse, their early shipments were carried in steamers with no cold storage facilities which consequently landed their cargo in the most shocking condition, to compete with liberal supplies of English apples.

If the cold storage plant at St. John, N. B., which, I understand, is more ornamental than useful, had been in Halifax as it should have been, we could have used it as a pre-cooling station, and thereby saved thousands of dollars' worth of fruit. Thoroughly pre-cooled would carry in good shape even in ordinary fan ventilated ships, on a ten days voyage. This year's crop of Nova Scotia apples will not average fifty per cent. number one grade.

In spite of the labor-saving and efficient power sprayer, the work is only half done by the majority of the growers. There are still in our midst, even in this so-called enlightened age, hundreds of growers who make the sweeping statement that spraying is little or no good for the control of 'apple scab.' Their spraying operations are done fitfully and aimlessly, and frequently not thoroughly, forgetful of the fact that the benefits to be derived are cumulative and the success of any one year's work is greatly dependent upon the work of previous years.

More apples or better apples, that seems to be the question. Number three apples are grown at an actual loss to the producer. One of the greatest hindrances to the average Nova Scotia fruit grower is his self conceit. As a matter of fact there is hardly a variety of apples produced in this province but what is grown to greater perfection in other parts of the world, not on account of any fault in soil or climate here, but because we are behind the times in our methods. We bank too much on the superior flavor of our fruit, but this asset is conspicuous by its absence in the 'fruit market'.

More and better spraying, more thorough, more careful handling, less stable manure in mature orchards, pre-cooling of autumn varieties, more number one apples, but not more orchards than we can properly care for, should be the aim of every Nova Scotia fruit grower who hopes to win first place against the many competitors who have set so swift a pace in the race for supremacy in the world's markets.

Local Fox Ranching.

In common with other communities during the past year our town folk have witnessed with growing interest the development of a new industry which has brought fabulous riches and unenvied prosperity to the people of the province of Prince Edward Island.

Notwithstanding many predictions to the contrary, silver black fox farming has proved a veritable 'bonanza' to those who have taken stock in the various companies organized during the past two years. Even in the case of some of the larger ranches with a capitalization of from \$50,000 to \$15,000 per pair the returns have been very large, forty per cent being the lowest dividends declared. No legitimate industry has ever paid such enormous profits and in no part of the world has there ever been offered such an opportunity of reaping a rich harvest at a minimum risk. Not one of the companies organized and placed on a sound basis under the management of men having a first hand knowledge of the business has failed to 'make good' and many have exceeded the promises made by the most sanguine of promoters. From 200 per cent. to 500 per cent. has been realized in most cases and as high as 1000 per cent. in the case of one company, the average for all the companies being 100 per cent.

While Prince Edward Island has been the chief centre of the industry, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are now rivaling each other in their haste to share in the profits of

the business. Kentville, Middleton and Bridgewater have organized companies and Wolfville is to have at least one first class ranch in operation by September next. A. I. McConnell, James McConnell & Son, the pioneer fox breeders of Nova Scotia, will undertake the management of a company capitalized at \$300,000. The McConnells are too well known to need a recommendation and this, the latest addition to the industry of Wolfville, will start business with every chance of success.

One fact that will be of interest to the public, especially to those who have invested in local companies, may not be generally known, and that is the peculiar suitability of the Annapolis Valley for fox farming, and its similarity to the Island in regard to soil and climate. This fact has been emphasized by the American Consul General in Charlottetown, in a report to his Government, made at the latter's request by himself, in which the Annapolis Valley and a portion of New Brunswick were cited as the only sections in North America whose conditions referred to were identical with those of the Island. A final word may not be out of place to those who may be contemplating putting their money into the business, always be careful that the particular organization offering its securities complies with the cardinal requisitions for success, pedigree stock, reasonable capitalization and efficient management.

SHOP EARLY

Once upon a time everyone left their Christmas shopping or the bulk of it until Xmas Eve. The business was a strenuous one in those days, hard on the clerks, hard on the stock; while there may have been a larger amount of excitement in it the results were not so satisfactory.

Holiday gifts now embrace a much greater variety of goods than ever before. Anything from a tin horn to a ton of Coal goes into the catalogue of acceptable articles.

People do not wait until they reach a store now before they decide what they want, they have a pretty good idea weeks before what they will buy, and the wise ones select early while the assortment is good. Merchants are adapting their trade and advertising along this line, and live towns are having a special shopping week, generally the first week in December. Advertising special lines that are likely to be needed and giving before the buying public the great advantage of securing these specials.

This departure first took the form of a "Merchants Day" so called—this was tried for a few years, but abandoned by most towns on account of the unsatisfactory service in trying to crowd a week's business into one day. The next and latest move is a "Bargain Week" or a week of special advertising to bring to the notice of the public their general stock including purely Christmas goods. This has been found much more satisfactory to the buyer and the seller alike.

Large advertising space is secured and additional supplements are gotten out by the local papers which are sent broadcast over the district and outside to any place where new customers can be induced to come in. Such a paper is not only an advertising medium for the trades people but a general boomer for the industries and attractions of the place from which it is published.

The ACADIAN comes to you this week in the Present form, showing what united efforts on the part of the towns' Merchants can do in the way of advertising. More than that, as it is nearing the close of another year, it takes something of a retrospective glance at the year's business, showing that there has been some advancement in our town all along the line.

We wish to emphasize the fact that we are not trying to sell you something you do not need, but that we wish to supply your wants right here and keep the money at home, where it will go back into the Churches, the Schools, the Streets, Charities, and all the objects to which a man who has a Cash Register, or Money Till, is daily asked to contribute.

May Mean Great Fortune For P. E. 1 People

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Nov. 12—Ronald Campbell of Summerside has a letter intimating that he and his family, as well as the family of Elaine Campbell of Wellington, P. E. I., and three sisters in the United States, may be heirs to a fortune of nearly \$14,000,000 left by Hector Campbell of P. E. Island, who left Summerside forty-five years ago and died recently in Australia.

Canada Bars British Cattle, Sheep and Swine

(Canadian Press)
Ottawa, Nov. 24—The agriculture department has put an embargo on cattle, sheep and swine importations from the Old Country, owing to an outbreak of foot and mouth disease reported from England.

Thousands are Idle in Winnipeg

Winnipeg, November 27—Seventeen thousand three hundred men are out of employment in Winnipeg at the present time, according to Mr. W. Hammond, past president of the Building Trades Council. Mr. Hammond arrived at his figures by a consideration of trade unionist now idle. There are over 13,000 trade unionists in the city, and of these, he says, over fifty per cent are idle. Mr. Hammond says 25,000 will be idle by Christmas. Several western cities, Vancouver and Brandon among them, are feeding their unemployed under municipal organization.

Apple Prices Advancing

The United Fruit companies of Nova Scotia have received a cable from the Michigan sale of apples in Liverpool yesterday, stating that the prices realized ranged from 19s. to 25s. per barrel. The apples were golden russets, Baldwin's sold 18s. to 19s. Good prices are confidently expected for future shipments.

Two by-election Writs—Writs have been issued for the by-election in Macdonald and South Lantz. Nominations are on Saturday, Dec. 6th, and polling on Saturday, Dec. 13th.

Temperance Convention

At a representative meeting of the Kings County Temperance Alliance, held at Berwick August 26th, a resolution was passed recommending the petitioning of the Federal Government for the privilege of voting to repeal the Scott Act to allow the N. The Executive was empowered to call a general Convention for the purpose of further considering the advisability of such a course, and in case the action should be confirmed, to take the steps necessary for its accomplishment. At a subsequent meeting of the Executive the work of calling such convention was delegated to the undersigned sub-committee.

The proposed Convention, which will be composed of all members of the Alliance, all first officers of other temperance organizations, all pastors of churches, and all Superintendents of Sunday Schools in the County, will be held in the Kennebec Baptist Church on Tuesday, December 9th. The first session will open at 2 o'clock p. m. for business, and a mass meeting addressed by prominent workers will convene at 7.30.

Ten at 25 cents will be served in the Vestry at 8.30. Visitors will be cordially welcomed at all services.

Mill Creek wharf on Thursday,
Nov. 27th, with a cargo of 3000
bbls. of potatoes sold to the United
Fruit Co's., Ltd. Bound for Santi-
ago, she was the first three masted
schooner ever loaded at Mill Creek.
For years past the people of this
place have felt the need of a wharf
so that they could load a schooner
instead of either hauling their pota-
toes to Canning or paying 7c a
bbl. freight to have the small ves-
sels take them to Kingsport to be
reloaded. Although the late gov-
ernment built a small wharf here, it
was not of sufficient size to be of
much use to the neighborhood.
After the election of 1911, A. de Witt
Foster, M. P., was interviewed by
parties interested in the welfare of
the community, and received from
him the promise that if possible he
would build a wharf at Mill Creek,
with the result that in 1912, Mr.
W. H. Porter received a commission
of \$1000 to repair the old wharf
and in 1913, \$3300 to build a new
block of 92 feet. The work was
completed on July 1st, and com-
pleted on Oct. 30th. Capt. Salter
of the schooner "Bennett" pro-
posed it the best wharf he ever
saw. The people of this place are
very grateful to Mr. Foster, as by no way could he
have helped the people of this place
as much as he has in this manner.
We are in hopes to see another
block of 100 ft built next year, then
Mill Creek will be a Harbour where
any vessel can lay in perfect safety.
There has also been over 7000
bbls. of apples shipped from this
wharf this year by schooners and the
schooner Brunswick. Better times
are coming for the people of Blom-
idon, N. S.

First Christmas Ship For England

(Halifax Chronicle Dec 3rd)

Tonight at midnight, the first
"Christmas ship" leaves port for
England. This year it is the White
Star Dominion liner Canada that
carries the first contingent of that
great army of men, women and
children who, rich and poor alike
are homesick for a sight of old
England in that merriest of her
merry seasons.

This home going at Christmas is
becoming a great annual pilgrimage
which year after year as it has passed
through the portals of Halifax has
increased in numbers, until now
thousands are eastward bound at
this season of the year and the great
steamships sailing from this port
have their capacity taxed to the ut-
most.

Forty-Five Steamers Loaded With Grain

Port William, Ont. Dec. 2nd—
During the past three days 9,367,750
bushels of grain have been loaded
into the hold of forty-five steamers
and carried down the lakes to East-
ern points of distribution. The two
harbours of Port William and Port
Arthur have been kept in practically
one continuous uproar for three days
and nights owing to the feverish ac-
tivity displayed a'long the waterfront
by marine men and grain shippers to
clear the steamers before midnight
Sunday night when the old insurance
rate gave way to a higher one.

Fire At Berwick

A fire occurred at Berwick on
Saturday last and as a result Mr. H.
E. Rood suffered very severely, the
second time within a year. The
fire started in the Fisher Block oc-
cupied by Mr. Rood as millinery
rooms and by A. Stanley Fisher, up-
stairs by Mrs. Hicks as a residence.
Mr. Fisher lost most of his furniture
and Mr. Rood and Mrs. Hicks also
most of their effects. The flames
next attacked the store occupied by
Mr. Rood. Most of the goods and
store fittings were removed but in a
damaged condition. The loss will
be quite heavy.

The Acadia Institutions.

Wolfville's Splendid Educational Advantages.

For over eighty-five years, Wolfville and the Acadia Institutions have been spoken of in the "open breath." The University is now in a position to furnish milk for the various student dining-rooms, so that the purity may be assured.

Here are to be found students from all over the Maritime Provinces bringing together the experiences of different homes and different communities, receiving instruction from the largest academic staff in the Maritime Provinces and applying themselves through classroom work and outside activities so as to develop integrity, fidelity and ability. The students have a form of self government, and in their activities, for which they are alone responsible, have been most successful, having won debating and athletic championships from the other Maritime Colleges. Wolfville is proud of Acadia and what it has accomplished and Acadia is proud of being situated among the beauties of Wolfville and among enterprising and interested citizens.

Upon conviction of such offender before a Scout Court he will be suspended from all privileges for a length of time proportionate to the offence.

It may be stated that results along these lines so far have far exceeded our expectation and believe that if people are not impatient for immediate results, the work will be most successful.

Every Wednesday and Friday evenings there is a Basket Ball practice between patrols. A cup has been donated for a Basket Ball League and an interesting series of games is expected.

Through an oversight on the part of the Scoutmaster the handsome cup given by Dr. E. P. Moore for shooting between patrols and won by the "Wolves" was not formally presented on Friday evening. We hope that this presentation can take place on some future occasion.
