Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,-We are hearing a great deal now about the need of cleaning our streets. Also, we hear general complaints of the dust and mud, according as it wet or fine—and it seems that for fully nine months out of every year we are almost bound

Such a state of things is unhealthy ncomfortable and quite unnecessary. and the remedy is simple.

The time has certainly come when as an up to date city we should have up to date streets, either macadamized or made of tar and sand, such as are used greatly in England. With such streets there could be no mud and but ittle dust. Of course the initial cost would be rather large, yet the advantages to the public would be so great that we should welcome them at any cost.

May I be permitted to suggest the ollowing scheme:-

(1) Let all more or less treets, those running east and west, be macadamized; those running north and south and in hilly districts be made of tar and sand, as safer for traffic: all well raised in the centre and sloping gradually to deep concrete drains on either side. All pavenents, asphalt or tar and sand, slop

(2) To raise money for the carry ng out of such a scheme, I should suggest the imposition of a small tax (extending over 3 or 4 years) graduated according to the income or rent f each householder

Extracts from the Judgment

Emerson, J. "I have to hold that such an agreement, as a binding and valid contract. could not be made by the Executive Government of this Colony. In law it never was a contract, because of the absence of one of the essential eterments of a contract, viz. capacity on the part of one of the contracting parties. No contract can be made by the Executive Government to remit a tax, and as such a contract was not valid without the authority or consent of the Legislature, it could not be admitted in evidence for or on behalf of the defendant in the action. The Executive Government knew or should have known that it had no such power The agreement could not have been intended to be binding upon the Government without the approval of the Legislature, especially view of the fact that the Statutory Rules of the House of Assembly, provide that no contract made with the Government extending over a period years shall be binding unless ratified by the Legislature. Besides, the document is plainly one, which, in view of the Taxing Act and the contract of 1905, could not have been intended by those who signed it to have any binding effect as a contract. unless and until it had been ratified by Statute of the Legislature. 





Lynching on Stage.

Negro Dragged to Theatre and Rid-Livermore, Ky., April 27.-Will

Potter, a negro, was the central figure in a bloody drama staged here. when fifty citizens dragged him upon the stage, and after stringing him up riddled his body with bullets. He shot and killed Frank Mitchell, 22 years old (white), in a quarrel. What the pair quarrelled about is not known, but a pistol shot was heard and the negro was seen fleeing from the scene. Word spread rapidly that Mitchell had been killed and the citizens began searching for the black. He was captured by Marshal V. P. Stabler and placed in the city

Hearing the mob approaching, the marshal swore in half a dozen deputies and the prisoner was rushed to the local opera house, where he was hidden beneath a stage. A hurry message was sent to the sheriff, but before he arrived the mob had dragged the negro from his hiding place and carried him upon the stage. He was tied securely to one of the uprights, while the mob gathered in the the orchestra pit below. A signal was given and fifty rifles and revolvers spoke, and the body was riddled with bullets. A few minutes later the mob stole quietly from the playhouse and the drama was over. The death of Mitchell was avenged. An investigation will be made by the coroner's jury, but in all probability there will not be sufficient evidence to prove that a single citizen of Liver-
