





#### Time to Clear the **Broad Cove** Line.

Indignant complaints reach us about the snow blockade on the Broad Cove line, which has been closed for nearly a fortnight or since the first heavy snow storm.

A correspondent informs us that no attempt has been made to open the line via Broad Cove, and that there has been no train over this line for about a fortnight. The whole of the Southside of Trinity Bay is served by that line and has been cut off for that time from the city. Mails are being despatched from Whitbourne by dog teams. There are also strong complaints of the irregular way the service is being run from Placentia. Yesterday's train from Placentia passed through Whitbourne at three o'clock in the morning, and another this morning at four o'clock. The regular evening service appears to be disorganized.

As the road between Placentia and the city has been cleared of snow, it is not an unreasonable request that the train should be kept running at some where near schedule time and not be sent through settlements at such times as midnight and after when passengers cannot connect without extreme inconvenience.

We have no wish to be unreasonable. The storms of the past fort-I saw such deep drifts before. On night have been frequent and severe, and there have been heavy falls and drifts of snow. But it is high time that the Broad Cove line be cleared, and that an attempt be made to run trains on that service, and to run them on regular schedule time.

Last year, the leader of the Opposition, Sir Robert Bond found it necessary to direct attention to this matter in the House of Assembly, and attention was paid to the representations he made and the line opened. We are now making a representation on the same lines. It is to be hoped that the Government will back it up, and that the Reid Nfld. Company will pay prompt attention to the complaint, and this evening for the first League Hock open the Broad Cove line immediately and run the regular service over it.







In the ensuing confusion the Sinal narrowly escaped collision with the vessels. Next morning when the Sinal was leaving the fort fired three shells at her, one bursting within 300 feet of the ship, causing great panic among the passengers. The Sinal, flying the French colors, returned to port, where the captain immediately filed a complaint with the French Consul.



# Household Notes.

To make covers to place over food that is cooling take embroidery hoops and squares of hemmed cheesecloth the right size to slip into the hoops. They are fine to put over bowls of food that must stand for some time.

To remove ink stains on white material rub the stained portion gently with sour milk until the stain starts, or place in skimmed milk and let remain until the milk sours. If this fails to act, apply salt and lemon juice and place in sunlight.

A strip of eyelets cut from an old lace shoe will furnish new straps for an otherwise useless pair of gaiters. They are quickly attached with a few stitches of stout thread and the metal evelets are more convenient to buckle than a punched hole.



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
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
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
