



### WAS HARD RACE.

For three miles out of the four and a quarter the positions of the mer were constantly changing. Not unti they had been sculling for nearly 16 minutes could one predict with any degree of confidence who would win After they had travelled through mountains of water along the Chis wick Reach, there was a great race for the only sheltered spot before reaching Barnes Bridge. Barry was there first and thus paved the way t his ultimate victory.

### THE START.

They started by mutual consent and got splendidly away at the firs' attempt. Barry appeared to lea slightly at the start, pulling 10, 18 and 32 strokes in the first quarter, hal and full minute, compared with 91/2 17 and 31 by his rival.

Arnst, exerting his tremendou strength behind every stroke, gradu ally went up and was leading at the London R. C. boatclub. He was length ahead at the steps on the Mid dlesex shore opposite the Thames I C., and had drawn clear at Crave Steps, which he reached after scul ling for 2 min 47 secs. He was the pulling 24 strokes to the minute Barry was well served by the tide from the Fulham Football ground to th Mile Post, and he was sculing wit his customary ease, his long stroke keeping his craft well on the move.
