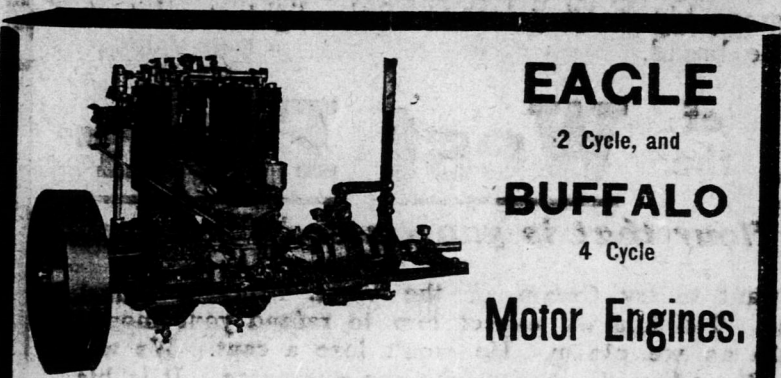

Oxen Will Draw.

Services Starts at Early Morning and Continue Until Late at Night. Ceremonial Will Be of Gorgeous Nature—New Emperor and the Dowager Empress Will Read Tributes to the Dead Ruler.

Immediately after the arrival of the procession at Aoyama, the funeral service will begin, and will comprise the full and imposing Shinto ritual. After the service the Emperor will personally read a tribute to the dead emperor, and this will be followed by another one read by the Empress Dowager, who will be succeeded by the Ministers of State and others.

At the conclusion of this service the Imperial train is to leave for Kio, out the Emperor and the Empress Dowager will not travel by it. The train is scheduled to arrive at the station especially built at Momojima at 5.10 p.m. on September 14, and a similar trip to that arranged from the Palace to the Aoyama parade ground will follow.

Various tributes to the late Emperor's memory will be read beside the tomb. Further services are to be held and these will conclude the funeral ceremony.

Blackmailers Got \$40,000 From a Widow.

Exploits of a French Gang of Swindlers is Revealed as the Leader is Arrested—A Clever Plot.

Paris, August 6.—The leading figure of a blackmailing gang, whose principal exploit caused a foolish woman to lose \$28,000, (\$140,000), was captured yesterday by the Paris

police in the person of a man calling himself "La Basse," but with half a dozen aliases.

Two summers ago a wealthy young Parisian widow made the acquaintance of Chateau Guyon, a fashionable watering place, of a well-dressed man who was known as Fabris and described himself as an American banker.

A flirtation began and the couple took a moonlight excursion in the park. There they were surprised by a man dressed in uniform, who said he was the park keeper, and ordered the couple to follow him to the police station. They protested, but their protests and supplications were unavailing.

THE CONFEDERATE APPEARS.

A stranger then appeared and introduced himself as "Pierre Cournaillies," saying he was an engineer. He suggested that the keeper, to avoid a scandal, should agree to some arrangement with Fabris and the widow.

Finally, the keeper undertook to refrain from action in consideration of the incredibly large amount of \$16,000 (\$80,000), which in her distress the widow paid by check. Fabris promised to reimburse her as soon as he returned to New York.

The widow left the chateau the following day, but in Paris she was horrified to receive a visit from the keeper and Cournaillies. The latter said the keeper's conscience was pricking him and he wished to refund the money received and let matters take their course. The panic-stricken widow consented to pay a further sum of \$12,000 (\$60,000).

Afterward, on receiving a letter from Fabris declaring that, on consideration, he had decided not to refund the money, she had her suspicions aroused and communicated with the police, when she found she had been the victim of a gang of thieves whose specialty was this odious form of blackmail, practised in the fashionable watering places of France.

Fatal Accident.

A man named Henry Willmott met with a fearful accident on the afternoon of August 8th, in a saw mill on Bay D'Espoir, and which proved fatal.

The day's work had just been over and the machinery were being brought to a standstill when the unfortunate man in attempting to remove some shavings and kindling beneath the saw was nearly cut in two, the stopping of the machinery barely saving Willmott's body from being torn to atoms. As it was the poor fellow was badly mangled and an hour after the accident happened he died of his injuries. The deceased was a native of England and leaves to mourn a wife and five children.

How Barry Beat Arnst.

WAS TERRIFIC RACE.

There were tears—tears of joy—in Barry's eyes at the end of the great race for the sculling championship of the world, stakes of £1,000, and the Sporting Life Cup, says London Sporting Life.

For an hour afterwards Barry's ears rang with the cheers of the thousands. Arnst had also a cordial reception from the crowd.

Arnst, in sportsmanlike fashion, acknowledged that the better man won. Arnst started favorite at 6 to 4 on.

AMBITION REALIZED.

There was a dramatic moment when the race was over, and Barry had passed the winning post. As soon as he had cleared the goal he released his grip of the sculls and bowed his head, which he covered with his hands. When he raised it again his eyes were wet. Emotion had overcome him. He had realized the great ambition of his life, and the reaction from the strain of many weeks of hard preparation and constant anxiety had found its relief—in triumph.

When he awakened to his surroundings he found himself the centre of a cheering throng, whose shouts were intermingled with the noises of the siren's blasts.

Rarely, if ever, have two scullers remained so close to one another for such a long distance.

WAS HARD RACE.

For three miles out of the four and a quarter the positions of the men were constantly changing. Not until they had been sculling for nearly 10 minutes could one predict with any degree of confidence who would win. After they had travelled through mountains of water along the Chiswick Reach, there was a great race for the only sheltered spot before reaching Barnes Bridge. Barry was there first and thus paved the way to his ultimate victory.

THE START.

They started by mutual consent and got splendidly away at the first attempt. Barry appeared to lead slightly at the start, pulling 10, 18 and 32 strokes in the first quarter, half and full minute, compared with 9½, 17 and 31 by his rival.

Arnst, exerting his tremendous strength behind every stroke, gradually went up and was leading at the London R. C. boatclub. He was length ahead at the steps on the Middlesex shore opposite the Thames F. C., and had drawn clear at Crave Steps, which he reached after sculling for 2 min. 47 secs. He was pulling 24 strokes to the minute. Barry was well served by the tide from the Fulham Football ground to the Mile Post, and he was sculling with his customary ease, his long stroke keeping his craft well on the move.

TWO SECONDS DIFFERENCE.

Arnst was going along apparently very comfortably, but could not claim a great advantage at the mile post. Only two seconds separated them at this point. Arnst passed in 4 min 58 sec., and Barry in 5 min.

Near Harrod's wharf, Arnst was sculling at the rate of 24 per minute and Barry 25. When rounding the corner for Hammersmith Bridge Barry had to pull his right scull 1/2 keep clear of his opponent, but he never allowed Arnst to get far away. As a matter of fact he was gradually overhauling him at Hammersmith. Arnst went under the centre archway in 3 min. 30 sec., and Barry was only a second behind him.

BARRY IN FRONT.

For the first time since the early part of the race he got his boat ahead when opposite the headquarters of the West End A. R. A.

Here the men encountered their roughest water of the whole journey. It was a veritable sea, and both boats must have "shipped" a good deal of water. Arnst probably derived slight advantage from the inside berth round the bend. Barry attempted to seek shelter as much as possible, but Arnst kept him well out. Both men literally crawled through the waves.

Barry retained his lead for a short distance, then Arnst drew level, but Barry was again a few feet in front.

at the bottom of Chiswick Eyot. Arnst slightly quickened, and the rivals sculled side by side practically the full length of the island. Barry probably had a short lead at the top, but Arnst had regained his position at Chiswick Steps. His time at this landmark was 14 min. 3 sec., and Barry 14 min. 5 sec.

SMOOTH WATER.

Both men were racing as hard as they could, and Barry had drawn almost level at Thornycroft's. A few yards ahead was a stretch of smooth water. Whoever reached that first was practically certain to win. Unless Arnst could command a well sustained spurt the outlook favoured Barry, for he was better served by the station.

A BIG EFFORT.

The Englishman rose to the occasion in praiseworthy style. He secured the lead at the Brewery and was length ahead at Duke's Meadows. Then it was that he derived the benefit from the shelter which the Middlesex banks afforded. As soon as he was out of the troubled waters Barry went away with surprising ease and without any apparent exertion.

Arnst too, sought protection at this spot, but Barry was too far away. He kept inshore for the remainder of the course, passing under Barnes Bridge after sculling for 19 min. 32 sec. Arnst being 13 sec. later. Barry kept his beautiful style and long-swinging strokes, and had an opportunity for a breather. He was prepared for an emergency.

LAST ATTEMPT.

It was just as well he was, for Arnst made an almost superhuman effort near Mortlake Brewery. Bony helps knew that Barry was in slack water on the Middlesex side, and advised Arnst to quicken for a few strokes. It was a magnificent and plucky spurt on the part of the New Zealander, and he went up fast, but could not sustain the pressure. He stopped completely exhausted, opposite Mortlake Brewery.

Barry continued at an easy paddle and drifted by the winning post. The race had been in progress 23 min. 5 sec. Arnst continued after a few seconds rest, and going alongside Barry shook him fervently by the hand and congratulated him upon his fine performance.

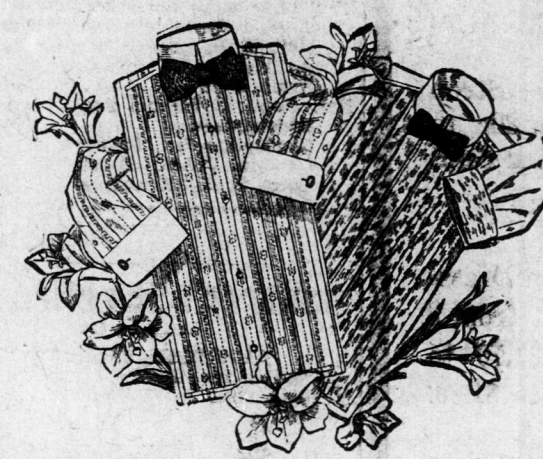

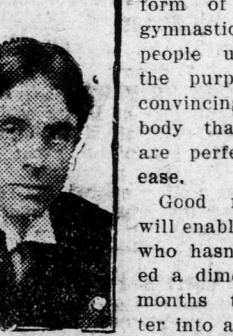

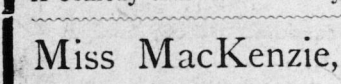

Two got away in good style, but two oars were broken at the Winnie as the stroke was put on. The Maggie was manned by Lunenburg bankers and the Bessie by a stalwart crew from Bristol's Hope. The men saw the mishap and returned to the buoy until the Winnie's crew were supplied with new oars. The Bristol's Hope boys won in the Bessie in 14.24.

The Archibald Cup Race was to be contested by four crews, viz., Carbonear, Bristol's Hope, Bell Island and Harbor Grace. The Maggie and Bessie being considered evenly matched boats it was decided to row the race on time, and Harbor Grace and Bell Island took the first spin. The Bell Island crew coming in first in the Bessie in 15.14½. The Carbonear crew and that of Bristol's Hope now took their places in the boats and were about to start when some person's keen eye noticed a Freshwater man in the Carbonear boat, and as the rule specified that the crew in each case should be from one town, the committee found themselves much against their wish compelled to request the coxswain to get a Carbonear man to take the place of the Freshwater man. Carbonear men then decided not to row, and the Bristol's Hope boys were forced to row alone, and endeavour to beat the Bell Island time. This they did and brought their boat the Bessie past the winning post in 14.46½. They are now the holders of the cup for the year, and won medals for the quickest time. We offer them our congratulations.

The day was very much enjoyed. The tents were well patronized, good feeling prevailed throughout, and we feel it our duty to thank the committee for its untiring efforts to have all the arrangements made so perfectly that no hitch occurred.

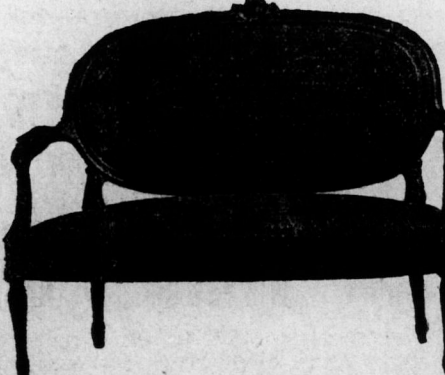

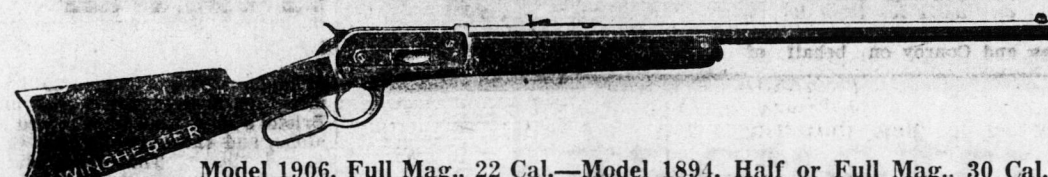

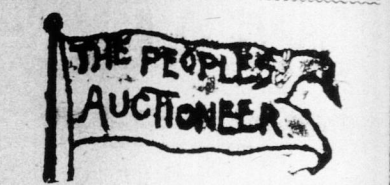
