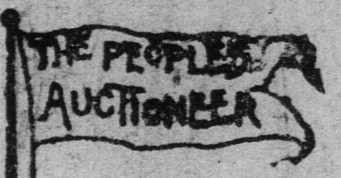

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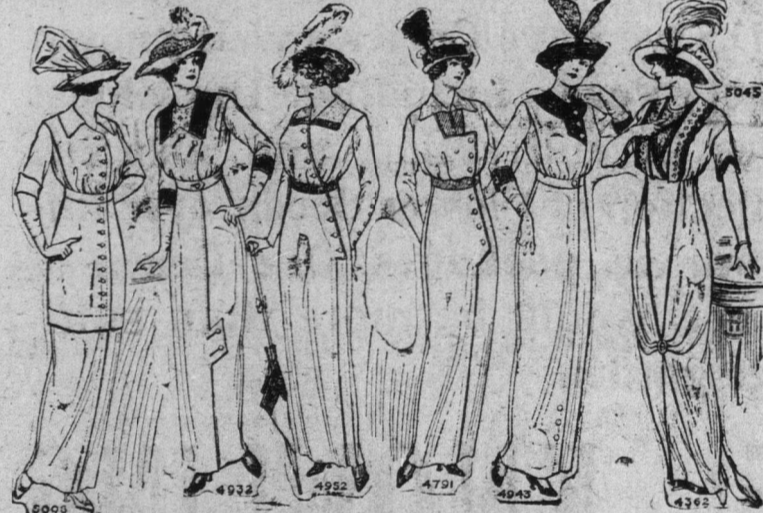

BY RUTH CAMERON.



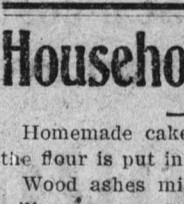
A young man whose firm had broken faith with him on a promise to raise his salary was telling how he evened things up by padding his expense account. When someone criticized the ethics of this, he answered at once that he would never do it if he felt he were being fairly treated, but he considered he was only taking what rightly belonged to him; his employers had not treated him honorably in breaking faith with him, and therefore he felt quite justified in not treating them honorably. I think he made a mistake as old as time itself. Two wrongs do not make a right. Dishonesty never justifies dishonesty. Meanness never justifies meanness. Selfishness never justifies selfishness. And so on down the whole line. The firm which broke faith with this young man was doing him a wrong. But not half so great as the wrong he did himself. What they did affected the conditions of his outward life; what he did affected his character—himself. No one can really hurt you except yourself. There is a certain verse in the Bible which almost inspires in me the wish that I might be a minister for a day in order that I might preach upon it. It is this: "There is nothing from without a man, that entering into him can defile him; but the things which come out of him, these are they that defile the man." Doesn't that mean that the slights you receive, the dishonesty that is displayed towards you, the meanness you suffer from—all these are really outside of you and cannot do you any lasting hurt? It is only the unkindness which you show to others, the dishonesty in your own heart, the meanness to which you stoop, "The things that come out of you," that can really hurt you. In other words, no one can really hurt you but yourself. Somehow that is a very big thought to me. "I am the master of my fate, I am the captain of my soul." I cannot prevent other people from treating me dishonorably, but I can keep my own hands clean as a white flame. I cannot prevent other people from being rude and mean and deceitful and unkind to me, but within my own heart where I may enjoy it, I can keep a fair garden in which the flowers of kindness and courtesy and honor grow, unchoked by weeds of any kind. ### Household Notes.

Homemade cakes will be nicer if the flour is put in last. Wood ashes mixed with kerosene will remove rust from iron. String beans seasoned with mint are delicious served with roast lamb. Whole peppers are better for seasoning soups and sauces than ground pepper. Jelly cake should have the edges pared off carefully to make it roll easily. Instead of using barley and rice for thickening soup try oatmeal occasionally. A few minced nasturtium leaves sprinkled over an omelet give a snappy flavor. A teaspoonful of vinegar put into homemade candy keeps it from being sticky and sweet. Witch hazel and rosewater, half and half, is good for wind-tortured complexions. Baked stuffed tomatoes or peppers will be much improved if brushed over with olive oil. Faded plush may be brightened by brushing it lightly with a clean sponge dipped in chloroform. Fresh mint may be always at hand for cooking purposes by growing it at home in a glass of water. Old, loose kid gloves worn while ironing will keep the hands in good condition and free from callouses. Chopped preserved ginger added to the sauce served with cottage pudding is a delicious accompaniment. Butter will keep sweet much longer in a crock jar with a tight-fitting cover than in any other way. There is nothing in a drug store that will relieve the pain of a bee sting quicker than a handful of mud. Cork may be kept in bottles when travelling by sticking them in with adhesive plaster, such as surgeons use. The small end of a potato should be pricked before it is put into the oven to bake to keep it from bursting. Lard is much better to grease cake pans than butter. Butter will burn and cause the cakes to stick and char. Gold-edged glassware should not be washed in strong soapsuds. The soap will in time make inroads upon the gilt. A clean cloth dipped into hot water and then into a saucer of bran will speedily clean white paint without injury. Bananas that are not quite ripe may be baked in their skins for from twenty to thirty minutes and served hot with cream. When bleaching linen or lace keep it in the bright sunshine. To keep dust out of the bowl place a piece of glass over it. Green tomatoes may be fried the same as green peppers. Slice them, dip them in oil, then in crumbs, and fry in fat or butter. When cooking tomatoes to strain and use for tomato jelly, the flavor will be improved by a bay leaf and a piece of mace added. Never keep paraffine in an uncovered receptacle. It gathers dust. A tin box with a tight-fitting cover is best for the purpose. When milk soup or other foods boil over on the stove, cover the spot quickly with salt. It will do away with any unpleasant odor. Black chip hats that have a gray appearance may be made to look almost new by wiping with a rag that is sprinkled with a few drops of sweet oil.

### Seeking a Cure for Pneumonia

New York, April 19.—A new method aimed to cure pneumonia is under experiment at the Rockefeller Institute. It was announced to-day by Dr. Clarence A. McWilliams, a physician who has worked in collaboration with the medical investigators at the institution. The announcement of a positive cure is not yet warranted. Dr. McWilliams said, but improvement in pneumonia cases under the new treatment has been noted. Patients, who have been inoculated with a serum, based on a theory that

the bacillus that causes the disease in two strains, both of which might not be found in the same patient and that a specific cure for each must be found, two sets of horses were inoculated with the strains and two serums obtained. With these serums two sets of mice were inoculated, while at the same time sputum from the patient was also injected into the mice. Through this method the physicians, according to Dr. McWilliams' description of the investigator's efforts, were in a position to determine which strain of the bacillus had affected the patient, who was then inoculated with the serum affecting that particular strain.

### Wall Paper.

Wall paper is a highly decorative form of art which people buy in the spring and would be glad to sell at half price in the fall. It is the only form of mural art which can be bought by the roll and slipped on in one day by a bitulous artisan with a talkative disposition. Wall paper is bought for two purposes only—first, to cover up the coarse and unrestrained freehand drawing of the last paper hanger, and second, to match the lace curtains. Sensitive people object to pink wall paper shading off into a new rug with red roses in the center and green peas in the border, and prefer the natural plaster, adorned with some familiar rural scene, like grandpa milking at sunset. Other people buy their wall paper in some solid color, which will fade about half way up and look like a blonde switch picked out by mail.

Wall paper is usually bought at the drug store, where several thousand patterns are hung to the breeze by a languid clerk who doesn't care what you buy so long as you buy it quick. After a woman has sat in a drug store for two hours and watched a procession of nimble wall patterns pass by, the chances are she will become so color-blind that her selection for the front parlor won't harmonize with anything she has in the house except the kitchen stairway. If more people would close both eyes, take a full breath and order the first pattern thrown on the screen, there would be fewer fat fights between the wall paper and the carpets.

Wall paper is always hung by a frenzied mechanic who is in a hurry to get some place where he can work by the day. Paper hangers do not have to use a straight edge, as they can train the left eye on the wall and not miss the border by over four inches. When a good grade of floor paste is used, wall paper will stay in one place for several weeks without opening up several bump-backed gaps.

Wall paper would last longer if the children were not allowed to play upon it with their feet, but most people would rather have the children than the wall paper.

**Matters Educational.**

We are glad to find that education was so fully discussed by the Legislative Councilors at the last session of the General Assembly. It is an indication of that growth of public opinion which is so greatly needed, and which has been so slow in its growth.

The wholesome feature of the debate was the earnestness displayed to get the best for our children out of the appropriation made for education. This gratifying aspect of the discussion paled into insignificance some of the crude ideas and misapprehensions of laymen, who have little familiarity with the science of education and its working out in practice.

Turning now to Mr. Blackall's report, we are pleased to find he de-

votes much attention to the training of teachers, and tells the story of how his department is trying to work out a sound scheme under adverse conditions.

The scheme is as follows: Those who need it are sent to College to devote their whole attention to ordinary studies with a view of reaching a standard required for the Normal School, where the professional training commences. Here they take courses in child nature, psychology, history of education, school keeping and methods of teaching. Then they are sent to schools to practice under supervision.

As to the shortcomings of the scheme in practice, Mr. Blackall reports:—

"Where then, are our shortcomings? They are here and they are serious: In the first place, the period of training in each of the three steps is too short, so short indeed that many essentials in each step, and particularly in the middle one (the Normal Training School), have to be passed over so that the candidate receives little or no special training, for instance, in how to teach drawing, singing, nature study and practical subjects; in the second place, it is only a few of our pupil-teachers can manage to take the first step and it is they only, as a rule who are fitted to take the second; hardly any can take all three—the complete course—short as the periods are; in the third place, we cannot staff our Normal Training School or our Practising School sufficiently. In fact circumstances compel us to accept the most meagre preparation for the Third Grade teachers' certificate, and the consequence is that less than 50 per cent. of our teaching staff know anything whatever about child-nature or the true aim and purpose of education. What is the cure? Money, money, money. Given the funds, we can perfect the system and in time staff the majority of our schools with men and women who know their business, and what a blessing to our country this would be!"

**Civic Arrears.**

At the City Council meeting the Mayor admitted that some \$90,000 was due to the Council, and also stated that at present city lawyers and agencies were collecting bills to the amount of over \$27,000 from 587 delinquents. Their average debt works out at \$46 per head.

From this it would appear that at present no means are being taken to collect some \$63,000 of the debt. On this point further information should be forthcoming. Does it mean that \$63,000 sum is not collectable, or that a part of it is collectable, and that it is considered wiser to wait before collecting from the latter delinquents? It is absurd to speak of the ignorance or want of thought of the critic. That ignorance is solely due to the reticence of the Council in not giving information to the public and indeed we find that one of the Councilors complained of critics being poorly informed and in the same breath declared that so far as he was concerned he would not give any further information; a most extraordinary attitude for a Councilor to assume.

The broad fact that \$90,000 was owed to the Council was disclosed by the Auditor General. If part of it was 20 years old and not collectable, the amount should have been written off as a bad debt, and so should all the rest of the bad debts. It seems to us most unfair to the public and to the Council to have such a large amount of arrears appearing as assets of the Council, if a large portion of it is not collectable. But the Council has the remedy in its own hands.

There can be no doubt that if all the taxation was thrown on the landlord, it would make matters easier for the Council, as Councilor Myrick stated, and it would give the Council an asset to fall back upon, but we doubt the wisdom of extending upwards the list of civic voters who pay no direct tax to the Municipality.

In England there is a system of collection which is known as compounding for local taxes. In all municipalities, the local authorities may call upon the landlord to pay the tenant's taxation on houses below a certain rental, which he charges to the tenant. He is allowed a commission. Except in London, Liverpool, Manchester and Birmingham where the limit is higher, this option by the local authority can apply only to houses the annual rental of which is not above £8, that is forty dollars. But in St. John's the occupiers of houses of such a rental are not liable for the occupier's tax. This precedent therefore falls to bolster up the case for a collection from the landlord, and it falls entirely as affording a precedent for the suggestion of making the landlord solely responsible as in the last resort the tenant remains liable. But it affords support to the practice in all towns of the size of St. John's of collecting municipal taxes direct from the tenant where his rental is more than \$40 a year.

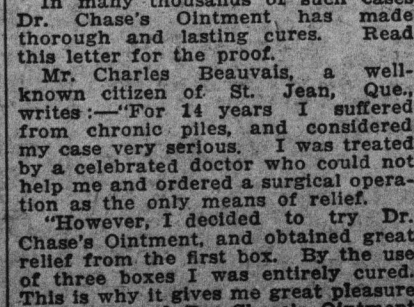

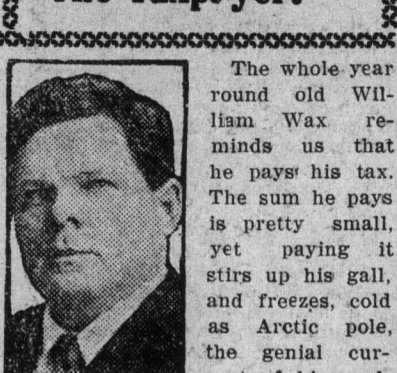

### Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, April 25.

The spoils of war taken by the Montenegrins when they entered Scutari, included 46 quick-firing cannons, and 12 howitzers, with a number of heavy siege guns.

**CARDIFF**, April 25. "Votes for Women" were the words painted on a bomb found this morning by a patrolman on the doorstep of Lloyd's Bank, in this city. The fuse was burning when discovered. It was pluckily seized and extinguished by a policeman.

**HAMBURG**, April 25. Two men are dead and three are dying out of eight workmen, who were injured in an explosion of benzine last night, on the new Hamburg-American liner Imperator. The accident was caused by a workman filling his pocket cigar-lighter from the benzine tank. Two thousand workmen were aboard, completing the cabins in readiness for the trial trip, in which the Crown Prince is to take part.

**PITTSBURG**, April 25. The rescue parties at the Cincinnati mine have brought thirty-three additional bodies to the north slope. Ten other names have been added to the missing list. The loss is officially placed at 115. The bodies were found buried under a fallen roof. It is thought that all the bodies will be recovered later, and will be found under masses of fallen rock. It may, therefore, be several days before the exact loss can be determined.

**BERLIN**, April 25. "Owing to the illfeeling aroused in France, recently, by the landing of German air-craft, officers of the German active army were notified to-day by the War Office, that they are forbidden to participate in future private flights or competitions, involving any possibility of crossing the foreign frontier. Major Abercorn and Lieut. Voight are compelled therefore, to withdraw from the German elimination contest for the selection of representatives at the Gordon-Bennett trophy contest, to be held in France in the Fall.

**WASHINGTON**, April 25. British Ambassador Bryce to-day laid down the office which he has held for more than six years, and left for New York on the homeward voyage. To-night in New York he will say farewell to the United States at a dinner of the Pilgrims' Society, and on Monday will meet his successor, Sir Cecil Spring Rice, who is now on his voyage across the ocean. Mr. and Mrs. Bryce go overland to San Francisco to sail to Yokohama on May 3rd touching Honolulu. They will spend some time in the new Chinese Republic, and then proceed to London by way of the Siberian railway.

**LONDON**, April 25. The suffragettes' reason for threatening to blow up the residence of Mr. Blair, M.P., near Harrow, is, according to the Standard, because he defeated Mr. Lansbury, the suffragette advocate, at the bye-election in Bromley division last November. They tried to hold a meeting at Harrow last night, amid great disorder. The speakers could not be heard. Pepper, snuff and chemicals were scattered through the hall, and the police had all they could do to protect the women, when they departed. The suffragettes made an attempt to wreck the Northumberland County office at Newcastle-on-Tyne last night by means of a bomb. The damage done was small, but the caretaker had a narrow escape.

**BRUSSELS**, April 25. It is estimated that over half of the Belgian workers, who took part in the strike for equal suffrage, have now returned to their employment, but resumption has been irregular in some parts of the country. Some of the Trade unions have decided to order the men to begin to-day; others to-morrow, and others on Monday, while a few are determined to stay out till May 1st. Disagreeable surprises met the strikers at several factories in the suburbs of Brussels. When they appeared at the factory gates this morning, ready to recommence work, all the old employees were refused admission, and were told they were discharged.

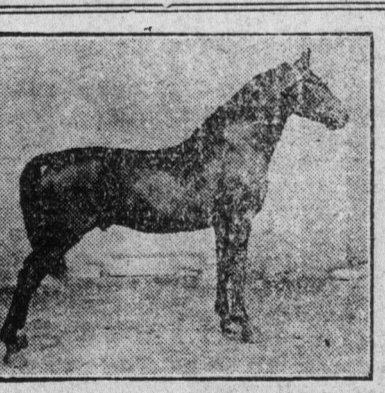



### The Kite Back.

#### SMALLEST CREW ON RECORD.

The s.s. Kite, Capt. Yetman, after having a most unique experience, arrived at the seal fishery at ten this morning, hauling for 1,300 bedlamers, the weight of 2,500 young hump seals. It will be remembered the Kite left here on the first of February for Groasis Islands, as it was originally intended for her to get her crew at that place and proceed to the northern flocks to hunt the whitecoats on March 10th. However, this plan did not work out as owing to the heavy ice encountered north the vessel could not get beyond Bonavista. Several vigorous attempts at "butting" resulted in her being frozen in. After giving up the idea of reaching Groasis Islands, Capt. Yetman decided to visit some of the nearby northern ports to get a sealing crew, as at that time he only had eleven men on deck and the voyage would soon open. The Kite called at Seldom Come By, Trinity and Catalina, but only six men could be secured and these were signed on, making 17 hands all told. With this complement of men, the smallest in the history of the seal fishery, the Kite set sail for the icefields. Good progress was made, the ice having loosened up and the ship got down off the Funks on March 12th. The next morning the steel fleet was met and the Kite kept in the wake of the Sagona. When the bigger ships struck the first patch of seals the Kite was in the distance jammed tightly in the floe and had been cut out might have got a full load in the early part of the spring. It was only when a storm came on, causing the ice to break up that the craft freed herself. By that time all the young humps had taken to the water. Capt. Yetman then shaped his course for the N.E. and for three days work slaughtered over a thousand bedlamers. Another patch of old seals were struck a week ago and two hundred were secured out of it. When she arrived the Kite had 35 sealers, her former crew being augmented by boys who had stowed away in the steel ships and were transferred to the Kite and signed on at the icefield. Capt. Yetman reports seeing the Diana and Erik recently. Both will have saving trips. The Kite's crew will make about \$20 per man.

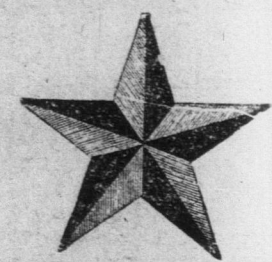

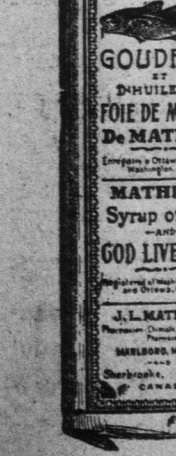

### Section Men for Highways.

To Keep in Order Portions of Road Placed in their Charge.

Hon. Mr. Armstrong, commissioner of works and mines, brought down in the House of Assembly yesterday afternoon a bill for its second reading which has for its object the appointment of patrolmen or section men for the public highways. The duties of these men will be to maintain and keep in order the section of road which may be placed in their charge, the government, providing them with the necessary tools. Their work will be surface work, the cleaning of rocks from the roadway, the filling in of cuts and holes, the attention to culverts and bridges, and all work that may through the action of nature be undone.

In short the appointment of these men is a recognition that no work under the climate conditions and the wear and tear upon the roads, can be permanent, and patrol men will be provided to keep mile by mile, these roads in condition.

On the principle that "a stitch in time saves nine," these patrols will be employed to remedy all defects in the roads which through neglect would develop more serious trouble and greater expense.

Mr. Tanner offered some criticism and was answered effectively by the resourceful Dr. Bissett. Said the doctor: "There may come a day when those who now criticize may have the responsibility." (Hear, hear, from the Tory benches.)

"Yes," continued Dr. Bissett, "evil days come to every country, and history has told of lands being scourged with grasshoppers."

In the evening, the debate on the Douglas Crown Lands resolution was continued and finished. Mr. F. J. Logan made a brief speech replete with facts, figures and logic, which sharply called the attention of the House to the reckless and inaccurate statements of the Opposition. He was followed by Dr. Bissett, who with his usual eloquence and caustic wit gave the Opposition "a hoist with its own petard" by giving a history of the Crown Land Office under Tory management between 1878 and 1882.—N. S. Recorder.

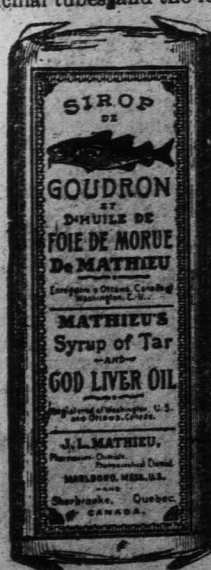

**LONDON, April 25.**  
Knox, the engineer, whose conviction on a charge of drunkenness, caused the recent great strike on the North Eastern Railway, has received a free pardon from the King.

**TORONTO, April 25.**

**MADRID, April 25.**  
A decree ordering the continuance of obligatory teaching of Christianity in Spanish public schools, excepting the children of non-Catholics from compulsion, was signed to-day by King Alfonso.

**BERLIN, April 25.**  
The risk of rejection by the Imperial Parliament of an appropriation of \$2,500,000 to build a new yacht for Emperor William, is so great that an urgent summons has been sent to all loyal deputies to be present in force when the matter comes up for deliberation. The Socialists, it is understood, intend to demand a roll call on the third reading, when the Poles, Danes, Alsatiens and many Southern German members of the Clerical and Central parties have announced their intention to vote against the expenditure.

**LONDON, April 25.**  
Postmaster General Samuel, presenting the Post Office Budget in the Commons, declared himself in favor of universal penny postage, which, he said, would cost £500,000 yearly. The loss through penny postage between England and the States for the first year, he said, was £136,000. It was now reduced to £123,000. No development was more remarkable than the increased use of the overseas cables since the reduction of rates. A new loaded telephone cable, the longest in the world, was being laid from England to Belgium. The Post Office was communicating with the German Post Office with a view to the establishment of telephonic communication between them.

### Memorial

**Of the Fishermen of the West Coast of Newfoundland, to the Fish Buying Merchants of Halifax, N.S.**

The fishermen of the West Coast of Newfoundland have decided that if the herring fishery is to be and continue a remunerative employment for them, a drastic change must be made in the regulations governing the fishery, and the methods employed in the pack. They have therefore decided to ask the Newfoundland Government, to, by Minute of Council Order:

1st.—That every fisherman engaged in catching and curing herring must first obtain a license from the Government.

2nd.—That these licenses be numbered and that the license No., the place of origin and the grade if possible, be stamped indelibly on each barrel.

This will place the responsibility for badly cured fish, where it naturally belongs, viz., on the fisherman responsible for the bad pack.

The fishermen are aware, that, granted a good pack, if the package in which the fish are put up is not sound, the care of the packer is in vain and his labor is wasted; they have therefore decided to begin the improvement of the pack by improving the package.

Notwithstanding all this, the West Coast fishermen realize that, unless the Merchants who market our herring are willing to co-operate by giving proper care to the fish after they reach their hands, most of our labor will be vain and we shall not obtain the results for which we strive.

It is a well known fact, that some of our herring leave Newfoundland in No. 1 shape, but, after having lain

for some months in store in Halifax, reach the West India market in anything but good condition. Some of this may be caused by rough handling in placing the barrels in, or removing them from bulk; hoops become started, the package starts leaking and if not attended to, its contents must certainly be spoiled.

Large quantities of our herring reach Halifax in the intense heat of July. They are dumped on the wharves and often remain there, exposed to the blazing sun, for fortnights and sometimes for months.

This is enough to cook the fish in the barrels and is certainly a practice which can not be too severely condemned.

The West Coast Newfoundland herring packers therefore submit, that it is not enough, that the package and the cure be good, an important point still remains, this is the care which should be taken of the catch after it has reached the fish dealers' hands.

AND WHEREAS, in the past much damage to the quality of the pack has been caused by the handling they receive while in the hands of the Halifax Merchants.


BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that a printed or typewritten copy of

### When The Dumb Speak.

Cases of Rapid Recovery After the Doctors Had Given Up.

The recent case of Miss Lily Curd, of Ashford, Kent, who after being deaf and dumb for twenty-one years, is slowly recovering both hearing and speech—the shock of the tragic end of her brother, who drowned himself in the Stour, being regarded as responsible for the miraculous recovery—is by no means an isolated example of shock succeeding where doctors have failed.

Some time ago the narrow escape of a boy from drowning off North Shields Fish Quay had a remarkable sequel. While efforts were being made to restore the apparently drowned boy to consciousness by means of artificial respiration, a man named Thomas Cummings, who had been deprived of speech two years earlier, as the result of an accident, pushed through the crowd merely out of curiosity. As soon as he saw the prostrate boy, although not in any way related to him, the sight gave him such a shock that his speech suddenly returned, and he fell to the ground in a state of collapse. Upon recovering he continued to speak freely, and has suffered no further impediment since.

One of the most amazing cases was that of Walter Speck, a resident of Gloucester (Eng.), who eight years ago lost his power of speech through the shock occasioned by the death of his father. For several weeks his wife was only able to understand him

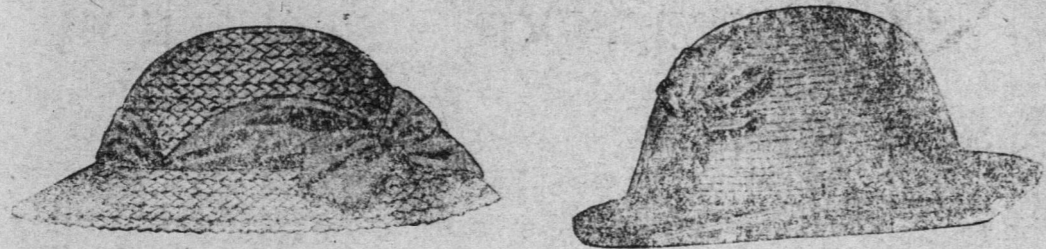

## A. & S. RODGER

### Clean Up Day.

Councillor Coaker who inaugurated this movement, announced at yesterday's meeting of the City Fathers that it was decided to hold "clean up" day on May 10th. It is earnestly hoped that citizens and the public generally will, as in former seasons show their hearty co-operation and support in order that the work may be carried to a successful issue this year. It is desired that all rubbish be picked up from the back yards be placed outside the doors in receptacles for removal. This would facilitate the work considerably and aid the sanitary men to a large extent.

### At the City Hall.

Mayor Ellis presided and the full Board sat at the Municipal Council's meeting yesterday.

The Council could do nothing in the complaint of John Fleet, Long's Hill, who is bothered with clothes drying on lines opposite his windows.

Thomas Stamp, Capt. Carroll, James Ryan and P. Kennedy were permitted to repair their houses, and P. Devereaux to build annex to his house, Pleasant Street.

The Engineer will enquire into the complaint of Charles Bowden as to the condition of uninhabited houses on Lime Street.

Mayor Ellis informed the Council that it would cost \$2,000 to furnish sewer to Summer and McNeil Streets.

The Engineer will make a full report on the matter.

Mayor Ellis reported that he had conferred with the Premier as to dredging above Job's Bridge. It was hoped to dock the Calypso there, and the change would bring a revenue of \$1,200 per year to the Council. The idea was looked upon favourably by the Board.

The report of the Engineer being read, on motion of Councillor Mullaly in future copies will be given Councillors at meetings and also the press.

### COLLECTION OF ARREARS.

The Mayor referred to the criticism of the News as regards the collection of arrears of taxes, and held that it was the result of ignorance of the facts of the case. He admitted that about \$90,000 was due the Council but not in the sense that had been assumed by critics in the press and on the street, city lawyers and agencies are collecting \$27,000 from 587 debtors and in amounts of less than \$40 there were over \$50,000 due. Some of these amounts were due for 20 years or more and were not collectable. He would not subscribe to the contention that water be cut off from delinquents, nor had the Council such power, as the Government refused it when it was asked for two years ago. He thought the present Board as competent and capable as any other elected by the city in the past.

Councillor Martin was not in favor of having the water shut off. He would like to see some good system adopted whereby the taxes could be collected, but he would not like to see the poor man's property seized as in other cities. He was of the opinion the Daily News was right in its criticisms. He would not be a party to making a direct tax on the landlord. It was frequently hard to collect rent from tenants and it would, therefore, be an injustice to tax the landlord.

Councillor Mullaly said that no previous Council were criticized as much as the present one. There is too much adverse criticism, he continued of the doings of this Council. The cause of the criticism was the publicity of the work. He agreed with Council Martin that a better system of collecting be adopted but was not in accord with shutting off the water if the delinquents did not pay up.

Councillor Martin suggested that all taxes overdue be wiped off the books; also that a system be inaugurated to give a discount to persons paying their taxes when due. Some cross-firing between Councillors Myrick, Martin and Mullaly closed the debate. The condition of the place near Linscott's sewer, off Merrymeeting Road, is very bad, there being numerous heaps of excrement around. This should be removed before the warm weather sets in.

Councillor Rayn drew the attention of the Engineer to the frightfully bad condition of Belvidere Street. Will be attended to.

The Engineer's report being read showed that excellent work was done during the past week, including the opening up of sewers in the following thoroughfares—Pilot's Hill, Signal Hill, Southside Road and Merrymeeting Road. The construction of this latter sewer is a great necessity to the people living in that neighbourhood.

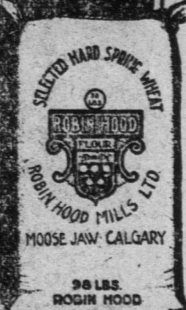
