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

A new salient has been formed from Arras to Gommecourt, which, while not dangerous to the Germans through the cross fire of the British guns, will be a perilous handicap for them when the inevitable retreat begins. Note, too, that an advance is recorded east of Boucha-vesnes, not merely further endangering Peronne but eating into the flank of the new German line prepared be-hind Bapaume. This sort of thing cannot go on for long, a fact the Germans seem to realise from their increasing

The apology for their recent large retirement which was issued on Sat-urday from Berlin is the most absurd sophistry. The British, it seems,, are really the losers by advancing into battered and mud-filled trenches. We fancy they will be quite content with such a loss. They expected to find them battered: the more so the better, since it encourages them to think of the battering that is going on in the next line. As for the muddy state of the ground, it is the greatest tribute to the British guns that could be desired, behind whose tremendous fire the infantry is able to advance unimpeded by the clinging mud through which it has to wade. And the mud will soon be an unknown factor in any case, But the whole excuse is thin and need not be taken seriously. and need not be taken seriously. Doubtless the retreat was strategic; the same might be claimed for a retirement to the Rhine itself. It is always good strategy to run away when standing still means being killed. And dhat was what the retention of the old German line meant once the British had taken Serre and Miraumont. We shall shortly see a strategic abandon-also. Mr. Dominic Richards, General Morris Arm, uncle of the shall shortly see a strategic abandonment of Bapaume. If our memory serves us, there was a strategic re-treat after the battle of the Marne. It is a strange feature of this war that no one speaks of strategy until a re-

no one speaks of strategy until a retirement has to be made, when it is always called into play, and when it is the monoply of the retiring ones. There is no strategy in advancing.

The news of the Russian activity in Persia is of great importance. Though they are widely separated, the British and the Russian forces can now cooperate with telling effect. Indeed their separation is of positive value in preventing a concentration of the Turks. Either the latter in Persia are reduced in numbers or the Russians augmented—possibly both—for Hamadan to fall so easily, and the defence of Bagdad will be distracted into two directions. We may confidently fence of Bagdad will be distracted into two directions. We may confidently look now for renewed activity in Armenia, where the Russians will be able to achieve much merely by keeping more Turks busy. The empire, huge in extent, but defended by a limited garrison, would then be attacked by large forces at four distinct points, with cumulative chances of success at any one of them. 

Newfoundland Agricultural Board.

BULLETIN!

CRSEEING A GREAT NECESSITY FOR INCREASED HOME PRODUCTION OF POTATOES, and with the view of lessening the consumption of high-priced flour, the Agricultural Board in 1915, urged upon Agricultural Societies and all interested, the necessity for planting as largely as possible in the following spring, and the result of its appeal has been very satisfactory. In the year past an increased acreage was planted, and the country has been blessed with the largest and best potato crop in its history. The value of this crop to the country has been very great, especially as the Canadian and American crops have been poor, and importation will thus be impossible.

The Board would be lacking in its duty if it failed to again warn of the more serious conditions that now threaten to develop with the coming of Spring, and that will affect our food supply. Owing to our insular position the inhuman methods of warfare employed by our enemies may make it impossible for us to import flour and other food stuffs in sufficient quantity for our needs, and as a shortage would entail serious consequences, it becomes the duty of every one of us to do his utmost to help increase home grown vegetables and forage crops.

Potatoes in plenty can save us from the worst effects of a flour shortage; and a generous supply of other vegetables will add largely to their value. Hay and Oats are bulky articles to import, but to ensure our local supply of fresh meats and milk and margarine we must have them. Our crops of all these products can be largely increased. From our present acreage we can get, by increased cultivation, all that will be required to carry us safely through the threatened time of trial. A determined effort to utilize to the utmost the land that practically every family outside of St. John's possesses in sufficient quantity should be made.

The Agricultural Societies throughout the country have well and wisely responded to the suggestion of the Board in the year past, and their sense of duty to their localities and the country will point to them the need for even greater effort the coming year.

Every man and every woman can help and those who plant but a gallon of potatoes will be public benefactors and practical helpers in the common cause.

Between now and Spring therefore let everyone who can do so, provide himself with the quantity of potatoes or other seeds that he can arrange to plant, and with the aid of a kindly Providence we shall reap such a measure of reward as will enable us to come safely through the time of stress that our enemies are preparing for us.



Hunting the U-Boats.

Rear Adimral William S. Sims recently appeared before the House ommittee on Naval Affairs. He spoke regarding submarines as follows: I do not know whether you gentle-

ment know how dangerous a sufficient number of natrol vessels can make it for submarines. To give you an idea of what the thing means, let me say this: Suppose this table is the English Channel. The channel is divided into sectors, and each 'sector is in mand of an officer, with a sort of central control for the whole business They protect the channel against sub marines. The Channel is regularly patrolled, and that patrol is kept at work all the time. The chances for a bmarine to get through that patrol are very small. Suppose, for instance, a submarine was sighted here (illustrating). As soon as the natrolling vessel sees the submarine she has to go down. The commander of the patrolling vessel immediately sends out a wireless saying the submarine was at such and such a point at such a time, say six o'clock in the morning. By seven the submarine will be in that area (illustrating), and by eight

(illustrating.) The commander of the flotilla at this point (illustrating) will start out his flotilla from this point (illustrating) and deploy on a line from there to there (illustrating) by eight o'clock. and if the submarine is there it will be seen. An official report to-day said that of the twenty-three vessels tied up in the islands all but three had been inspected, and none had been found which could be put into condition without a large expenditure of time and money.
