

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



RECORD OF MILITARY SERVICE. The bestowal by H. M. the King of the prefix "Royal" on the Newfoundland Regiment, in recognition of its services in Gallipoli, France, and Flanders, has given the greatest satisfaction throughout the Colony. The distinction is one of which the regiment may well be proud, and may justly be regarded as a well-earned loyal sacrifice. The following figures, dealing with Newfoundland's manpower contribution to the War, have recently been compiled, and are of considerable interest. They cover the period from the outbreak of hostiliments in the Newfoundland Regiment Naval Reserve 1.807, while 446 joined the Colony's Forestry Battalion. total of 6,448 is decidedly creditable in view of the fact that the entire popplation numbers only 250,000, and that seven-eighths of these are fisher-folk. The regiment was engaged in four critical encounters on the Western Front-namely, at Beaumont Hamel and Gueudecourt, in 1916, and at Monchy Le Preux and Cambrai last year. those reported as "missing-probably
