Club was very largely attended; Mr. Wood, 1st V.P. occupied the chair, His Excellency the Governor was present at the meeting, accompanied. by Hon. R. Watson, A.D.C., and was received by the singing of the National Anthem. Mr. Wood said he regretted the absence of Rev. Dr. Jones, who had been unable to attend owing. to a long-standing engagement elsewhere. In introducing the subject, "David, the great Chorister and Choirs that kill congregations," he outlined in general, the characteristics of David, his courage, shrewdness, statesmanship and practical abilities, and showed that he prospered in himself because he was in touch with God. His Excellency, after a few preparatory remarks, stated that he could find no definition of a chorister that would apply to David. He pointed out that David was always exceedingly tactful, but it was an anachronism to say he was a chorister, for a chorister is a part of a number of trained musicians for some purpose, and David was not such, although he was certainly a musician and poet of great ability, as instanced in his lament over the death of Saul and Jonathan, which is truly a most magnificent dirge. Then taking the Psalms, about sixty of which are attributed to David, His Excellency showed how they were an oratorio in five acts. (1) Psalms 1-41. Decline of man; (2) Psalms 41-72. Revival of Church; (3) Psalms 72-89. Church in Danger; (4) Psalms 89-140. Antiphonal; (5) The last five Psalms are a Thanksgiving. He also pointed out that a great deal of Hebrew parallelism as well as poetical expression is contained in the Psalms, and also stated that the prayer-book version of the Psalms is better adapted to music than the Biblical version. This prayer-book version, said His Excellency, is that translated by Tyndall and Coverdale in 1535 and left untouched by Cranmer in 1539. because he saw it was exceedingly good and adaptable for music. He believed that as the Psalm writers were inspired, so were the translators also inspired. The Governor then took Psalms 107 and 118, dividing them into stanzas showing how they ought to be sung. Taking the second phase of his subject, His Excellency asserted that congregational singing was the best idea to aim at, for while he did not wish to detract from the choir and organ, yet listening to congregational was not the same as listening to professional singing. The spirit of congregational singing is
