





Why Navy Blue? Practically every country clothes



But when they do come down, judg ing from information which has reached The News during the last day or two, they will give the deluded people who expected "reform" a jolt that will be staggering. ## Why is the Sky Blue?

Not one person in a hundred could give a satisfactory answer to the

And yet the explanation, as given by Professor W. H. Bragg, at the Royal Institution, is quite simple.

The blue sky, he explained, is due to the interception by particles in the atmosphere of the blue rays which form a part of the white light of the sun. The parts of white light conveyed by longer red and yellow Hight waves manage to jump the many substances in the atmosphere and are seen at sunrise and sunset.

The professor illustrated his meaning by showing a disc of light on the screen which, passing through a bowl of water, became gradually redder as the water got cloudier, till at last, after an imitation of the sun in a November fog, it faded away.

Professor Bragg has also revealed some of the mysteries of sound. If you put a stick in a revolving bowl of water, it sets up little whirlpools behind it. In the same way, the wind rushing past trees forms whirlwinds on a small scale, and these cause those sounds so admirably described by the imitative word "soughing." Similar sounds are set up by telegraph wires.

Why is it that fishes make no disturbance when swimming through the water, although there is a rushing noise when a stone is flung in?

This is explained by the fact that, in the latter case, it is the filling of the cavity that is made, rather than the mere impact, which causes the noise, whereas the body of the fish is so shaped that when it moves through the water it leaves no such cavity behind it and therefore there is no dis-

## LONDON GOSSIP.

LONDON, May 3, 1920. When the Prince of Wales leaves for India next autumn, the suite to accompany him will be considerably larger than the one that is now with him in New Zealand, and will for the first time include a lord-in-waiting who, in all probability, will be the Earl of Cromer. The Senior representative of the India Office detailed to travel with his Royal Highness is expected to be Sir J. R. Dunlop Smith, the political aide-de-camp at the India Office. The Renown is to be thoroughly examined after she brings the Prince home from Australia, and, if it is proposed to dock her, then the Malaya will probably be substituted year. The result is that many of the richest men are deliberately living on their capital. A man with capital of, perhaps, \$2,500,000 now keeps possibly \$500,000 invested in this country, which at 10 per cent. brings him in \$50,000 a year. Roughly half of this is taken by the income tax authorities, leaving him a net \$25,000 a for current expenses over the next five years which gives him without interest \$100,000 a year. The remaining \$1,500,000 he invests abroad in rubber estates, tea or tobacco plantations, which take five years to develop, pay no dividend during that period, but at the end have doubled in value. He will then withdraw his capital, by this time \$3,000,000, retain \$500,000 or \$1,000,000 to live upon and again invest the remainder in the same way. No income tax is payable upon it.

DISCHARGED SOLDIERS IN IRE-

In two questions in the House of Commons this week addressed to the Prime Minister, Captain Cooper referred to "the lamentable position of ex-service men in Ireland." asked that the Civil Liabilities Department should be specially authorised to set the men up in business of their own. and suggested that they are boycotted by employers who dare not give them work, that the employment dole is not enough to live on even when the right to it is not already exhausted, and that there is great danger of their becoming demoralised and seditions. I understand that the facts alleged are these. There are 187,000 discharged soldiers out of work in Ireland. A deputation from them inter viewed the Civil Liabilities Department a day or two ago. ### Steamship Bars Do Rushing Business.

New York, June 3.-They that go down to the sea in ships these days see greater wonders than ever on the deep. This is the testimony of seawise mariners who have piloted liners over the Atlantic and back for many years. Since a major portion of the North American continent went dry the lure of the sea has grown more alluring than ever, and the fauna and flora of the ocean have been added to with many specimens surpassing per-war imagination.

Captains of ships have a simple explanation for the undoubted fact that passengers from this side of the pond now do more drinking at sea than they ever did before. The explanation

"When they leave a dry country, going Europe-ward, they drink because they are so glad to be away from prohibition. When they are coming back to America from less arid lands, they drink because they are once more approaching the desert. Like the camel, they desire to store moisture away in their humps."

Since the United States went dry by constitutional amendment, many and various schemes have been proposed to beat the prohibition laws. Some visionaries have dreamed of purchasing an island well out beyond the three mile limit, and establishing there a heavenly basis where the bar would never close and sumptuary laws would never be known. Others thought of a wonderful yacht, stocked with the juice of the grape and the corn. that would cruise and cruise, and nevor make port except to replenish. The more practical minded did not stop to dream, but, if they had the price, purchased a steamship ticket. The boats to Cuba are crowded, and so are those to Europe. On every vessel the bar steward is overworked.

Prohibition should be favored by the stemship companies. In one week 14,000 persons left New York recently for voyages. One large British liner reported the other day that its bar receipts on one crossing were \$5,025, a record. Ships officers say that men who travelled dry before now take a drink, while travellers who took a drink in the old days now take three or four. This they describe as the "psychology of prohibition."

Of course, the three mile limit has to be observed, more or less, But the ship's log, if it were asked, might tell that the thirst of the parched passenger from this side is no respecter of the 18th Amendment. Long before the bar opens there is a line watting. Some of the more thirsty make the smoke room their headquarters during the voyage lest they miss something. Men who once imbibed a solitary cocktail before dinner now miss the dinner and specialize on liquids. Instances are not rare where the visible supply of drinkables has been exhausted before the voyage ended, this resulting in scenes of infinite pathos.
