



OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 21.—(Canadian 1st annual convention of the Trades and Labor Congress in Ottawa during the first week of next month. The eight-hour day is at present exries, but by agreement rather than of the Paris peace conference, labor principles were incorporated in the peace treaty recognizing the eighthour day or a a 48-hour week as the standard to be aimed at."

Subsequently, at the international abor conference held at Washington under the auspices of the League of Nations, a draft convention was adopted providing for an eight-hour day in industry. In that convention representatives of the Canadian Govrnment of the day concurred.

Now, under the League of Nations Covenant, members of the League are perely required to submit the conentions to competent legislative authority for such action as may be leemed necessary to give them effect. And, which is the competent authority in Canada? It is the Dominion Parliament or the legislatures of the different provinces?

Question Up To Provinces, Dominion law officers held that the eight-hour day was a question for provincial and not Dominion legislative action and the convention went over to the nine different provincial governments. Only one, British Columbia, took any action and its action was contingent on the rest of the Dominion following suit. For all practical purposes, therefore, the situation remained as before.

Almost every farmer in Western Canada to-day has at least a few pigs, cows or poultry and some sort of a vegetable garden from which he secures food not only for himself and family but also sufficient returns to look after his current expenses on a cash basis. Manitoba and Alberta undoubtedly lead in this development but even Saskatchewan, the great wheat mining province of the west, has an ever-increasing number of farmers who are followers of the mixed farming plan to the extent that they are living upon the products of their farms.

There are of course some exceptional areas and some farmers who still cling to the belief that straight grain farming is the one profitable nethod of farming in Saskatchewan and so far as they have in their minds as an alternative a system of extensive mixed farming there is some justification for their attitude, because of the fact that carrying charges and distances from a suitable market greatly reduce their chances of marketing any other product than wheat with profit to themselves.

From observations made there appears, however, to be no excuse for any wheat farmer not having sufficient live stock and a large enough vegetable garden to enable him to exist even in the face of repeated crop failures. The fact that this is recognized by most of the western farmers has produced a change which i is exceedingly beneficial to Western

This change is shown mainly through the fact that a larger percentage of the small country stores are finding it possible to cut down heir extension of credit and secure cash for their products. Further investigation also reveals that almost every branch of trade has felt the good effect of doing a larger cash business while it appears that the number of applications for the usual 'tiding over till the crop is cut" loans have been materially reduced.
