LATEST PARTICULARS.

London, March 8. Mr. J. H. Breathwick, of this city, one of the vicins of the late railway disaster, dieid to-day from the effects of numerous burns and having inhaled hot air. His remains and those of his niece, Miss Scarcliff, who was among those burned to death, will be interred here to-morrow. The remains of Miss Purvis were buried here this afternoon. All the wounded in the city are doing as well as could be expected, and, with the exception of Mr. Robinson, of Nat-ford, are considered out of danger. Telegrams from Petrolia report Miss Lawrence much worse to-day, and it is feared she has been burned inwardly. Mr. Hay, who is still at Komoka, is too seriously injured to bear removal, and shows no sign of improvement. All the others there, as well as in Strathroy and Petrolia, are recovering. Strathroy, March 3.—The funeral of Mr. J. A. McKellar took place from the residence of his brother, the Reve of Lobo, to-day. It is now thought that the fate of all London, March 8.

A private Bill relating to this Com-pany is now before Parliament, and contains two clauses of interest to the people of this county. Section two of the Bill makes legal, valid, and binding the bonus by-laws passed by the counties of Wellington, Waerloo, and Oxford. Section three legalizes in like manner the agree-ment entered into by the Company with the County of Wellington, to expend the proceeds of the deben-tures of the County on work done in the construction of the railway from the junction point near Bell-fountain, or the forks of the river Credit, and Elora or Salem, and be-tween Alton and Orangeville, pro rata per mile over the whole mile of the said lines between the said respective points on the certificate of the chief engineer the chief engineer, in the manner provided for in the act of incorporation of the company, and providing that no portion of the proceeds of the said debentures shall be paid out by the trustees for the construction of any other portion of the railway, or for any other purpose whatsoever.

The passing of this Act will do away with one of the strongest ob-jections we had to the granting of the Credit Valley bonus, namely, that there was no security that the bonus would be spent upon the construc-tion of the railway within the limits of the County. We are glad to see of the County. 





Report of the Government Commission

Report of the Government Commission. The report of the Commission ap-pointed by the Government to inquire and report with reference to the man-near Guelph, has been published. There are also directions for the government of the Farm, the num-ber of principal and subortinate offi-ders are stated, and their duties speci-fied. 




