LIMA, Peru, July 26-The Peruvian forces in the interior have continued active operations against the Chilian troops. While small bodies of Peraylans have operated against the lines of communication between Lima and garrisons in the hill country, large detachments have directly assailed the garrisous. A company of the Santiago regiment holding the little town of Marcayaya were attacked by 300 Peruvians, aided by a large force of Indians, who were only repulsed by the opportune arrival of reinforcements from Huancayo. The Chilians lost 19 killed out of 60, and the Peruvian loss was much heavier. On the 9th instant the Chilian garrison of Conception, numbering 77 men, were attacked by a Peruvian force four times their number and after a desperate fight of twenty hours were compelled to make a sortic from the barracks, which had been set on fire, and were almost annihilated by their assailants, but two escaping. The loss of the Peruvians and their Indian allies was severe. When the Chilian division under Col. Carto arrived, the bodies of the brave defenders were found heaped up in the plaza. 
