## STRENGTH OF FENIANISM

SUDDEN ALARM AT WINDSOR CASTLE

LONDON, April 23.—The Times says the government has obtained information in recent inquiries that the enrolled membership of the Fenian organization in the United Kingdom numbers 150,000, and there are besides distinct elements of fanaticism, such as the vigilantes and inviolables, Kingston, who was arrested in Liverpool, belongs to both of these branches. Such double membership is unusual. There is besides a secret society affiliated with the American dynamite party. The paper has accurate information regarding the movements of the Fenians, and the extent of their operations, and it is believed that the Fenian relations will be broken up.

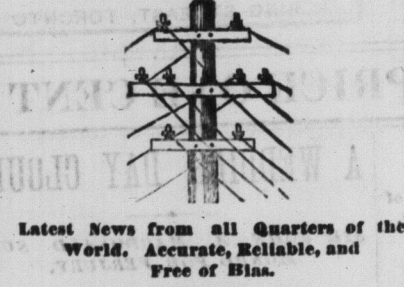
