Hydro-Electric Radial Meeting

Bills have been issued by the town council calling a public meeting in the Lyceum on Friday evening at 8 o'clock, to hear hydro-electric power and radial lines discussed. The speakers engaged lines discussed. The speakers engaged for this meeting are Mr. R. Lyons, of Guelph, Mayor Graham, of London, and Mayor Stirrett, of Petrolea. Reeve Stapleford will preside. The meeting is open to all, and farmers from the surrounding district are particularly requested to be present.

Another object of the meeting is to consider the appointment of a large

consider the appointment of a large deputation to go to Ottawa with the joint deputation of the Waterways Union and the Radial Railways Unions on March 26th, to demand the usual railway subsidies of \$6,400 per mile for Hydro-Elec-tric railways to be built by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission. The Statutes of Ontario 1913, chap. 38,

provides for the construction of hydro-electric lines by the Power Commission, and also provides that the Commission may inquire into the feasibility and practicability of a line and report on the same with probable cost, maintenance and operation and probable revenue.

Applications from these railways are Applications from these railways are pouring in from all portions of the province, and if it is deemed desirable to have one for this particular section the people must be up and doing. It is claimed that farmers can use electric power taken from the wires along these lines up to eight miles on each side of the line.

It is believed that electric railways under this Act will become general throughout Ontario, greatly reducing the price of power in cities and towns and in farming districts along the line, also furnishing the cheapest and most useful transportation and greatly in-

useful transportation and greatly increasing the value of the land.

Cow Testing Pays

Dominion Department of Agriculture Dairy Branch

There can be no question as to the bright light shed by dairy records on the actual performance of herds and of individual cows. They are useful alike in proving the superiority of certain cows as well as the effect of good dairy practice.

For instance, records show that in one month a seven year old cow gave 1,430 pounds of milk, but another seven year old in the same herd gave only 400 pounds. Again it is found that 22 cows averaged 1,197 pounds of milk in a month, while another lot of 22 averaged only 545 pounds of milk. Cows that are kept as dairy cows, fed and bred for production of milk and fat, are proved by their records. Even from amongst those so kept, selection is necessary, otherwise the herd will fall off in its average. But the individual record, so easily kept, will point definitely to those which are



herds. One herd of 14 cows gave 306 pounds of fat in a month. In an adjoining herd of 14, where cow testing has been carried on for four years and where the sire is pure bred, the yield was 556 pounds of fat, in

other words the income was seventy five dollars more for that one month Be sure you take up cow testing this year because it pays well.

Men and women, married and single boys and girls, get things to gratify their unchecked desires, and bother little about the whence of the money with which they are to be paid Duebills, judgment summons, garnisheed wages, follow on with monotonous regularity. Cash is paid on luxuries, pleasures and entertainment,-where no credit is given,while unpaid debts of long standing are passed unheeded. New York Physician Rises To Detend Water Drinking

By Dr. W. F. Varcoe, of New York. Dr. Gagey, the French specialist in appendicitis, is quoted in this paper as asserting that almost all of his appendicitis patients were water drinkers, from which he deduces the theory that wine is a safer beyrage than water.

My observation has led me to believe, on the contrary, that free water drinkers seldom if ever have appendicits. Most of those afflicted with that disease have not

seldom if ever have appendicitis. Most of those afflicted with that disease have not drunk enough water, but too much wine, beer and whiskey.

Pure water, or distilled water well aerated is certainly better than wine, especially the cheap wines of artificial manufacture, which are very injurious to the system. Constipation is the most frequent cause of appendicitis, and one or two glasses of water before returing and one-half hot before breakfast will cure many cases of that torpid condition.

Water gives an internal bath; it dilutes the fluids in which the cells of the body are bathed; it increases assimilation, metabolism and disintegration; it is the medium by which nutritive material is conveyed to the tissues and water matter conveyed out of the body.

The kidneys and other secreting and excreting glands and organs perform their functions much better when water is used freely. Thirdly, it lets plenty of alr down to the roots of the plants, which is necessary for satisfactory growth. Pourthly, it makes the soil more porous, and this in turn causes the soil to store up more water for the use of the crops in time of drouth.

Frequently the increase of crop in one year pays for the drainage, and seldom, or never does it take longer than three years, so that drainage pays from 33 per cent to 100 per cent per annum on the money invested.
