The object being mainly to wash the alimentary canal, carrying down the slime, yeast and bile through normal channels, a few ounces can have but little effect in accomplishing another suits. It is assumed that the liver and kidneys are greatly influenced by the hot water treatment, and that they are washed as well as the intestinal canal, the bile being eliminated through the brood by way of the kidneys.

The best time to use hot water is probably about one bour before meals, and in some instances, half an hour before retiring to bed.
