Harold, the Saxon King, did much to fortify and strengthen the gates, the walls and the castle of Hereford. In his day there was a moat about the city wall measuring 1800 yards. This, together with the river made a water defence of 2,500 yards. The king then procured a revenue in a way which was to us now seems rather primitive, nevertheless quite as defensible as some of our methods.
