Brief biographical sketches of these Parliamentary Observers are as follows:

THE HON. SENATOR OLIVE L. IRVINE

Mrs. Irvine was educated at Portage la Prairie and Winnipeg Normal Schools. A former teacher. She was former President of the Women's Conservative Association of Manitoba and former President of South Winnipeg Association. Mrs. Irvine has been Manitoba's representative on the National Capital Commission since February 1959. She was summoned to the Senate on January 14, 1960. Party: Progressive Conservative. Home: Winnipeg, Man.

THE HON. HUGH JOHN FLEMMING, M.P.

Mr. Flemming is Member of Parliament for Victoria-Carleton, N.B. He started his political career when he became Municipal Councillor, County of Carleton, 1921-1933; Elected to the New Brunswick Legislature at the general elections in 1944; Re-elected at general elections 1948, 1952 and 1956; Sworn in as Premier of New Brunswick, 1952; Minister of Municipal Affairs, 1952. First elected to House of Commons, Ottawa, at a by-election, 1960; Re-elected general elections 1962; Appointed Minister of Forestry in Conservative Government, 1960; Appointed Minister of National Revenue, 1962. MR. GILLES GREGOIRE, M.P.

Mr. Gregoire is Member of Parliament for Lapointe, Quebec. He was educated at St. Louis de Conzague College, Quebec, Jesuits College of Quebec and Laval University, Quebec. He was first elected to the House of Commons in 1962. Party: Social Credit. Home: Quebec, Que.

DR. JOHN B. STEWART, M.P.

Mr. Gregg is Canada's candidate for the Chairmanship of the Fifth (Administrative and Budgetary) Committee.

MRS. MARGARET KONANTZ, M.P.

Mrs. Konantz is Member of Parliament for Winnipeg South. She has served on the Executive Committees of a number of regional and national welfare organizations. For her war service she was awarded the Order of the British Empire. Mrs. Komantz has also worked with the United Nations Association in Canada and with UNICEF. She has travelled throughout Asia and Africa to study at close range the work of UNICEF. Home: Winnipeg, Manitoba.

MR. PAUL TREMBLAY

Mr. Tremblay joined the Department of External Affairs in 1940 and served in a number of posts abroad before being appointed Ambassador to Chile in 1959. In 1962, he became Canada's Permanent Representative at the United Nations. He has served on the Canadian Delegation to the sixteenth and seventeenth sessions of the General Assembly. Home: Ottawa, Ontario.

THE HON. SENATOR T. D'ARCY LEONARD

Mr. D'Arcy Leonard is a distinguished Member of the Senate since 1955. He practiced law for a number of years and was General Manager of the Canadian Trust Company from 1942 to 1956. He has also served as President of a number of trust and insurance companies. Home: Toronto, Ontario.

MR. LEO CADIEUX, M.P.

Mr. Cadieux is Member of Parliament for Terrebonne. He is Director of the newspaper "L'avenir du Nord" and of the magazine "La Revue Moderne". During the Second World War he served in the Public Relations Branch of the Canadian Army and, later, worked as a War Correspondent. Home: St. Antoine des Laurentides, Quebec.

MR. GEORGE NIXON, M.P.

Mr. Nixon is Member of Parliament for Algoma West. He represented the Canadian Government at the 1948 I.L.O. Conference in Geneva. He was a delegate to the Meeting of the NATO Parliamentary Association in Paris in 1957. He also attended the sixteenth and seventeenth sessions of the General Assembly as an Observer. He will serve as Alternate Representative at the Eighteenth Session until November 1 when he will be replaced by Mr. James E. Brown, Q.C. Home: Sault St. Marie, Ontario.

MR. JAMES E. BROWN, M.P.
