SIGNIFICANT OUTLAYS TO BE MADE IN HALIFAX

Dangling the Bait ST. JOHN, N.B., May 8.—Hugh Guthrie, Dr. Neely and Dr. Clark, M.P., addressed a crowd of people on the benefits of reciprocity to Canada. The visiting speakers were taken for a trip around the harbor and were highly pleased with the port facilities and room for expansion.

OTTAWA, May 8.—That the government contemplates a general election at an early date is evident from the supplementary estimates which were laid on the table of parliament to-day by the minister of finance. The Conservatives say that wholesale detentions of many constituencies has been thus arranged for. The supplementaries amount to over \$17,000,000, which, with the main estimates, total \$185,000,000, or \$23,000,000 more than last year. Of this huge sum \$23,000,000 will be spent by Mr. Pugley on public works and \$27,000,000 by Mr. Graham on railways.

The most significant outlays are to take place in Halifax, the constituency of R. L. Borden, leader of the opposition. Mr. Graham will spend one million there on a branch line, while Mr. Pugley will spend \$600,000 on docks. These important works have been held over until the eve of the general election, and with them it is anticipated that the government will be able to fill the constituency with solid Liberals for the purpose of defeating Mr. Borden.

"I believe this treaty to be the best thing of the whole country, including farmers, merchants, laboring men and all," said the president, "because I believe it is contrary to nature, it is flying in the face of Providence to put an artificial wall like that between this country and Canada, and not get the benefit that will inure to peoples of the same traditions, the same language, and practically with the same characteristics of the people. I believe that that will, we will benefit by it. FOR WE SHALL SELL MORE AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS TO CANADA THAN SHE WILL SELL TO US. We do now, and we shall sell her even more after the treaty goes into effect. That is my judgment. I am not arguing, I am merely stating my conclusion. If I did not believe this I should not have taken the responsibility of reciprocity treaty thru, I am willing to abide the judgment of history—the judgment that will come after the event."

L. S. LEVEE IS FIRST TO SEE JUDGE'S REPORT

Board of Education Meets Tomorrow to Consider It—Chairman is Silent

Judge Winchester's report giving his conclusions on the recent investigation into the sale to school teachers of stock in a medicine company in which Chairman L. S. Levee of this board of education is largely interested, will be presented to the board at a special meeting to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The report was given to the mayor yesterday, and he turned it over to Mr. Levee as chairman of the board, and the latter had the expert opinion of himself, of being the first to read the summing up in an enquiry in which he was chiefly concerned. The report was put away in the vault in the school offices, and Mr. Levee last night courteously but firmly declined to discuss its contents.

The concluding clauses of the report it is understood, contain strictures on the methods employed in connection with the sale of the permit stock, and that the committee of the board were influenced to invest.

The chief inspector is mentioned in the report and another prominent factor of the public schools department is named, it is said.

Government to Guarantee C.N.R. Bonds.

OTTAWA, May 8.—The minister of railways has given notice of the intention of the government to guarantee the bonds of the Canadian Northern Railway over the completed and uncompleted portions of the company's line between Montreal and Port Arthur. This will enable the company to connect up its different sections east and west and carry out its scheme of a third transcontinent railway.

(1) Montreal to Port Arthur, including the part already constructed, to the extent of \$35,000 per mile at 3 1/2 per cent. interest. (2) That the company shall give the government a first mortgage on the line from Port Arthur to Montreal, except on the completed portion from Hawkesbury to Rideau Junction, near Ottawa, 62 1/2 miles, and about 10 miles of the company's branch out of Solihwood Junction, the trustees to be the British Empire Trust Company and the National Trust Company, with which trust companies the company is to deposit bonds to the amount of \$55,000 a mile, being approximately \$2,585,500.

It is provided that, at the request of the Canadian Northern Railway Company, the government may pay interest on the bonds for the first two years, charging the company therefor at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent. It is made conditional to the guarantee that the company shall carry traffic destined to a Canadian port over its own line; that the thru rate on export traffic from the point of origin to the point of destination shall at no time be greater to a Canadian port than to a United States port; that all such traffic shall be carried to Canadian ocean ports, and that the company shall not advise or encourage transportation to foreign ports. The Canadian Northern Railway is bound to construct terminals in Montreal and make arrangements for an interchange of traffic with the Intercolonial Railway.

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DEMAND COMPLETE INFORMATION.

The complaint the railway find in the city plans the car lines is anything more than the "plan and profile showing the location of the city on the streets. The board will await the information that we require before finally determining in this matter."

BORDEN'S TOUR OF NORTHWEST

Opens in Winnipeg on June 19—Closes in Portage la Prairie on July 7—No Need to Visit B. C.

OTTAWA, May 8.—(Special)—The itinerary of R. L. Borden's western political tour was completed this evening. It is as comprehensive as it was possible to make it under the circumstances that parliament will reassemble in June. The opposition leader will leave Ottawa on June 17 and will be back in the capital on July 9.

While all the speakers have not been decided upon, it may be stated definitely that Andrew Broder of Dundas, an inimitable campaigner and probably the leading authority in the commons on agricultural matters, will accompany Mr. Borden. Dr. Roche of Marquette will probably also be in the party. The Yukon premiers of British Columbia and Manitoba will be in England attending the coronation, but they themselves will also campaign the western provinces on their return. British Columbia will not be visited on the present tour by Mr. Borden, and it is not considered necessary that the huge majority of people there being actively against the reciprocity agreement.

OPIMUM AGREEMENT

China Agrees to Diminish Production in Proportion to Indian Export.

PEKIN, May 8.—The Anglo-Chinese opium agreement was signed to-day, and becomes operative immediately, it provides that China shall annually diminish its production of opium proportionately with the Indian export, and its extinction in 1917. Great Britain agrees that the importation of Indian opium into China shall cease entirely, if the native production in that country ceases.

Great Britain is to be granted facilities for investigating this diminution, with reference to the sales and packing of opium in India. The Indian exports to China shall not exceed 30,000 chests in 1911, and they will be reduced 1000 chests annually.

AGAIN IN DANGER.

FORT FRANCES, May 8.—Owing to the extremely dry weather, the forest fires have started again, and unless rain sets in soon, will be serious to the standing timber as well as to the lumbermen and loggers who have timber cut and ready for the drive. 'DAYBREAK' TRAIN PUNCTUAL TO THE MINUTE

Successful inauguration of New Mail and Newspaper Service to Western Ontario—Should Be Extended East—Also—First Try-Out in Canada of "Open Mail" System.

Toronto and western Ontario both took a step in the right direction, a step towards a closer and more intimate knowledge of each other, when, at 2.58 o'clock Monday morning a new newspaper train steamed on her first run westward, bearing the "Daybreak"—or to use the simple yet touching metaphor of The Globe, the "Breakfast Food"—editions of the Toronto morning papers to Brantford, Paris, Woodstock, Ingersoll and London. From these points to be distributed by a network of lines to the farthest corner of the western portion of the province, hours ahead of what was possible before its advent.

It was a step in the right direction, a beginning, but only a beginning. It should be followed up by an early fast mail and newspaper train east from Toronto, serving all the important towns along the Montreal line of the G. T. R. as far east as Kingston, which at present does not exist what a Toronto morning paper looks like until the afternoon.

One of the most noteworthy features of the new train was the first trial in Canada of the "open mail" system, whereby parcels of papers unbagged, are delivered to newsmen at the car door, instead of the old method of waiting for the papers to be sent to the post-office for delivery.

Work Well Done. Attached to the train for the initial run was the private car of Superintendent Gillen, and a special car bearing, in addition to the representatives of the Toronto printing papers, Mr. Ross of the Postoffice department, who is the G. T. R., who wished personally to see that everything was in the best of working order.

Stoppers made at Hamilton, Brantford, Woodstock, Ingersoll, while at Paris the train merely slowed up to drop the bags.

Mon. Adam Beck on Hand. On the arrival at London, after a few of the inevitable photos had been taken, an adjournment was made to the Farmers' Home in the city. Mayor Beattie was unable to be present, but Hon. Adam Beck, the pride of the Forest City, was up bright and early and added a felicitous wish to the inauguration of the new venture. There was nothing of local jealousy, he said, in the welcome which the citizens of London extended to the morning papers of the City of Toronto. It would work no harm to the local papers, which would always have their own field, but rather do them good by infusing into them the spirit of a healthy rivalry. Senator Jaffray presided and spoke briefly, as did also George Ross of the postoffice department, who modestly disclaimed any share in the credit for the enterprise; U. E. Gillen of the G. T. R.; Dr. Macdonald (Globe), H. R. Charlton (G. T. R.); John Durbly and Murdoch Macdonald (Mail and Empire), C. D. Creighton (World), J. F. Mackay (Globe), and Mr. Ross (London Advertiser).

After a visit to the hydro driven pumping station, of which London is justly proud, the return trip to Toronto was made, arriving at 12.55, in plenty of time for all the enthusiastic "fans" in the party to see the ball game.

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Hollinger Touches \$13, But Does Not Hold Its Advance

Active Trading Continues But Prices Are Allowed to Drag

Mining Market Experiences a Day of Waiting, in Which Small Losses Are Recorded.

World Office, Monday Evening, May 8.

There was no news of any import to stimulate the trading in mining stocks in to-day's market, and despite the fact that last week's activity was continued, little of interest was evolved in the dealings.

The Porcupine issues were in good demand at the opening, and in certain instances prices ruled above the close of last week. The selling was of a speculative nature, however, and after the week-end accumulation of buying orders was disposed of, prices showed a disposition to slouch.

Hollinger touched thirteen dollars in the early dealings, but this price was not held when profit-taking came into play, and the shares eased off at \$12.75, closing bid at that figure. This is ten points below the close last week.

Small losses were the net result of dealings in the cheaper Porcupine issues. Preston East Dome sold as high as 40 1/2, but in the afternoon was back to 39 1/2. Swastika lost 3 points at \$4. Pearl Lake dropped a point at \$7. Vipond touched 65 in the early trading, but was off 62 later in the day. West Dome dropped 10 points at \$5.20.

Detroit New Ontario stock was listed to-day and sales were made around 50 1/2, the shares holding remarkably firm at that figure. Only a small allotment of the stock is for sale, consequently brokers are looking for a good market for the security.

Cobalts were under pressure of profit-taking and prices were allowed to sag in various instances, several of the cheaper issues recording small declines, running from small fractions to one and two points. Crown Reserve was a strong point, the shares moving up five points to \$3.55.

The market, which was active, did not display the vivacity which characterized the dealings late last week. A period of resting was only natural after the strenuous operations, however, and traders were unanimous in the opinion that the movement would start up again shortly.

HOLLINGER AT \$25 NOT OUT OF THE WAY

So Says Porcupine Mining Man—Merger Talk Not Liked in the Camp.

PORCUPINE CITY, May 4.—(From Our Man Up North).—Conservative men here are of the opinion that Hollinger stock might be worth \$25 a share on bare merits, when further developments have been made, judging from what developments of the first big lunge of the main vein have brought forth, and regardless of the stimulus given to the stock thru stories of an intended merger of the interests of the Rea and Vipond with Hollinger.

Said a very prominent mine man to The World to-day: "Hollinger will be worth \$25 a share from to-day, with the same consistent mine management that has characterized the work of the Timmins brothers, if the Hollinger stock is not merged in another other interests in the hands of the Bewick-Moreing crowd with the intention of holding up poor prospects with the big mine."

"The ore is in sight and can be mined. The price will not be high at that. But, should the company attempt to cover up other poor prospects in the camp by using the Hollinger as the producer, then the stock could not be expected to hold up."

This is the general view here. The Hollinger is known to have about \$4,000,000 in ore in sight, in addition to the tonnage of the dump. Should the Hollinger be merged in another company, in case a merger does not take place with two or three other Bewick companies, the stock is a safe and sane holding under any circumstances.

Manager Williams has no knowledge of the formation of a merger with the Hollinger and the Rea is the nucleus, but would not be surprised to learn any moment that such a transaction had taken place.
