Czar Gives His Troops Duty to Conscience and People

Why He Accepts Peace

Explains to "Self Sacrificing Army, So Dear to Me" That Giving Up Half of a Remote Island is for Their Sake.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 3.—The emperor on Friday telegraphed the following to Gen. Linewich:
"The negotiations at Portsmouth led on Aug. 19 to a refusal of the demands of the Japanese government regarding the cession of the island of Sakhalin, the payment of a war indemnity, the surrender of our ships lying in neutral harbors, and the installation of our forces in the waters of the Pacific Ocean. After further negotiations, Japan on Aug. 23 yielded all our conditions, but asked for the return of that portion of Sakhalin occupied by Japanese troops, which is the part held by the Japanese until 1915 and then ceded by treaty to Russia."

Victory So Near.
"The self-sacrificing army, so dear to me, will not permit the Japanese to step by step during nineteen months, obstinately repulsing our attacks, and under your leadership the army was re-organized and strengthened by the arrival of troops from Russia, and is now greater in numbers and stronger than before. It was not only prepared to ward off the enemy, but also to inflict upon him an important defeat."

"I and all Russia believe in the strength of my glorious army, and in the readiness to sacrifice for the good of the fatherland, but my duty to my conscience and to the people entrusted to me by God commands me not to again put to the test the valor of Russian men so dear to my heart, and not to expose them to the horrors of a remote island which Japan ceded to us in 1875, and I have therefore accepted the preliminary peace conditions."

Valor and Sacrifice.
"The Russian troops have repeatedly proved during this sanguinary conflict their valor and sacrifice, and I am proud of my dear army. May I know that I and Russia value the sacrifices which it has made in this severe war."

**RESERVES LEAVE MID RIOTING
TEN PEOPLE KILLED, 50 HURT**
Lbeau, Sept. 3.—The departure of reservists Saturday night was marked by a socialistic riot, in which ten persons were killed and fifty wounded. The agitators fired from a house upon the military, who replied with a volley. The cavalry then charged, using their sabres on the rioters.

Vicerey at Canton in Hot Water—Nasty Posters on Walls.
Hongkong, Sept. 3.—The transport Logan with United States Secretary of War Taft and party on board arrived this morning. The vicerey, owing to the unpleasant demonstrations against America and the display of posters in Canton there were lengthy arguments as to whether the party should go on to Canton as planned. Consul General Braz advised that the visit should not be made. Secretary Taft, however, decided to go on, and will arrive at Canton in the morning. Only men will be guests at the banquet, which will be given by the vicerey, who will be absent.

LABOR'S NIGHT AND GLORY WILL BE ON PARADE TO-DAY

Long Columns, Bashing Uniforms, Interesting Floats and Many Labor Men, the Features—The Route.

Labor is king to-day. Once every year the laboring man comes out in all the glory of banners, badges, gaily bedecked floats, and many bands. For many years citizens' day at the exhibition has been enhanced by the labor parade, for which Toronto unionism has become justly famous. Former parades have been grand. Today's parade will be "grand still." Such is the opinion of the officers in charge who find the members of the hundred or so unions more interested than ever in the event. Great rivalry has sprung up among the unions, as shown by the keen interest taken when the lots were drawn for positions a few days ago. The judges will have some difficulty in selecting the best looking union in the big column that will take hours to pass a given point.

Early this morning the sections will gather in various parts and then they will go to Queen's Park. The start will be made from there at 10 o'clock and pass along the following route:
Queen's Park
Grosvenor-street
Yonge
Queen
Dufferin
Exhibition grounds.

The seven sections which have several bands, and with the many floats, almost every branch of labor having one, will make a display that will draw enormous crowds as on former occasions. The various unions will disperse at the gates of the exhibition, with the exception of the officers, who will lead the many floats in a procession around the grounds.

The labor Temple has been like a beehive for several days past, and the last finishing touches were put upon the parade Saturday. The parade will be much more orderly, and, therefore, more spectacular to-day, on account of the arrangements with the Toronto Real Estate Board, which will not interfere as on former occasions.
