## IS THE EXPRESSION OF MANUFACTURERS NO PROTECTION FROM U.S.

Feel That the Recommendations COCKSHUTT SAYS TARIFF Lines, Have Been Practically Ignored - C. M. A. Committee Begins an Analysis.

### INTERMEDIATE TARIFF, TAKEN, WOLLD RUIN SOME INDUSTRIES

The special tariff committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association held a meeting yesterday afternoon for discussion of the revised tariff. W. K.

Speaking of the new general tariff, Mr. George said he was unable to give an opinion on the way it may affect other manufacturers or industries with which he is not conversant, but so far as that which he represents is concerned, the revised schedule will in several particulars affect it adversely. Altho the tariff revision cuts from Altho the tariff revision cuts from both sides, the increased duties arejudging from the cursory examination he has so far made-rather on the material used in manufacture than on the finished article. Not that a protection finished article. Not that a protection and in many cases an increased duty has been always neglected on the latter, for which, he said, he is thankful; but, in many instances, the material used in the manufacture, which, under the old tariff, was either on the free list or nominally taxed, is now advanced to a duty rate which will materially alter the present conditions of terially alter the present conditions of the manufacture of silver and plated ware. He also pointed out that the preferential rate, as applying to England, can seldom be taken advantage of, from the fact of the article taxed

being usually one specially produced by the United States. Adding to Cost. Taking for example anodes of nickel and silver, which are used in coating ware in the plating baths. These, he said, are now taxed to such a degree that to save \$50 in every \$500 value of either material, it will be necessary to add to the present plant a section to make those plates, so indispensable to the manufacture of silver and plated goods. This does not create a new industry, but merely adds to the cost of the old. # FOR SUPPLY OF POWER

Following is a copy of the letter sent by the hydro-electric power commission of Ontario to the several municipalities asking for power, the blanks being filled as for Toronto:

Dear Sir,-In reply to the request of your council for the cost of electric power, the commission has estimated, upon the basis of the quantities applied for, that 30,000 horse-power can be supplied at Toronto ready for distribution, at from \$14.15 to \$16.61 per horse-power. It is, however, obvious that the ultimate price will depend upon the gross quantity used by all the municipalities and the commission has estimated that if the quantity used by your municipality should be considerably less than 30,000 horse-power, the cost will be from \$15 to \$17.75 per horse-power per annum for continuous power. # LABOR NOW ENTITLED

Studholme of Hamilton Has a Splendid Meeting-Candidate's Attitude Toward Public Owners ship-W. F. Maclean, M.P., One of the Speakers.

Hamilton, Nov. 30 .- (Special.) -The he Spectator is making a strong effort to divide the electors on party lines, in the election contest in East Hamilton, the campaign of the Labor and public ownership candidate is swinging strongly in his favor. An enthus astic meeting was held to-night in Association Hall, and the arguments

Association Hall, and the arguments for the election of Allen Studholme to the legislature met with a splendid response. The speakers were the candidate, W. F. Maclean, M. P.; J. G. O'Donoghue of Toronto, and S. L. Landers of Hamilton, the last two being prominent in labor circles. Charles Altchison presided.

Mr. Studholme answered the allegation that he was afraid to meet his opponent in debate by challenging Mr. Scott to a joint meeting on Saturday or Monday. He claimed that, as arbitrator for the street rallway men, he had secured an award that gave the men an increase of \$30,000 in wages, and readjusted the hours of work so as to afford reasonable time for rest and recreation. For his services duraing five weeks' time he charged \$60, less money than he would have received from his employer. The Cataract Power Company would not, he feared, respect its agreement with the city, and he was not sure that peace would continue. He said that the owners of The Spectator, who were fighting him so vigorously in the campaign, were large stockholders in the company.

Mr. Maclean was given a fiattering

were large stockholders in the company.

Mr. Maclean was given a flattering reception. He explained that he had come to Hamilton at this time because Mr. Studholme was a declared supporter of public ownership. Premier Whitney was one of the foremost exponents of the principle of public ownership, and he believed Studholma to be a man who would support Mr. Whitney in regard to Niagara power.

Where They Stand.

"I know where Studholme is," said Mr. Maclean, "and altho I sent two representatives to see Mr. Scott, I have not been able to find out where he is on this great question."

In Canada there were only two representatives of labor in parliament, whereas in Britain there were elected to represent the interests of the working men. The appearance of these 40 Laborites at Westminster was working a revolution in British politics. The interests of the great mass of the electors were coming to be recognized, and he found in some of the British magazines from two to four articles on labor questions. Old-fashioned England was leading Canada in this respect.

"There ought to be presentative of labor in the Ontario Legislature, and now that the opportunity has come to Hamilton working men, they ought to take advantage of it." he

EXPENDITURES ASKED FOR

Estimates Presented for a Period of 21 Months-Toronto's

In connection with his budget speech Mr. Fielding laid upon the table of he house a statement of the estimated expenditure and receipts for the coming year. These estimates cover a period of twenty-one months, because of the change that is to be made in the fiscal year.

The Toronto items of expenditure as follows: Toronto customs ouse, alterations, \$15,000; Toronto house, alterations, \$15,000; Toronto customs house, government share of paving, and Esplanade in front of customs house property, \$3315; Toronto Dominion buildings, improvements, renewals, repairs, etc., \$5000; Toronto drill hall and armories, accommodation for new corps, \$150,000; Toronto drill hall and armories, government share of paving University and Chestnut-streets, \$19,000; Toronto military buildings, magazine, \$3000; Toronto military buildings, barracks for permanent corps, to replace property sold

buildings, magazine, \$3000; Toronto military buildings, barracks for permanent corps, to replace property sold to the city, \$50,000; Toronto postoffice, restoration, \$15,000; Toronto postoffice, land, building, pneumatic plant and machinery, \$20,000; Toronto postoffice, additional postal station "F," \$37,000; Toronto postal station "C" pavements, etc., \$500. There is \$128,685 for the current year for Toronto harbor improvements and \$100,000 for year ending March 31, 1908.

The amount asked for under the head of railways and canals amounts to \$32,953,340, of which \$2,308,050 is allotted to the Intercolonial Railway, \$401,410 to the Prince Edward Island Railway, \$28,360,000 to the National Transcontinental Railway, and \$1,883,-880 to canals. For the nine months of 1907, \$2,519,590 is asked for the Intercolonial Railway, \$185,500 for the Prince Edward Island Railway, \$10,000,000 for the Transcontinental Railway, \$10,000,000 for the Transcontinental Railway, and for canals \$1,298,475, the grand total for both periods being \$46,995,900.

Wheat—There was a very decided improvement experienced in outside trade to-day. Transactions in wheat were the largest for the past month. Early market was quite heavy as result of heavy liquidation on the part of December holders, and selling by some of the local professionals. On the decline, however, buring of very excellent character developed, which not ony checked the downward movement, but resulted in the early loss being entirely recovered, final figures being particularly at top prices of to-day. Considering the heavy liquidation, rather bearish statistical news, and heavy selling by local professionals, the market has displayed remarkable strength. In view of the above, coupled with the fact that we believe December liquidation to be practically over, we feel more confident than ever that purchases made now will ultimately show handsome profits.

Ennis & Stoppanl wired to J. L. Mitchell: Wheat—Feature in wheat to-day was continued changing of contracts, the difference between December and May widening to very nearly 6 cents. Aside from the changing there was scattered liquidation of the December option, which gave to the market a weak tone, the same continuing unit just before the close, when some covering of shorts firmed the price fractionally. The situation surrounding wheat in all markets of importance is very unsatisfactory. Our local stock of wheat is practically a drug on the market, despite its quality, while the Minneapolis milling grades are at a high premium, and there does not appear to be anything in sight at present to materially alter these conditions, we can only hope that something will occur whereby the stocks of wheat at northwestern country houses can be transported to primary markets and thus relieve the situation. Locally there should be some increase in activity after the 1st December deliveries have been made, but we cannot as yet see anything to permanently change the present course of prices.


