A Torento Klondiker Suggests the Closing of the Passes Via Skaguay-Interesting Letter.
Following is a copy of a letter received yesterday by Dr, W. H. B. Alkins, The inviter is a young physician of Toronto, who left recently for the Klondike. He passed through Victoria on the 5th inst. The letter explains itself.
