

THE ALLIES ARE RESISTING

And They Have Taken the District West of Peking, So the Chinese Authorities at Shanghai Say.

Li Hung Chang Wants Prince Tuan Arrested and the Boxers Disarmed in Order to Give Him an Opening for Negotiations With the Powers—Is There a Tendency to the Partition of the Empire?

London, Aug. 28.—(Special.)—The allies, mounting aggressive operations, have taken the district west of Peking.

This statement, based on Chinese authority, is cabled from Shanghai.

From the same place the further statement that Li Hung Chang has wired the Emperor-Dowager at Peking, requesting the arrest of Prince Tuan and the disarming of the Boxers, in order to give him an opening for negotiations with the powers.

The illuminations projected at Shanghai, in celebration of the relief of Peking, have been abandoned, lest they should cause a native outbreak.

Gen. Yang Lu Di H. "Evidence has been received here," says the Shanghai correspondent of The Standard, "going to show that Gen. Yang Lu was the real author of the anti-foreign outbreak, the Emperor-Dowager, Prince Tuan and the others all having been persuaded to take an extreme attitude, while he stood aside and waited developments."

Missionaries Want to Go Back. American refugee missionaries in Amoy, according to the Hong Kong correspondent of The Daily Mail, are anxious to return to the interior, but the United States Consul has forbidden them to do so, and urges them to go to the Philippines or to return to America.

What It Really Means. Shanghai advice to The Daily News says that consular officials are looking on the action in landing troops at Amoy, despite the protests of the consuls, as similar to that of Russia in New Chwang, the whole indicating a tendency to the partition of the Empire.

The men's arbitrators will include Grand Conductor O'Connell of the International Association of Machinists, who is expected to arrive tomorrow. Mr. A. W. Putte, M.P., is spoken of as the representative of the men on the Arbitration Board are not yet known.

SAMUEL STEIN LOSES HIS LIFE

IN TRYING TO SAVE ANOTHER

Miss Mary Miller, Bathing at Coatsworth's Cut, Cries for Help—Stein Plunged In to Save Her—Girl Was Rescued by Another—Body Not Yet Recovered.

In an heroic effort to save Miss Miller, daughter of Mr. John Miller of Fisherman's Island, from drowning yesterday afternoon Samuel Stein, a young man, lost his life. Teague Holland, 95 De Grassi-street, who also went to the rescue, managed to save Miss Miller, but was unable to reach Stein before he had become exhausted and sunk.

Ladies Went to Bathing. Between 4 and 5 o'clock, in company with four other young ladies, including her sister, Miss Miller, and Miss Schuchard, went to bathing in Coatsworth's Cut, which connects Ashbridge's Bay with the lake. Soon after entering the water the ladies decided to swim to the island. The water was about 100 yards. They had only gone a short distance, when Mr. Miller declared she was unable to go any farther, and cried aloud for help. Her companions could offer no assistance, and, becoming frightened, returned to the shore.

Stein Heard the Cry for Help. Among those who heard the pitiful cry were Stein, who was bathing from the beach, and Holland, who was about 300 yards away in a boat in mid-stream with his family, consisting of his wife and child. Both started to the rescue about the same time. Stein only waited to take off his boots, and then plunged into the water, while Holland rowed in all haste to the spot where the rescue was being effected. THE BOERS FORCE DID GOOD

Work-Gen. Olivier Has Been Captured.

They Have a Large Number of Guns, and the Country Where They Are Well Sited For Their Tactics.

London, Aug. 27.—The following despatch was sent to-day by Lord Roberts:

"Belait, Sunday, Aug. 26.—Engaged the enemy the greater part of the day over a perimeter of nearly 30 miles."

"Lyttelton's division and two brigades of cavalry, all under Buller, operated southwest of Dalmatona."

"French, with two brigades of cavalry, moved northwest of Belfast, during the day, to Lelekony on the Belfast-Lydenburg road. As soon as French reacted Lyttelton's Cavalry advanced from Belfast in support."

"The enemy, in considerable strength, opposed Buller's and Kote-Carew's advance. He brought three long tons and many other guns and pompons (quick firing guns) into action."

"The firing until dark was hot and persistent."

Buller hopes his casualties will not exceed 40.

"Kote-Carew has not yet reported."

"The Boers are making a determined stand. They have a large number of guns, the country is difficult and well sited for their tactics, and they are a very formidable enemy."

WERE THE ALLIES DEFEATED?

An Ugly-Sounding Rumor From St. Petersburg—Allies Said to Have Lost 1500 Men.

Paris, Aug. 28.—(Special.)—A special despatch to Le Siecle from St. Petersburg says: "It is persistently rumored in St. Petersburg that the Russian Government has received a despatch asserting that, after a fierce battle inside Peking, the allies retreated, losing one thousand eight hundred men, mostly Russians. It is further said that the allies retreated from the city, and that the Chinese were advancing toward Peking from the north."

WILL TRY TO RE-TAKE PEKING.

This is the Story That Comes From the Japanese War Office From Gen. Yamaguchi.

London, Aug. 27.—Gen. Yamaguchi, commander of the Japanese troops in China, informed the Japanese War Office Saturday, says a despatch from Tokio, that the Chinese had abandoned hope of retaking Peking, and that 8000 men with 15 guns were advancing toward Peking from the north, intending to cut the allies' communications.

THOUSANDS CHEER THE RETURN OF BRAVE MEN FROM THE FRONT

Carried From the Train to Carriages by Enthusiastic Admirers and Given a Cordial Reception by Friends at Their Homes—Streets Were Gaily Decorated.

No body of men could have wished for a more hearty reception than that which was accorded the invalided Toronto volunteers who returned home yesterday afternoon from South Africa. Their coming was the cause of great jubilation among their friends and admirers, and it is estimated that there were fully 6000 people at the Union Station to give them a greeting. The big crowd thronged every available space on the station platform, around the entrance and the approaches. Many, not being able to secure any other point of vantage, took a position on the York-street bridge, where they were able to get a splendid view of the train when it pulled in. Probably the biggest throng congregated at the entrance of the station street. Constable James Strickland, who was on duty, was unable to keep the people out, and in the crush the glass partition leading to the platform was removed. After this obstacle had been removed, the crowds surged in, and took possession of the platform.

JAPS TO OCCUPY THE PALACE.

Japan Will Protect the Persons of the Emperor and Empress.

London, Aug. 27.—The Shanghai correspondent of The Times, writing Aug. 26, says: "Li Hung Chang has received a message from Peking that the Japanese would occupy the Imperial Palace. The Japanese Government has renewed its assurance that it will protect the persons of the Emperor and Empress, and will not touch the person of the Emperor."

LAST FIGHT NEAR TIEN TSIN.

Allies Engaged a Large Force of the Enemy—100 Were Killed—U.S. Lost 250 Men.

Washington, Aug. 27.—The following despatch from Gen. Chaffee has been received at the War Department:

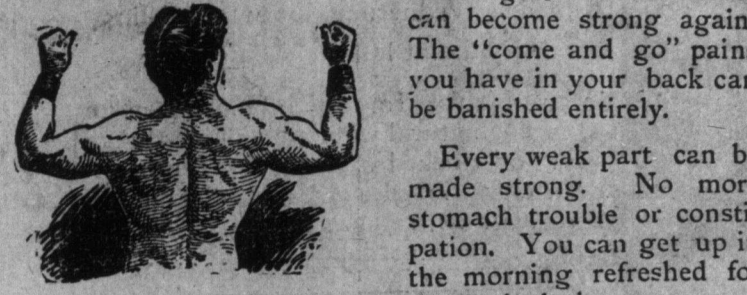
