





IRON ORE HANDLERS STRIKE.

Six Hundred Men on the Eric Rail

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 27.—All of the iron ore handlers employed on the Brie Hallway docks in this city, about 600 in number, went on strike to-day as a result of the refusal of the owners of the steamer Simon J. Murphy to allow a claim for extra compensation for unloading a wet cargo of ore.

At a meeting of the ore handlers to-day it was decided that if a settlement was not promptly reached at the Erie a strike would be ordered on the Cleveland and Pittsburg Rallway docks. About 1400 men in all would become affected by the movement.

NAVIGATION NEWS.




