PLOT TO BURN BRITISH SHIP

Cannon Crackers Set to Do the Deed Found in Nick of Time.

The Steamer Was Loading Cotton.

Pensacola, Fla., Nov. 24.—An attempt was made today to burn and blow up the British steamship Cayo Largo, 2223 tons, which is loading a cargo of 15,000 tons of cotton at the Commandant-street dock of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad for Bremen.

The plot was frustrated by one of the cotton crew men, who was at the work in the hold, discovering straw in the lower hold a large number of heads of matches.

About 10,000 bales of cotton had been placed in the vessel when the man found the matches. This led to an investigation, when about 20 cannon crackers, 12 of which were found jammed tightly between the heads of the cotton. In each case a large number of matches were found.

The cannon crackers were stolen from the steamer Winfield, which arrived Monday with fireworks from New York. The authorities believe the plot was the work of some one connected in New Orleans and Cayo Largo.
