### CRESCENT STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

- The Congregation was organized, and for seven years ministered to by Deputies from the Free Church of Scotland.
- 1844.—The Rev. W. C. Burns, arrived in the summer, and preached to large audiences in St. Gabriel Street Free Church.
- " The Rev. J. MacNaughten, of Paisley, arrived a little later, and continued the work in the same church.
- 1845.—The Rev. J. Bonar, of Larbert, arrived in Spring, preached in St. Gabriel Street Free Church till a temporary wooden church was erected in Lagauchetiere Street. He opened this Church on May 11th, and on the 25th of May ordained the first elders, viz: John Redpath, James R. Orr, David Ferguson, Evander MacIver.
  - " The Rev. W. Arnot, of Glasgow, arrived about this time, and supplied the pulpit till the end of September.
- " The Rev. A. N. Somerville, of Glasgow, took charge during October and November.
- The Rev. W. C. Burns, in November, received but declined a call to labour in Canada, the Congregation promising to support him. In December he was again urged to fail in with this request, but finally declined on January 19th, 1846.
- 1846. The Rev. G. Stevenson, of Peebles, ministered from January to April.
- The REV. T. MACLAUGHLIN, of Peebles, ministered during May and June.

Quickly and steadily has our work been growing, let us give thanks and go forward to greater things. Is there any condition for a Christian congregation more beautiful than that depicted in David's last song for the pilgrims to Zion?

Behold how goodly and pleasant it is That brethren in unity dwell. Like the goodly oil on the head Flowing down on the beard, On the beard of Aaron, Flowing down on the skirt of his robes: Like the dew of Mount Hermon That descends on the Mountains of Zion; For there has Jehovah commanded His blessing, Even life evermore.

Has God in His great goodness vouchsafed in some measure a realization of this picture? As we have rejoiced in it, as our hearts have been refreshed by it, as our hands have been strengthened by it, let us guard it with holy jealousy, least any degree of its beauty be marred. While finances and numbers and organization have their own place and importance, here is the spiritual condition that commands the divine benediction.

> So they from strength unwearied go Still forward unto strength, Until in Zion they appear Before the Lord at length.

During the year that is past some of our number have ended their pilgrimage and entered into rest. Loud and repeated have been the warnings to all. Oh that we were wise that we understood this, that we would consider our latter end.

The registrations for the year were as follows: Marriages, 11; Baptisms, 21; Burials, 23. Communicants on roll, 596.

The attendance on the Sabbath services, both morning and evening have been most encouraging, but that on Wednesday evening has not been what it ought to be with the largely increased congregation.

It is very gratifying to see that the introduction of the electric light and other improvements made in the gallery, have induced many more to take sittings there, and it is hoped that soon the gallery may be as fully occupied as the area of the Church. In this connection, I have been surprised to learn, in the course of the past year, that some families sitting in the area have not sufficient sittings for all the members of the family able to come to church. This is a very unsatisfactory condition of things, and as there are no more available seats in the area, the only solution of this difficulty is for such families to go into the gallery, and there is little hardship in this. No doubt we get attached to a pew as we do to a house—but surely, in the spiritual interests of our children we should be able to overcome this feeling; and as the seats in the gallery are in every respect as good as those in the area, it is really a very small change to make in order to gain a great benefit.

As soon as a child is able to be present in the congregation of God's people, that child should be there. It is a vain excuse to say that they attend Sabbath School. Sabbath Schools are doing a great work, and we hope they may do a greater; but the Sabbath School as a substitute either for family instruction or attendance at Church, is a delusion and a snare. Let the children be trained to go up with their parents to worship in the great congregation. Let them know and feel that they have a recognized place in the House of God. Teach them practically that truth inscribed on their baptismal cards, "The visible church consists of all those throughout the world who profess the true religion, TOGETHER WITH THEIR CHILDREN." I always provide a special portion for them, let them not be deprived

of their right. I trust that each individual on whom these words have a bearing will lay them seriously to heart. It is for your own truest comfort as well as for your children's highest good, that I would say to each, "Friend, go up higher."

In this connection, it has been to me a cause of much satisfaction that some who have no such cause to make the change have signified their willingness to do so whenever there is need for it.

During the year we have been much exercised in spirit by the events that have transpired in China. Though the direct work of the mission has to some extent been interrupted, God has mercifully guarded our missionary, and given both him and his wife health and strength in the midst of many troubles and anxieties. Let us wait constantly on the throne of grace on their behalf, and that of their fellow laborers, and the greater the obstacles, let our prayers be the more earnest. No time is lost when we are being guided by our Father's eye. All things develop His purpose; all things work together for good. May we each go forward to another year's work, in the glorious confidence of the psalmist, saying, "Thou shalt guide me by Thy council, and afterward receive me to glory."

## Report of the Deacons' Court

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1891.

In presenting the customary Annual Report, the Court has to congratulate the Congregation upon the results of the year, and also to express thankfulness to God for having put it into the hearts of our people to sustain in such a marked manner the various schemes which have been placed before them. The receipts from all sources amount to \$18,284.85, and are fully set forth in the Treasurer's Statements, herewith submitted.

### WEEKLY OFFERINGS.

The receipts on this account for the year, show a total of \$9,277.91, of which \$7,833.80 in envelopes, and \$1,444.11 by plate collections, showing a weekly average of \$178.42. Comparing these results with those of the previous year, they show a gain of \$753.76. In addition to the regular weekly contributions, collections have been made in aid of several deserving objects, to all of which the Congregation has given a hearty response. It is exceedingly gratifying to note that the Weekly Offering Scheme is more and more commending itself to the Congregation, as indicated by the results of the past year. The Court would take this opportunity of suggesting that any who may have recently come amongst us, and who may not yet have fallen in with this system of giving, should begin the New Year in this way. Any information in regard to the workings of the scheme will be cheerfully given by any member of the Court.

### PEW RENTS.

We are much gratified in being able to report a substantial increase in our income from this source, the amount received being \$4,794.16, showing an advance of \$445.50, over the year 1890. The surplus at credit of this account, \$1,406.16, has been transferred to the Building Fund or Real Estate Account, to apply in part liquidation of the balance at debit of that account.

### BUILDING FUND OR REAL ESTATE ACCOUNT.

We have received during the year in payment of promised subscriptions the sum of \$2140.00, which with the balance of \$1406.16 transferred from Pew Rent account, has been applied in payment of obligations previously undertaken, as also some improvements which have commended themselves to the Court during the year. The electric lighting, to which special reference was made in our lastannual report, has been found so satisfactory in every respect that it has been suggested that the Lecture Hall, Sabbath School Room and other rooms in connection with the church should be lighted in the same manner, and the matter is now under consideration.

Attention is also directed to changes made in the seating accommodation in the gallery, which the Court trusts will facilitate the renting of these sittings.

### MISSIONARY AND BENEVOLENT ALLOCATIONS.

The increased balance remaining at credit of the Weekly Offering Fund enables the Court to suggest suplementary grants to several schemes which have heretofore had our support, as also to aid some new and deserving objects. The following allocations are suggested:

Before concluding this report the Court desires to place on record its indebtedness to our Pastor for invaluable service rendered by him in bringing the affairs of the Church to their present prosperous condition. The Court also feels that it but voices the mind of the Congregation in expressing their high appreciation of the earnest and faithful manner in which he has during the many years of his pastorate proclaimed the Gospel message. As a tangible expression of these feelings the Court now suggests an addition of \$500 per annum to his stipend, commencing the first of January instant, which recommendation will no doubt meet with your unanimous approval.

The various Bible Classes of the School, referred to in the last report, have been continued with well sustained interest and attendance. Dr. MacVicar's course of lectures in the Congregational Bible class continues to draw large numbers who listen with much acceptance.

### MISSIONS.

Along with our growth in numbers, we are pleased to note a corresponding increase in Mission contributions. For the present year the amount is as follows:

This shows an advance on last year's figures of \$46 89. In addition to the above amount the usual collection was made on Thanksgiving Day, and distributed between the General Hospital and the "Creche."

### PICNIC.

The annual picnic of the Sabbath School was held at Otterburn Park on the 13th day of June, and was most enjoyable and successful in every way. We desire to express our sincere thanks to kind friends who helped with contributions and in other ways.

### MEETINGS.

The usual monthly businesss meetings have been held during the year, and have been well attended. The teachers continue to hold their sabbath afternoon prayer meeting, finding it one of the most pleasant and inspiring exercises of the day.

### FINANCES.

The largely increased attendance has considerably swelled the ordinary expenses of late years, and the working account, as will be seen from the detailed statement, shows a deficit. As the Deacons' Court, whom we take this opportunity to thank, have increased their grant to \$300, for the current year, we hope to stand in a better position in this respect at the beginning of 1893.

#### PRIZES.

The teachers decided at the beginning of the year that rewards should be given only to Miss Shaw's class for diligence in Mission Collections, and these will be distributed at this meeting.

### CONCLUSION.

In external things, then, this has been, through God's grace, a most prosperous year with us. Let us hope that in spiritual things we have not been standing still. Such results, as was remarked at the annual meeting of the congregation, cannot be represented by figures—But we have God's promise that His word will not return unto Him void, and we have faith to believe that the good seed which has been sown will, in His own time and way, bring forth an abundant harvest.

Our annual pic-nic was held this year at Hudson, on June 27th. We went by Grand Trunk Railway. The day was most favorable, and all enjoyed themselves.

Our library is well filled with suitable books, and is freely used by the scholars.

Religious papers and tracts are regularly supplied to the scholars.

Prizes are also given to those who repeat the shorter catechism, and a silver medal is given to the one bringing in the most new scholars during the year.

The lady teachers have met as a Dorcas Society, every Thursday, since October 9th, and clothing, shoes, etc., are distributed to those who are in need.

Singing classes have been held every Tuesday evening since October 30th, by Mr A. S. Ross and Miss Traquair.

The Band of Hope resumed its meetings on Oct. 23rd, and are, as usual, held fortnightly. There is a large attendance of parents and scholars, who show quite an interest in the meetings. A choice and varied programme is given each evening, and an address, bringing out the principles of temperance prominently before them.

A Missionary Society of the school meets regularly during the winter season, when a short address is given and missionary items read.

We have received several letters from the missionary of Crescent Street Church, the Rev. J. H. MacVicar, also from our pupil in Pointe aux Trembles school. These have been read to the school, and much interest is manifested in them.

## Anzareth Street Mission.

During the past year, the work at the Mission Hall has been continued along the lines of former years. Services have been held on Thursday, and Sunday evenings. The attendance at these meetings has been good. During the summer as a rule fewer people attend, after being shut up for a week in their close and dusty workshops, they are strongly inclined to take a stroll by the river, or to resort to one of the up-town parks on Sunday evenings with their families, away from the oppressive air, and smoky begrimed streets of their homes.

Last summer however the attendance was larger than the year preceding, at the same season. In winter large numbers of people avail themselves of the privilege of gospel meetings, and the services seem to be much appreciated; as a rule there are present fewer men than women. One marked difference this year is that larger numbers of the young manifest an interest. It is most encouraging to see the boys and the girls of the sunday school regularly taking their places at the meetings, sometimes bringing their parents and friends with them. These young people are the most difficult to interest, and often it is a most trying experiment to secure their attention; the mission hall being on the corner of two streets, where in the summer evenings crowds of boys are shouting and playing, and when the street cars and cabs gallop over the stony pavement, amid all this to secure and hold the attention of an audience, especially when the hall is hot and uncomfortable. is no easy matter. In regard to order however we have nothing to complain; those attending the services have due regard for the house of God, and as a rule are in behaviour most discreet.

During the winter a missionary meeting called the "Honan Mission Band" meets fortnightly, on Wednesday evenings at 8 o'clock; its object is to interest the young, by giving them an opportunity of contributing something for the work, and of hearing missionary news from the

different fields of the world, more especially from Honan. The meetings thus far have proved a success, the members taking an active part in the work.

This winter there has been a good deal of sickness. Many applications have been made to us for help in securing situations; we have been able to do little in this respect, but many worthy cases have been helped. Had the winter been more severe, great destitution would have prevailed. We take this occasion of thanking the Session of Crescent Street Church for twenty dollars as a relief fund, and Mr. David Morrice for donations of flannel and underclothing.

It is with regret that we state that Mr. Tener, for two years with us in the work, resigned in the month of August: he was most successful as a worker, and was always a welcome visitor to the homes of the people. Mr. J. W. McLeod, student in third year theology, has taken up the work for the winter.

In conclusion, we acknowledge our gratitude to God for being permitted to labor for another year in His name.

The first regular meeting of this Auxiliary was held on Friday, October 2nd, 1891. Since then the meetings have been held regularly on the first Friday of the month.

The attendance, though not so large as it ought to have been, has been regular, and the work has gone on steadily.

The two branches of work which we have helped, are that of the trained nurse, among the poor and deserving in our midst; and Mission work in the North West.

The first is a much needed and now well established work in our city; it is a great help and assistance to our Presbyterian Ministers and christian workers; the latter is a great and necessitous field. At the outset we undertook to raise \$400—\$200 to be appropriated to city work, and \$200 for the North West.

That for the city work has already been paid into the Treasurer of the Society. There are \$140 on hand toward our obligation to the North West.

We have assisted in paying the salary of Mr. Rodgers at Nelson, B. C., from whom we have received letters. To show the needs of the North West, we quote from parts of a letter lately read at one of our meetings:

"To me this North West work is at once the most hopeful and the most hopeless part of our church work. The seed being sown on prairie and among the mountains, may bring harvests of untold wealth to our King; but other seeds are being sown, and they too must grow and will sow themselves again, and of the awful harvest, how can christians bear to think! For me it is difficult to understand the comfortable feelings of satisfaction that fill the minds and

hearts of good people in our Eastern congregations, who sit in a \$50,000 or a \$70,000 church and sing praise to Him who wandered over the mountains for a single sheep in the cold and darkness. Seventy thousand dollars! ten thousand more than was spent for the whole work in the North West last year!"

The nurse's work goes on as usual, the story of poverty and trouble is very much the same all the world over. Miss McSween has helped to relieve the distress of a great many poor people by nursing them when sick and by providing food and clothing when needed.

The report of the Mother's Meetings at Nazareth Street Mission from the Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Slessor, is as follows:—"With the exception of Mrs. G. A. Grier, the president of the parent society, who opens and closes the meetings, the ladies who assist are all from our own congregation. The Committee buy cotton and flannel at wholesale prices and sell it to the women, who make it up at the meetings. The children are in classes, they are taught to sow, and in the larger classes many of the girls make garments for themselves; all the ladies seem deeply interested in the work, and with God's help and guidance we trust it may increase in usefulness."

At each of our meetings papers have been read about the work in foreign fields, which have served to give much information and create an interest in mission work.

It is with regret that we have to state, that owing to Miss Watson, our President having to leave the city, we have been deprived of her assistance; but we have to thank Mrs. Mackay who has so ably filled the chair during the past meetings. We must also thank Mrs Morton for her unwearied efforts in connection with the work of the Society.

This being our first year's work, we earnestly hope that the success which has attended us may by God's blessing go on increasing, and that many sad lives may be cheered and comforted through our efforts. There are still many ladies in the congregation who could help us very much by taking an active interest in this great work of sending the Gospel to those who have it not.
