Progress the Word.

"The parish should ever be moving forward," he continued, "and moving to a definite aim. The current of the individual life should always be setting towards some clearly defined mark, and that mark the highest possibl."

Stagnation and lethargy were alike fatal to institution and individual. The preacher then pointed out that there should be a growing sense of the corporate life of the parish. While this sense had been growing of late, it should continue to grow stronger until every worshipper felt that he was in truth a member of the body.

An increased sense of the corporate life of the parish would inevitably lead to a larger sense of responsibility for personal service. There are diversities of gifts, and in the church's activities every one can find scope for the special endowments God has given him in par-





CITY TREASURER HOME DISCUSSES BOND SALE

W. J. O'Hara Wasn't Slighted Says Mr. Coady-British Trade Affected By Tariff Revision

"It's easy to make an offer after the city has effected a sale of its bonds," the comment made by City Treasurer R. T. Coady in referring to the letter of H. O'Hara and Co., criticizing the manner in which the negotiations carried on.

were carried on.

Mr. Coady arrived in the city yesterday after an absence of eleven weeks. It was necessary for him to remain five weeks longer than Mayor Oliver to put the finishing touches on the negotiations, and he is satisfied that the terms secured are excellent. He said he did not recall any request from W. J. O'Hara for an interview, but that Mr. O'Hara could have called upon him at any time, as did other financiers. Delivery of the bonds unstamped at 1-2 would have only netted the city par ,the terms actually obtained from the city's own bankers, Coates & Co., with whom he preferred to deal, other conditions being equal.

City Saved \$12,500.

Mr. Coady said that the city did not save \$5000 by sending the bonds unit signed to England, as reported from New York, but about half that amount, but that by putting thru the deal before the new stamp act became operative, the city undoubtedly saved about \$10,000.
