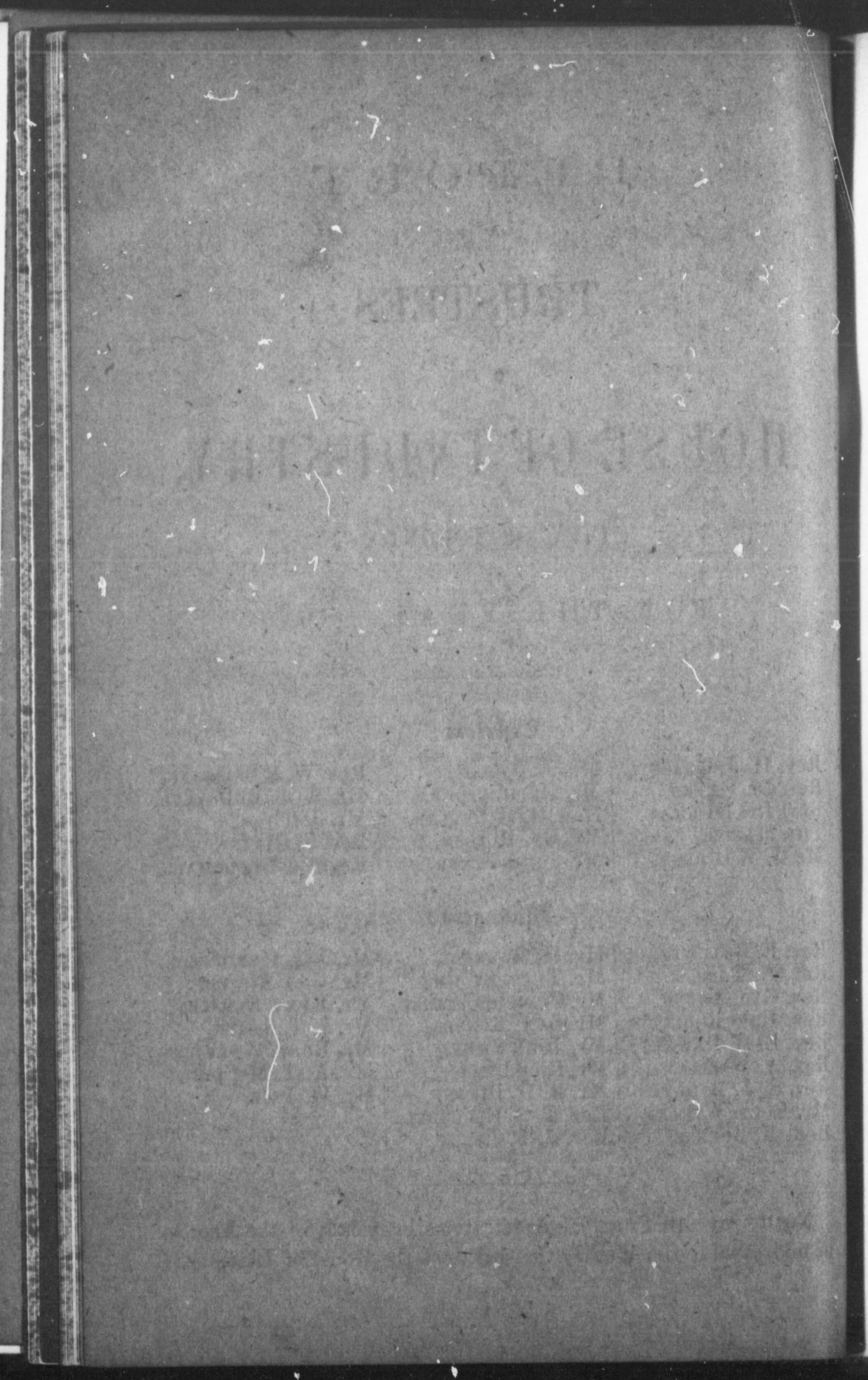

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

---

The following is the report of the Trustees and Managers :—

“The Trustees and Managers of the Toronto House of Industry, have much pleasure in hereby laying before the public their usual annual report. They are enabled to say, as in former years, that it has been their constant aim to carry out faithfully the object of the charity, and that their exertions have been attended with eminent success. They would refer to the Reports of the Superintendent and the Medical Officer for a detailed statement of the nature and amount of relief granted by the House, and also to the Report of the Treasurer (duly audited) for a statement of the various expenses of the institution.

“The Trustees and Managers have to tender their thanks to the public for their liberal contributions to the funds of the charity, so cheerfully given in response to their annual appeal, and also to the City Council for the handsome grant which they continue from year to year. Owing to the recent changes in our political constitution, the Government grant has been in arrears for some time. The Board of Managers have been incurring the ordinary liabilities in the confidence that the arrears will soon be received, and the grant continued as usual.



“The public may feel assured that no pains are spared to expend their contributions judiciously, and to ascertain as far as possible that the recipients of relief are deserving persons. They would again invite the public to satisfy themselves by personal inspection of the excellent management and working of the institution.

“It is with the highest gratification that the receipt of two munificent legacies to the House of Industry is this year announced ; one from the late R. Cathcart, Esq., for \$2,000—the other from the late George Michie, Esq., for a like sum. Both these sums have been invested in City of Toronto debentures, and are now yielding a handsome addition to the resources of the charity.

“The Trustees have to regret the resignation during the year, owing to ill health, of their excellent Treasurer, J. W. Brent, who for the past twelve years filled that important office with untiring zeal.

“The Board have again the pleasure of expressing their satisfaction with the manner in which the Superintendent and Matron have discharged their duties during the past year.

## MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT FOR 1867.

---

The Medical Officer then submitted his Report, from which it appeared that the health of the regular inmates during the past year has been better than usual, but owing to the closing of the General Hospital a large number of incurable cases were admitted, and consequently the average number of deaths was increased. A number of persons from other portions of the Province, too ill to be cured, were admitted. The Report then continues as follows : During the past year, as usual, the Hospital has been visited several times by order of the Committee, while a number of families have been seen at their own homes, and their cases reported to the Board, or prescribed for, as circumstances required. I have also visited the House regularly twice a week, and whenever any of the inmates were seriously ill, as much oftener as appeared necessary. I have written over eleven hundred prescriptions for the sick poor, in connection with the House, during the year, and made up all the medicines directed. Fifteen have died, being less than the average for a series of years, viz :
