CANADA WILL GET A TARIFF PREFERENCE

TARIFF PREFERENCE MONTREAL, June 27-Information has reached Montreal that the customs union of British South Africa is about to grant Canada substantial tariff preferences. On wheat the rebate is specified as 2d per 100 pounds and the same rebate ap-plies also to bran, barley, oats, rye, peas and beans, while upon flour the rate is 3r. per 100 pounds. Specified in their tariff under classes 2, 3, 4, 5 are numerous imported articles of a rebate of three per cent. ad valorem. Among these manufactured goods and in which Canada is specially interested and boots and shoes, carriages, carts, harness and sadlery, biscuits, all woolen and cotton goods, asbestos packing and boiler composition, bolts, nails, nuts and the like, cement, fruits, plastene, manufactured iron and stoel, galvanized iron, lead pipe, leather, paper of all descrip-tions, steel rails and all articles pertain-ture, telegraph and telephone materials. On the free list are placed a number of articles important to the Camadian trade, acting and floor boards and fresh fruits. The rebates granted will be sufficiently large to equal the freight charges.
