## ZIONIST PLAN

Contributions Announced at Convention in Boston-Hosts Fined Themselves For Disappointment

Boston, July 8-At the Zionist Convention Samuel H. Borossky offered the following resolution, which was signed by himself and several other delegates: "Resolved that a committee of ten be

"Resolved that a committee of ten be appointed by the chair to define and establish the rights, powers and duties of the provisional Zionist convention, and the form and manner of representation therein; and to report the same to this convention for a ratification."

The resolution was offered to the committee on resolutions. A matter which occasioned much debate was the question of the assumption by the federation of the liabilities and property of the Yiddische Folk, the most important Jewish publication in the United States. There were four items under consideration in connection with the resolution, and at length it was adopted and the federation accordingly will assume full control of the publication. Grand Master Joseph Barondess made an earnest plea for the publication, and Mrs. Richard Gottheil, wife of Professor Gottheil, of Columbia University, announced that she would donate \$100 towards the publication.

THE ROYAL FAMILY.

Q.—A Claims that the surname of King George is Guelph; B maintains that whilst King George is of the house of Guelph, he has no surname. Which is right?—A. K., Montreal.

Q.—A few years ago the writer applied to you requesting information as to whether His Majesty the King had a surname or not, and you replied in the negative, saying that the Royal Family was older than surnames and that the British College of Heraldry concurred in this view. This argument having since arisen, an application was made to an English paper, and it gave the answer that the surname was Wettin. Would you be good enough to advise me of your views regarding this?—R. H. P., St. John, N. B.

A.—The royal family of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland have, properly speaking, no surname, authorities say, its members being described by their princely titles. When Prince Albert and Queen Victoria were maried, February 19, 1840, the Christian ames "Albert" and 'Victoria" were all the names used; nor has any other style yer been used, so far as we can discover, the history of the present royal family. Prince Albert, grandfather of King George, was descended from the Counts of Wettin, whose name was derived from a castle which stood near the small town of that name on the Saale, in Germany. Their line goes back to a time before surnames came into use. The earliest known ancestor was one Dietrich, Count of Hassegau or Hosgau, who was killed while fighting Hungarians in 982 A. D. His sohs, Dedo and Frederick, received lands taken from the Wends, including the country or "gau" of Wettin, on the right bank of the Saale. In subsequent tenturies, the history of the family became merged in that of Meissen, Saxony, and the four Saxon dukedoms,




