YUKON AWAKENING FROM WINTER SLEEP

Rush to Gold Fields of Alaska Will Be Started This Week

Fairbanks, Alaska, May 10.—The ice of the Chena River, which has retarded the rush to the gold fields of Alaska, is melting and the first boats are scheduled to leave Fairbanks on Thursday and with their departure will begin a big stampede to the Klondike gold fields. Two thousand prospectors have already made preparations to go down the river to the Klondike country and before the season is well started it is expected that this number will be largely increased. The water-front of Fairbanks resembles a vast shipyard; fourteen large steamships and hundreds of small craft are tied up and wharves ready to start.

TODAY IN LONDON

King George's Consideration for His People Is Early Shown—Queen Mother Well—Redmond Brings to Premier's Attention Matter of Coronation Oath

HEARD OF THE KING'S DEATH WHILE AT SEA

Robt. Thomson and Judge Armstrong Arrived Home Today After Their Long Trip to The Mediterranean

Robert Thomson and Judge J. R. Armstrong returned today after their Mediterranean trip, having been away since February last. Both report having had a pleasant trip. The news of the death of King Edward was received aboard their steamer, the Wilmot, by wireless, on Sunday last. Judge Armstrong said that they sailed on the Celtic on February 2 last. They called at the Azores and Madeira before reaching the Mediterranean. From Gibraltar they went to Naples and Genoa. They left the steamer at Alexandria, they went up the Nile, spending a week in the desert, where they spent several days. They next went to Constantinople and the Grecian Archipelago. From Athens they journeyed home by rail, and arrived in Genoa on the Romanic and while at sea, as last, received the message of the king's death on Sunday.

Budapest, May 10.—Two persons were killed and two seriously injured in a political riot at Venice yesterday. There was a demonstration against the candidate of the National Labor party, and the guards fired on the mob.

The two suspects, however, established alibi and were released. Witnesses testified at the hearing that their identification of Rondo was made more certain because of his injured eye.

IN DEATH HE LOOKED EVERY INCH THE KING

The Last Moments in Life of Edward VII—Servants, in Tears, Take Last Look at Master and Monarch
(By Percival Phillips in New York American)
London, May 9.—The body of King Edward VII, reposed today in the narrow bed in his favorite room overlooking the grounds of Buckingham Palace, where he died. One of His Majesty's equerries and a lifelong friend told me immediately after the death chamber this afternoon that His Majesty looked peaceful, as though asleep.

In Death Every Inch a King
He had grown very careworn and weary in the last days. His beard became white, his cheeks, flabby, with dark circles under the eyes. The terrible strain of the almost incessant sitting of coughing which killed him are marked on the countenance, yet everyone who has seen him today was struck with the same dignity. In death he looked every inch a king.

During the king's last moments there was a paroxysm of coughing, about 8 o'clock, he relaxed again into a comatose condition, proved futile. Alexandra tearfully knelt beside the bed. It was after 11 o'clock when it became evident that life was fast ebbing away, that the queen, in a voice choked by weeping, again endeavored to rally him. He lay unconscious and motionless. The dramatic silence in the death chamber was broken by the low voice of the Archbishop of Canterbury, reading the prayers for the dying, and the king's voice breathing.

Suddenly he opened his eyes, looked at the queen with a glance of recognition, and tried to lift his hand. The effort was too much. The eyelids dropped, and so, without a pang or tremor, King Edward died.
Queen, at Sunrise, Beside Bed
The queen remained for nearly an hour beside the body before she consented to go to her own apartments. She spent several times during the night, and sunrise found her again beside the bed.

The king's servants, on every other opportunity today of seeing the face of their beloved master. Every man in King Edward's employ was sincerely and deeply devoted to him. There was Hawkins, his body servant, with the official title of Sergeant Footman of Household, who held the first place in His Majesty's confidence, who had accompanied him everywhere for thirty years, and had slept in the next room when abroad, had opened the carriage door whether the king proceeded to a coronation or a country house, who had waited on him at table whether at a state dinner at Buckingham or at a table d'hôte in a French hotel. He, with the king's valet, his butler, his footman, his man named Fehr, two or three other individuals whom the king trusted, were asked by Queen Alexandra, ever where for their duty to pay a last visit to the death chamber.

Servants, in Tears, Have Last Look
They chose an hour when the queen was trying to eat luncheon. They crept silently into the bedroom and stood about the body, the tears streaming down their faces. Nurse Fletcher, who attended the king in all his illnesses, great and small, since his serious operation in the coronation year, sat in the room and one royal page was at the door. No other guests were admitted. The room is draped in black, and no attempt has been made to give it any appearance of festivity. A few flowers stand on a small table beside the bed.

Edward lying in state in Westminster Hall will furnish the most splendidly impressive spectacle ever witnessed in the present generation. The body, embalmed, will be placed in a lead shell, and in a wooden shell, and both in an outer coffin of massive oak, hewn from a tree trunks felled in Windsor forest. Workmen of Windsor will tomorrow begin fashioning the coffin, which will be partly plain, with a silver plate in the centre of the lid bearing the king's name and titles in Latin.

For two days, and perhaps longer, the body thus encased will lie in the Throne Room, which will be converted into a Chapel Ardent with the windows shut, and the walls draped in black and silver. Tall tapers will surround the coffin which will rest under a purple pall, used only in royal funerals, while the guards will be furnished by the King's regiment of Grenadiers.
Three Days For Public View
This lying in state will be for the benefit of foreign royalties who will be unable to arrive sooner. Very few outside persons will be admitted. From the palace the body will be conveyed on a gun carriage to Westminster Hall via Pall Mall, and placed near the centre of the historic apartment, near the spot where Charles the First is reputed to have stood when con-

denial to death. For three days at least, the public will be admitted from 6 o'clock in the morning until sunset, entering through the palace yard, passing the east and leaving the hall near St. Margaret's church.
From Westminster Hall the body will move through London to Paddington station a three-mile route lined with 40,000 troops, and then en route for Windsor.

ENGLAND'S PROBLEM

High Prices, Low Wages; Cost of Every Necessity of Life is Higher, But Wages are Smaller Now Than a Few Years Ago
Charles P. Stewart cables the Pittsburgh Dispatch from London, as follows:—
The cost of living in England, as elsewhere, is going up, and of the forty-four million people in the United Kingdom, five million can't afford the price. Ten million others are not too well fed. For the condition of poverty Conservatives blame free trade. Liberals say it is fault of the House of Lords. Protectionists attribute it to drink. Socialists point the accusing finger at private ownership. Currency experts find the source of the evil in overproduction of gold.

In England, the land of cheap food, bacon, the national breakfast dish, has risen in price from 18 cents to 28 cents a pound in about six years; ramp steak, which used to cost 20 cents a pound, now costs 25; pork and veal cost 21 cents a pound; eggs are 30 cents a dozen. Vegetables, imported from Belgium, Holland, Lincolnshire, but are always higher, than in America.

Prices are also rising. So is fuel. Coal costs 86.75 at retail, and to the very poor, who must buy in small quantities, even more. Of all the necessities of life, clothing alone shows no tendency to advance. And while in other parts of the world, wages advance with, though perhaps not quite so fast as, the cost of living, in England, on the other hand, as prices go up wages go down.

One-half the workers are paid less than 20 shillings, or \$0 weekly. This estimate is official and includes men, women and children. Five years ago it was estimated that this same half received 25 shillings or less. For this wage employers generally require from a ten to a 13-hour working day.

Union bricklayers, masons, carpenters, slaters, plumbers and plasterers earn 25 shillings a week, an hour throughout England, Scotland and Wales. Union printers average 20 shillings, or about \$2.50 weekly. In the offices of the big London morning newspapers considerably more is paid, some expert linotype operators getting as high as \$15 weekly.

Non-unionists are worse off. A non-union printer who was summoned before a coroner to explain why he had not called in a doctor before the death of his child, testified that though employed by a large London concern for four years, he only got \$3 per week and could not afford a doctor. The autopsy showed absolutely no fat in his little body. The upper class Englishman, according to Dr. Clement Duke, measures 5 ft. 10 in., and weighs 155 pounds, while the average man among the poor is 5 ft. 8 in., and weighs 125 pounds. The reason for the difference is that the poor man does not get enough to eat.

THE KING TREATED THE WHOLE TROOP

Walter J. Lamb of St. John Tells of Incident of His Soldiering in Ireland When the Late Monarch Was a Young Officer

Among the many in St. John who cherish interesting recollections of the late beloved Edward VII in his younger days when he was Prince of Wales, is one who had served his late majesty and his mother Queen Victoria, for twenty-six years in army uniform, Walter J. Lamb, late sergeant-major in the 3rd Regiment C. A., and for some time previous caretaker at the Barrack Green.

It was a right popular, young officer, was Edward, said the old soldier to a Times-Star reporter yesterday, at his home in St. John, a striking picture, and well liked by his men, when he was recruiting in Koroogh, Kildare, in '91, and not only then but all his life. I was a soldier in the Tillery, then, and Prince Edward was an officer in the Footguards. Our regiment was right behind his on the occasion spoken of by Mr. Hawker in your paper of Saturday last. Just to show you what kind of an officer the late king was, let me tell you a little yarn about him on a march-out.

It was pretty hot day, and we were marching along a dusty road near Mayborough. Naturally he grew thirsty, the prince, as well as the rest of us. I suppose, well, he wanted to stand a quart of beer a man for us, but one of his brother officers objected. This didn't stop him, though for he was so determined to treat, that we all, that is the whole troop, had a pint of beer as his expense. He was a good officer, and his men respected him because he respected them, and used them squarely.

PAY \$60 OR GO TO JAIL FOR THREE MONTHS

Carleton Stabbing Case Tried in Police Court—Rum the Cause of Trouble Says Judge—A Mercy Matters Were Not Worse

Shubal Carvill was fined \$60 or three months jail in the police court this morning. The charge was that he assaulted and cut with a knife Jay K. Tutts. Edwin Olsen was allowed to go on a charge of lighting.

An argument ensued and was continued until Olsen and Stevens alighted. Carvill remaining to the assistance of his friend and Tutts to his friend's aid. Reid shouted a warning to the witness that Carvill had a knife and when the clench was broken, Carvill ran at Reid, coming back at Tutts. In his second clench the witness saw he was stabbed by Carvill, who cut his arm with a knife, saying he "would cut his heart out."

To Mr. Baxter, witness said that with the exception of McArthur all had been drinking. Stevens gave evidence similar to this. Wm. McArthur corroborated the evidence and added that Carvill going up the floats had threatened to give him a "swal in the mouth."

To Mr. Baxter the witness said he had struck Carvill as well as McLeod. He told the court that on Thursday night last, when the trouble occurred, he had been drinking a little.

His Honor remarked that it was God's mercy that Taff's had not been more seriously injured and that Carvill faced no graver charge. Rum was the blame for the whole affair. There was no excuse, however, for the use of the knife.

BROTHERS, BOTH POSTMEN, AT ODDS IN POLICE COURT

Walter Macaulay, a letter carrier, had his brother, Macaulay, also a letter carrier, in court this morning and charged him with assault. The latter pleaded guilty, and a fine of \$20 was struck, but allowed to stand in view of the fact that the defendant promised not to molest his brother, and to keep off his premises.

Mr. Rowley enjoyed general good health until lately, but even then was not compelled to take to his bed until Sunday. He was twice married. His second wife, who was Mrs. Cameron, together with two sons—A. E. Rowley, station master at Westfield Beach, and W. H. Rowley, of Carleton, survive. The funeral will be on Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.
