Acceptance of these offers, hailed by the union men as "the first break in the ranks of the operators" may result in the negotiation of separate contracts and the reopening of the mines affected, according to district presidents of the U. M. W. of America.

J. C. Golden, president of district 9, at Shamokin, said that at the mine of the Philadelphia and Reading Coal Co. at Locust, Pa., thirty men have been digging frantically for three months in search of a miner S. Huliski, who disappeared under an avalanche of hard coal early last January.

Nine hundred tons of anthracite have been temoved from the scene of the collapse in the effort to uncover Huliski's body, Mr. Golden asserted. If the work goes on, he said, shipments of coal removed in the rescue work would continue at the rate of about twenty tons a day.

GOVERNMENT WINS BIG VICTORY IN BRITISH HOUSE

A Resolution of Confidence Passed by Vote of 379 to 84 Lloyd George in a Stirring Speech.

Premier Lloyd George's resolution call-ing for confidence in the government's policy on the coming conference at Genoa was adopted by the British Hous of Commons last night by a vote of 372 to 94. Previous to this, an amendment proposed by Robert Slynes, Laborite, declaring that the government did not have the confidence of the country,

not have the confidence of the country, was defeated by a vote of 379 to 84.

Lloyd George said his resolution gave the house an opportunity of approving or disapproving the objects of the Genoa conference and the make up of the Genoa delegation, and that if the resolution were defeated it would be equivalent to a vote of no confidence in the government. He said the official opposition amendment challenged, not the object, but the scope of the conference. He did not believe such a body as the Genoa conference could properly consider the revision of existing treaties, even in the event that this was desirable.

The trouble in Europe had been attributed largely to the reparations exacted by the treaties, said Lloyd George, but the treaties did not create the repar-

ations.

Their creation was due to the fact that there was something to repair. If the treaty of Versailles were altered, he declared, it would only transfer the burden from Germany to France.

Lloyd George said there were two considerations in dealing with the problem of reparations. The first was that if the payments were insisted upon beyond the power of the war-exhausted country a crisis would be precipitated which would not be confined to Germany. The second was that Germany's ultimate capacity to pay must not be judged by her present capacity, when
