Paris, July 25-On the north bank of the Marne the Germans last night Twelve Per Cent Too Low For launched a counter-attack in the region of Dormans. The war office, in announce ing this movement, reports that the enemy temporarily occupied the little wood to the north of Treloup and the village of Chassins. These positions, however, were recaptured by the French soon afterwards. Violent artillery actions are reported from the region of the Ourcq and to the west of Rheims. South of Mont Didier a surprise attack allowed the French to capture thirty prisoners.

KING GEORGE AS STOKER ON UNITED STATES FLAGSHIP

London, July 25—An incident of the visit of King George to the American battle squadron which forms part of the British grand fleet, shows that he has not forgotten his naval training. After inspecting the crew of the American flagship, the king was conducted through the ship by Rear Admiral Rodman. Like every other vessel in the grand fleet she is always in instant readiness to put to sea. While inspecting her stoke holds the king noted this fact. Admiral Rodman thereupon suggested that he should help to keep the vessel in steam and the king promptly responded by picking up a shovel and throwing coal into her furnaces, in expert, stoke-like fashion.

"It is not the first time I have done this," he remarked laughingly.

"You are a lot better fireman than I am," responded the admiral.

"You must remember," replied the king, "that my naval training was pretty thorough."



London, July 25, via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—Presiding at a luncheon of the British Empire Producers to Pre-mier Lloyd of Newfoundland, former Premier Morris, urged the necessity of an entirely new attitude regarding trade for purposes of Empire safety. He declared: "We intend to produce within the Empire all that the Empire requires,

and we are determined that our partnership of nations shall not be one in name only."

Mr. Lloyd said the British had a habit of depreciating their own efforts and it was having a bad effect among the Allies, who did not understand that the work of Great Britain in this war was phenomenal. The world at large should know this story.



GERMANS FAIL

(Late War Summary by Associated Press.)

Violent German counter-attacks and rear guard actions in great strength still fail to serve the German high command as barriers to the advance of the Allied troops on the Soissons-Rheims salient.

True, they have aided somewhat in slowing down the fast pace set by the Allies at the commencement of the offensive, but nevertheless on the three sides of the new U-shaped front further important gains have been made.

Driving slowly, but surely, south of Soissons the French and American troops have pushed their fronts farther eastwards toward that part of the Soissons-Chateau Thierry railway line that is still in the hands of the enemy and farther south, mong both sides of the Ourcq River and the road leading to Fere-Enlouse for the supply of her troops to the south, important penetrations into enemy-held territory have been made until the maximum point where the Allies are fighting near Coincy is about 101-2 miles from their point of departure last Thursday.

In the Marne region north of

their point of departure last Thursday.

In the Marne region north of Chateau Thierry the French and Americans have met with the fiercest kind of resistance, for here the German machine gunners and infantrymen are striving hard to stay their progress in an endeavor to extricate large numbers of the German forces who are in danger of capture, and also to save part of the enormous numbers of guns and war material which it is impossible to get out except by the high roads over the undulating and wooded country.

In this region the Allies now hold the villages of Epieds and Trugny-Epieds, which were captured by the Germans and were recaptured Wednesday in a counterattack by the Americans. Pressing on northward the Allies have driven their front beyond Courpoil, which lies about 61-2 miles northeast of Chateau Thierry.

Along the Marne at several points, notably in the region of Charteves and Jaulgonne and farther east at Treloup the Allies have put the northern bank of the Marne farther behind them in advances and captured a large number of cannon and machine guns and considerable war material.

In the region between the Marne

In the region between the Marne and Rheims, where the German crown prince has brought forward large numbers of picked reinforcements to stay the British, French and Italians, his warriors are meeting with hard usage, Following up the advances of the French and Italians of Tuesday the British immediately to the southwest of Rheims apparently have begun a movement which possibly portends far-reaching results.

results.

Here the British have overcome a strong counter-attack and, following it, a violent bombardment, and struck the German line at Vrigny for a goodly gain. This manoeuvre, if it is pressed to further advantage will seriously menace the Rheims-Fismes Railway a scant three miles to the north and also will tend materially to lessen the girth of the mouth of the pocket through which the Germans are endeavoring to retreat from the Soissons-Rheims salient.

Gauged by the war maps, the

salient.
Gauged by the war maps, the new inroads of the Allied troops into the German-held territory necessarily add further to the extreme gravity of the situation of the Germans inside the huge pocket, and with the long range guns on both sides of the "U" heavily shelling them assiduously, and with the infantry attacking them on all sides with rifle and light gun fire their situation seemingly is a hazardous one.




