Plans for Year Include Two Schools, Hospital and Orphanage Wings.

Not for many years have the prospects for building activities in and about the city of St. John seemed so bright as they are at the present time, and if the plans which are now under consideration are carried out this year, the amount of building done will be at least three to five times that of

The building permits issued for the calendar year 1923 covered construction totaling in value some \$300,000.

Plans already under way and more or less definitely decided upon, call for an expenditure of approximately \$1,200,000.

In addition to those projects

which have reached the blueprint stage, there are operations in the process of discussion which if they are realized increase the activity a hundredfold, including the installation of a big coking and by-products plant here.

Hotel Tenders Close.

First on the building programme which has already taken definite shape is the Admiral Beatty Hotel, for which tenders close today in Montreal. The estimated cost of this work is placed at \$600,000. The site of this structure has been cleared of buildings and stands ready for the commencement of work as soon as the contract is of work as soon as the contract is

signed.

S. Allan Thomas, of the firm of Thomas, Armstrong & Bell, left yesterday for Montreal where he will receive the tenders at the offices of Ross & McDonald, architects. He will bring the tenders to St. John and they will be opened at a meeting of the local board of directors, which will be held either at the end of the week or early in next week. Ten firms have been figuring on the job and tenders are expected from all of them. In addition local contractors have submitted bids for sub-contracts on the several branches of work which will

Big Coking Plant.

The possibility of the erection of \$1,250,000 coking plant within the city limits is being seriously considered and should St. John be fortunate in securing this new industry it will mean another big boost to the building activity and consequent means of employment for a large number of men.

The New Brunswick Power Company also has plans made for the enlargement of its plant by the erection of additional gas holder capacity, which will call for an outlay of some \$100,000. The erection of a second caisson at the St. John dry dock at a cost of \$45,000 is now being carried out and it is understood that the company proposes grading the embankpany proposes grading the embank-ment at the head of the dock which



"Discrimination is dangerous to every one. It is the principle and not its present application that is a menace of serious proportions. The idea itself is destructive of Americanism, of everything that America must represent if she is to accomplish the purpose to which she was dedicated.

"Co-operation and not antagonism-can alone enable this country to endure. We are our own rulers. If we do not govern ourselves, despotism is the only alternative to be invoked to constrain

alternative to be invoked to constrain our conduct.

"Every race and every religion is represented among us. The vista of rancor and bitterness that opens up before us when we contemplate the opportunities provided by the revival of racial and religious bitterness is unending. The results of such conduct will not be sustained by those only against whom intolerance is manifested.

"Reprisals will be employed against any part of the people. Therein lies one of the most dangerous consequences of the attempted disqualification of any by virtue of distinctions that are wholly immaterial when considered in the light of essential citizenship. Those who are discriminated against on religious or racial grounds will of necessity combine for their own protection. Ottawa, May 1—Sir Louis Davies, Chief Justice for Canada, died here this morning at 12.35 after an illness of five days. He was 79 years of

Hon. Sir Louis Davies, K. C., K. C. M. G., Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, occupied a prominent position in the legal profession, in the field of politics, and finally on the bench for half a century. The late Chief Justice was a native of Canada's smallest province. He was, born in Charlottetown. Prince Edward Island, a son of Hon. Benjamin Davies, formerly Colonial Secretary of that province, and his wife Kezia Attwood Watts, on May 4, 1845.

His preliminary education, he received in his home province, but, having taken up the study of the law, he went to London, England, and completed his studies at the Inner Temple-He was called to bar in 1866, and created a Queen's Counsel in 1880. Sir Louis Davies entered the field of politics, as a Liberal, at an early age. His rarly political activities were confined to his native province, where he gained the appointment of Solicitor-General in the year 1859. Three years later he was elected to the House of Assembly and in 1876 became Premier and Attorney-General of the Province. He was appointed, with Sir Wilferid Laurier and Sir Richard Cartwight, one of the Joint High Commission which sat first at Quebec, and afterwards in Washington, for the settlement of all Canada's disputes with the United States.

APPEAL IS MADE

Premier Veniot's Address is Broadcast by Radio-Care is Stressed.

Premier Veniot's message to the province appealing against useless and avoidable waste by fire, was broadeasted by Donald Massie from Station CJCI, at the plant of the Maritime Radio Corporation last night.

In his address, Premier Veniot particularly stressed the necessity for all to exercise care in an effort to save

ticularly stressed the necessity for all to exercise care in an effort to save the forest wealth of the province.

The address follows:

"Fire prevention week is being observed this week throughout Canada, the proclamation being issued by the Governor-General of the Dominion Ottawa, setting aside the period from April 27 to May 3 as Fire Prevention Week, the aim being to awaken public interest in the deplorable losses caused by forest fires so that every means may be put forward to prevent the waste of the country's most valuable natural resources.

"Over three million dollars worth of the Province of New Brunswicks in the waste of New Brunswick. The in itself should be sufficient reason to arouse a public interest in the observance of Fire Prevention Week in New Brunswick. Protection of the forests from fire is absolutely necessary, and fire prevention is the most important phase of protection, because it means getting at the cause of fires and thus reaching the source of damage.

"There are times of continued dry weather when our forests become highly inflantmable. Forest fires when once under way are virtually impossible to stop by any human means, and it is these conflagrations which cause the immense losses of forest wealth. Thus prevention of forest fires—the control or elimination of the various causes—is the only method to stop huge losses during the greater part of the season. Fire prevention is to my mind the most important phase of forest protection, for it is well known that each summer there is fully five times as much timber destroyed in forest fires as is cut in all the timber berths from ocean to ocean.

It is the second largest industry in the province, ranking next to agriculture; it employs thousands of people all the year, in the woods in the winter and in the mills in the summer. The Province's forests are its chief source of revenue, over one million dollars coming into the Provincial treasury each year from our Crown Lands. In other words the forests provide the funds for the maintenance of our public services, the schools, bridges, roads, etc., and we must protect these valuable natural resources. The best protection that can possibly be provided is Fire Protection.

"Statistics show that only about one in every hundred fires is caused by natural forces, chieffy lightning. The rest, and by far the most serious and dangerous, result from carelessness. The Government have taken steps to control slash burning at all times and to prohibit it during what is regarded as the danger period. Last year it was found necessary to restrict forest travel and to cause all persons entering the forests to register and take out certificates of registration; to the inauguration of that system and the hearty co-operation of the people we credit the entire absence of serious fires last year in the central and southern portions of the province. As a matter of fact there was not one serious forest fire last year south of the Miramichi River; these districts where there had annually been large numbers of fires escaped, but the virgin forests in the northern counties suffered seriously, although our losses were not so extensive as in the neighboring Province of Quebec.

"The educational campaign which is being carried out during the week which has been set aside as Fire Prevention Week is certain to have farreaching effects. It has my hearty endorsation, and it is with pleasure that I urge the active co-operation and support of the people of the Province of New Brunswick."

The season of forest fires with their danger and destruction has about rolled around again.

Last summer 264 forest fires occurred in New Brunswick. The fire wardens were able to extinguish 208 of these in their early stages. But the remaining 56 destroyed vast areas of forests, homes, saw mills, camps, railway stations and wood products in the course of manufacture. The total damage was over three million dollars to private property.

Schools Are Helping.

Schools Are Helping.

This week Fire Prevention Week is being observed through Canada and the attention of everybody is thus being turned to save the forests. A programme specially prepared by the Junior Red Cross has been so planned as to take up one phase of the subject each day from Monday to Thursday with a review and summing up on Friday. The active co-operation of the school teachers is thus being secured and is expected to prove an important factor in influencing not only the children, but through the children the adult population.

New Brunswick's forest area comprises 15,000,000 acres, of which about one half is crown lands. The total value of the forest products of New Brunswick amounts each year to over \$25,000,000. There are 1,100 logging camps giving employment to about 19,000 men; there are 235 saw mills, 1 paper mill, 5 pulp mills, 113 portable saw mills and 35 finishing mills, which give employment to 10,000 men. More than \$5,000,000 is distributed in wages each year through the lumber industry in New Brunswick. These figures show that this province has a real interest in such a movement as Fire Prevention Week.



"Rum Row," said a Nova Scota captain to a reporter of the Hailfax Herald on Monday, "will soon be only a memory and the rum-runner as extinct as the dodo."

He had just returned after a trip to Boston and New York and his business brought him into contact with the people who knew the rum-running business in all its pristing glory.

"There are vessels selling high class whiskeys off New York today for \$22 a case, which is less than \$2 a quagt bottle," he said, "and they are losing money. On account of the demand for rum in the West Indies the natives have gone into the monoshine business and are selling their product for 40 cents a gallon. Of course it is vile stuff, bringing probably \$5 a gallon on the American coast when purchasers can be found. This rum is sometimes shipped before it is properly cooled.
