Catching Lobsters

Last week we referred to lobsters being hooked or speared in the waters of the harbor here, and stated that it was contrary to law. Owing to lack of space we omitted giving the reasons why, in our opinion, the law is a reasonable and just one. If a lobster is hooked or speared and subsequently lost the chances are that it will perish. If it should happen to be a female lobster carrying spawn, any person can readily understand the reasonableness of the law.

No person is prevented from trapping lobsters, for the reason that if on hauling his trap he finds female lobsters therein, he may throw the crustacean back into the water again and no harm is done. These rules were made to conserve this industry, which, at the prices obtainable for lobsters today, is a very valuable one.

Section 14 of the Rules and Regulations governing the fishery reads: "No person shall kill, catch, take, trap, buy, sell or can or have in his possession any female lobster carrying spawn, or any lobster less than eight inches in length."

The Fishery

Shore Fishery.
The reports from the shore fishery show that all along the coast small catches with hook and line are being taken daily, but nothing doing with traps. In many places the traps have been taken ashore, and given up for the season. In the early part of the summer there were some good trap hauls, but very little has been done with them anywhere lately. The captain struck the shores of Newfoundland much later than usual this year, and now it looks as if the squid school is to begin later. Usually squids appear in certain favoured localities on the 15th of July, but, as far as we know, none have yet appeared anywhere along the coast. Unless there is good fishing during the squid school this year, the voyage will be short.

Labrador Fishery.
At this writing, the prospects for an average Labrador fishery are not bright. There is a fair sign of fish along the southern part of the coast, but there is so much loose ice about no one cares to risk his twine in the water. The floating fleet, as distinct from the stationers, have gone away north, and nothing of their success or otherwise will be known for two weeks yet. Here is the latest report from the Labrador boat Sagona: "Arrived at Holton, the 13th. Prevailing winds from south to southwest, and weather cold and foggy the whole trip north. Slack ice from Battle Harbor to Holton. No sign of fish from Holton to Pack's Harbor. From Long Island to Domino, a sign of a good sign from Sandy Island to Battle Harbor, but very little done owing to ice interfering with twine. Returning south had fine weather. Ice clear of coast. All the 'floaters' have gone north. The Stella Maris has gone north of Holton."

Bankfishery.
The Western bankfishery, taking it all round, looks slightly better than it did this time last year. Captain T. Hollett, who appears to be high liner, reports for 3,500 quintals landed to date, and a number of other schooners had various figures from 2,000 to 3,000 quintals. Most of the fleet are gone on, what is considered, their last caplin baiting, and they will be looking for squid bait next trip. If the fall bankfishery turns out even average, this branch of the country's industry will be amongst the largest for some years. Unfortunately, it only cuts a very small figure in the whole catch of the Island. The figures for last year reached nearly 150,000 quintals.—Trade Review, July 20.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.

Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the message may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

At Little Rattling Brook salmon have been more plentiful than I ever saw them there. The River is clean and clear of logs. I have not seen one person fishing there, and all I can do is look at the big fish jumping. It is a pity we cannot induce some of the sportsmen who are hunched up on the West Coast to come this way. I assure you this is no fake news, and I would like to see this District advertised.

Feeding Horses
We feed cattle to produce milk or beef; sheep, to produce wool and mutton; hogs, to produce pork. The horse we feed to produce energy alone; and the amount and quality of the feed should be graduated according to the expenditure of energy to be demanded from the animal. If the horse is highly fed, and no sufficient outlet provided for the energy developed by the food, the result is disease and injury—sometimes fatal. If a great expenditure of energy is demanded of him, while he is fed insufficiently for its production, the demand is met by the consumption of the animal's own tissues, and by such a drain upon his vital powers as, again, may seriously impair his value. It is seen, then, that from the standpoint of the horse's physical well-being alone, the proper adjustment of rations to the amount of work performed is something well deserving of serious study. But on it, too, depends the question of the value of the horse and the comparative value of the horse and the machine in the operation of the farm. Wasteful or inconsiderate feeding may often cause the question to be determined to the disadvantage of the horse; whereas, with a ration adjusted each day to the amount of work required, he might hold his own, for a long time yet, against his puffing rival.

Potted Roses
There was a time when Englishmen used to eat on St. George's Day by feasting on roses as well as wearing them. Old cookery books abound in recipes into which rose leaves enter.
One writer tells how to make potted roses. "I first pound some of the most fragrant roses in a mortar; then I wash the brains of the bird and pigs well boiled and stripped of every particle of meat. I then add the yolks of some eggs, some oil, a little cardus, some pepper and some wine. After having beaten and mixed it well together I place it over a slow fire. When this dish is brought to table the most delicious fragrance issues forth, covering the guests with delight." Every good housewife in the seventeenth century made rose water, which was used for flavoring food.—London Chronicle.

Dutch Barge Song
All day at the tiller my old barge I ply,
And I sing at my work as the land passes by,
An old song of Netherlands rings of the soil,
An old song, a love song, a slow song of toil.
Through the green of the Summer and brown of the Fall,

Fishery Report
The fishermen have done well with the cod around St. John's during the past few days. One man who fishes down at the Battery has secured over two hundred quintals in his trap this summer.
Fish is reported plentiful at Bonaville, Green-pond and New Town. At each place trap men are doing well.
At Twiligate some of the men have with over six hundred quintals of fish in their traps this summer.
None of the Westville schooners have arrived from the Straits this year. This is due to the fact that there has been so much ice around this season making it almost impossible for fishermen to get their traps out.—News, July 2.

Game and Inland Fisheries
Watch Out for the Invidious Little Destroyer
We are all familiar with the moth miller seen flitting about in the early dusk during late spring and early summer. If when a closet door opens a number of those moths flutter out we may rest assured that mischief has been brewing there. Not that this moth itself has done or can do any injury. Its work is to lay the little eggs in fur or wool, wherever it can find a place. The eggs hatch twice (during the spring and early summer) into tiny grubs or caterpillars, and they do the mischief.
Almost the first work of the caterpillar after hatching from the egg is to eat holes in the material in which it nests. With that wool or fur it eats is spun a little silken cocoon, and this sheath shows as the insect grows. After a while it leaves its cocoon and hatches into a moth.
The period of development depends upon the temperature. In this climate there are two hatching times in one season. But the insect is sensitive to cold and does not develop unless the temperature is above 50 degrees hence has come the practice of placing furs and valuable rugs in cold storage, where, if already infested with eggs, no hatching can take place.
It behoves all home keepers to put all winter clothing away early—before these little pests get busy. In houses that are kept too warm there is danger of constant hatching of eggs, but, as a general rule, they do not hatch till early spring.
To prevent all moth-eating clothing should while the dyes are yet cold be thoroughly cleaned, rinsed and aired in the sun and whipped so that any eggs may be dislodged. They should then be put away in some way that will keep them from them.
Paper bags sealed at the top and boxes with covers sealed with strips of paper are best for storing furs and newspapers and other things which are excellent to wrap garments in, as moths will not touch either.
Carpets and rugs need particular attention and should be given frequent beatings in the sunlight. Many people spray all clothing with gasoline before putting away for the summer, and carpets and rugs may safely be treated in this way. Camphor and moth balls are of absolutely no use if eggs are in the garments when they are put away. The only use of camphor is that it repels the moth by its odor and no moth will go near it.

Philadelphia, July 22.—A body of a man lashed to a spar, with fingers grasping ropes, was sighted floating in the ocean about seventeen miles from the scene of the Titanic disaster by the British steamship Hudson, which just arrived here. The body was unrecognizable. In addition, the Hudson reported the presence of a great quantity of floating debris in the direct path of the northern steamship lines. When the spar was sighted, two bergs were floating nearby.

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
Public Notice

Inspection of Weights and Measures
The following Sections of the Weights and Measures Act passed during the recent Session of the Legislature, are published for general information.
R. WATSON, Colonial Secretary, Department of the Colonial Secretary, May 10th, 1912.
No manufacturer or dealer in weights or measures who has in his possession for sale any weight or measure shall be bound to have the same inspected and stamped hereunder, so long as the same remains in his manufactory, store or warehouse, but no such weight or measure shall be removed from his premises, sold or taken into use for trade, without being inspected or stamped, and any such dealer or manufacturer who permits any such weight or measure to be removed from his premises, sold or taken into use for trade, without being inspected or stamped, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars: Provided that no weight or measure so inspected and stamped shall require any other inspection or stamping within twelve months.

All fresh meats imported for sale and all hay imported for sale in screwed or pressed packages shall be weighed by the vendor, who shall attach to each piece of meat and package of hay a ticket marked with the weight thereof, and such meats and packages purchased shall be re-weighed by the vendor in the presence of the purchaser, if desired, at the time of delivery, under a penalty of not exceeding ten dollars for each refusal so to do.

When scales are sent to factories or to adjusters for repairs they must be re-inspected after such repairs are made, but one-half the fees in addition to those of the regular inspection shall be charged.



Opposition Papers And the Loan
 Is there any country within the limits of the British Empire where partisan politics carry men to such unpatriotic extremes as in this Newfoundland of ours?
 This query is suggested to us by the attitude of the Opposition press in St. John's in their criticism of the recent loan floated by the Premier a few weeks ago in London.
 They profess to see in the fact that the British investors have not immediately grabbed up Newfoundland's debentures bearing three and a-half per cent. interest a serious depression in Newfoundland's credit in the financial market of the world.
 They gloat over the incident as heartily as patriotic men would over some unprecedented good fortune to their native land.
 They work over-time and use up columns of their papers daily to convey the idea that because the British public have not tumbled over each other to take up Newfoundland's new issue at three and a-half per cent. interest that the Colony has suffered a set-back in the London money market.
 The sole object and tenor of their comments on the new loan is to discredit the country abroad and create a doubt in the minds of those at home as to the solvency of the Colony.
 Could partisan politics lead conscienceless knaves further? We doubt it. We doubt if any other British colony can produce journalists dishonest and shameless enough to pursue such tactics as the Editor of the Herald and Telegram, or a coterie of discredited politicians so lost to honor and principle as to seek party advantage at the expense of their country's credit.
 As Sir Edward Morris has pointed out, the Newfoundland loan has been floated on most favorable terms under existing conditions in the English Money Market.
 British Consols may be taken as the barometer of the English Money Market.
 The public despatch of the 23rd inst. said: "British consols sank to the low figure of 73 on Monday, the lowest in ninety years."
 Newfoundland's loan was floated under terms just as favorable to the Colony as were Canada's and New Zealand's and other British Colonial loans recently, notwithstanding that Canadian issues are wont to be regarded as amongst the gilt-edge securities on the London Market.
 Again, the loan of 1910 realized the high-water figure of 97, and taken in conjunction with the last loan, gives the splendid average of 96, which is equal to the best ever obtained for the Colony under more favorable conditions both at home and abroad.
 The men who are now trying to tarnish the credit of the colony in the hope that they may injure Sir Edward politically, went into ecstasies a few years ago over the loan raised by Sir Robert Bond.
 The Bond loan realized only 94, but with the proviso that the Colony should buy back her own debentures at stated intervals, and pay therefor the market price then prevailing, with the result that it has cost the taxpayers of this country as high as 118 dollars to purchase back the debentures for which Sir Robert Bond received only 94 dollars.
 In other words, Bond sold 100 dollars' worth of colonial securities to the English Bankers for 94 dollars and agreed to buy them back at the bankers' own figures, even though that be 150. As Mr. Morris pointed out at the time, the holders of our debentures under such a contract would take good care that they would not fall below a figure that would give them a handsome profit when this country would have purchased them in compliance with the terms of the flotation.

Home Report Fishery Pool
 The S. S. Home, Capt. Harbin, arrived at Humbermouth 9 a.m. Tuesday from Lewisporte and Straits ports. The captain wired the following to the Reid Nfld. Co.: "Straits now clear of ice. A little doing with codfish at Brador and Banc Sablon. At other places along the coast prospects bright."

 Mr. Frank O'Brien, of Hr. Grace, is in charge of the Postal Telegraph office here at present.
 The Bell Island Regatta takes place on tomorrow (Saturday) July 27th. The two plants will close down for the day.
 Dogfish made their appearance in Conception Bay this week, and a number were found in traps. A few floated in with the east wind and could be seen in the beach here.
 Mr. Geo. A. Hierdy, has who been station agent at Quarry, on the West Coast for the past nine months, arrived here on Friday last on a visit to friends.

Joint Effort to Abolish Steam Trawling
 Ottawa, July 23.—The Canadian Department of Fisheries is co-operating with Newfoundland and the United States Fisheries Authorities, in endeavoring to reach some joint agreement as to the abolition of steam trawling in Atlantic coast waters. The matter has been before the Government here for years, but the difficulty in the way of securing a joint international action has prevented any satisfactory arrangement to the present. It is admitted that the growing menace of steam trawling, in regard to destroying the gear of regular fishermen, and for the conservation of the fisheries must be abolished. Now that the three governments have signified their readiness to co-operate in checking steam trawling as far as possible satisfactory results are hoped for. The Fisheries Departments here have placed two officers on board steam trawlers now operating off the Maritime Provinces, who will report as to the conditions. Similar action has been taken by the American and Newfoundland Governments, and it is hoped joint legislation in the matter may be secured during the course of the next year.

Britain Master Of the Seas
 London, July 22.—Churchill, in introducing the supplementary naval appropriations for five millions of pounds this afternoon, said the direct cause of the increase of expenditure for the navy would be found in the new German navy law, the main feature of which was to increase in striking force, ships of all classes. The effect of the new German navy law would, he said, be that nearly four fifths of the entire German navy would be maintained in full and permanent commission, and instantly ready for war. The First Lord continued: "Such preparation is remarkable so far as I am aware, and finds no example in previous practice of modern naval powers." Churchill then announced the British shipbuilding programme of the next five years, saying that five battleships were to be constructed next year, and four in each of the following years.
