WORKMEN'S INSURANCE

Four members of the British parliament visited Germany in November, to study workmen's insurance systems in that country. A summary of their report makes very interesting reading. We quote from the London Leader:—

portions. The report gives a scale showing the weekly contributions of the workmen under this system. Up to £17 10s. a year they are three farthings, up to £27 10s. a penny farthing, and over £27 10s. a franc.

"The deputation makes many interesting comments on the advanced social machinery which is at work in Germany to counteract the extensive unemployment. While they saw 'hundreds upon hundreds of unemployed' they seemed to lack the dejection and absolute misery unfortunately met with in England.

Since 1894 a municipal insurance establishment for unemployed has existed in Cologne, which is also well subsidized by the well-to-do people of the town, and it can point to notable success. At Leipzig, an association for insurance against unemployment has been called into existence, with somewhat different regulations from those in use in Cologne.

Two speakers at the Every Day Club last evening emphasized the fact that while material progress has made great changes in the conditions of life during the past thirty or forty years there are many social and moral evils which call for a remedy.

Woodstock Board of Trade Asks St. John Aid for River Valley Railway Plan.

At the monthly meeting of the council this afternoon, the most important business to come up will be the report of the harbor facilities committee on the transfer of the Carleton Place, south of Sand Point.

One section of the committee, it is reported, is in favor of the city dealing directly with the C. P. R.

The council will also have before them a resolution of the Woodstock Board of Trade with reference to the construction of a railway from St. John to Grand Falls.

HIS BIG FORTUNE IS COMPLETELY GONE

Chicago. Man Once a Multi-Millionaire is Now Charged With Swindling—He Inherited Great Business and Failed for \$6,000,000

Chicago, Feb. 27.—W. Vernon Booth, president of A. Booth & Company, the so-called fish trust, went into the hands of a receiver last September, and E. A. Robbins, former assistant treasurer of the company, were indicted today.

Booth's fortune is estimated at more than \$6,000,000, but the assets at first supposed to be sufficient, dwindled steadily as the investigation proceeded and have been estimated as low as \$3,000,000.

Booth frequently entrusted the management of the business to his son, W. Vernon Booth, a well-known player in the country and socially prominent not only in Chicago but in the east.

A search for assets was instituted by the Master in Chancery Harvey Booth in behalf of creditor banks to which the company is alleged to owe large sums.

Senatorial testimony, however, was given by E. Robbins, who was indicted with Mr. Booth today.

The grand jury, which had finished its work, was overruled before it left the building and resumed its session long enough to correct the error.

Bonds were fixed at \$25,000 in each case, and captives were formally seized, but were not served.

The defendants will voluntarily appear in court next Monday, they have informed the state attorney.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations
A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may purchase a quarter-section available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of outstanding homesteaders. Duties: Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may file within nine miles of the homestead on a farm or at least six acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
In certain districts a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—five reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry including the time required to earn homestead patent, and cultivate fifty acres extra.
A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$20.00.

Recalls his Love Affairs

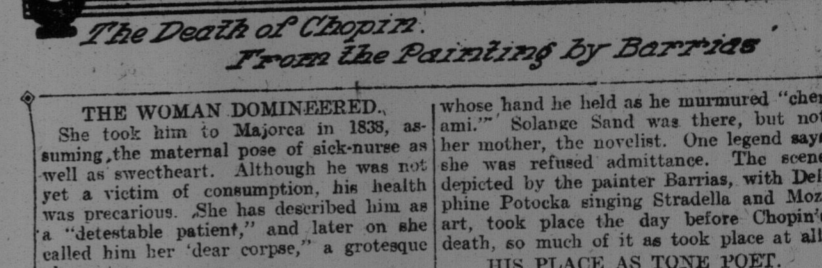
Frederic Chopin from portrait by Schick

Turgenev, the Russian novelist, coined the malicious epigram, misquoted by Huneker that "there are about a thousand ladies in Europe whose arms Chopin yielded up his spirit." Huneker makes it half a hundred countesses, which, of course leaves open the possibility of the other 850 having some other rank. This epigram and the famous love affair with George Sand have put an atmosphere of impropriety about Chopin's life, as if he had been some polygamous pasha of Asia, whose biographer had need to be a new Leporello to catalogue his conquests.

Such was the susceptible and sensitive heart of the Poet of the Piano. No passion left any abiding marks there. Yet there are three or four love stories connected with his short, sad life. His first love was Constantia Gladowka, a pupil of the Warsaw conservatory, whom he worshipped for six months without so much as exchanging a syllable with her. She was a singer, and "her love" is inscribed on one of his earliest valences. Constantia was worth a thousand ducats. But Chopin was only 21, a penniless composer, giving some concerts in Warsaw, and not known whether he ever laid his hand on the lady's feet. At any rate she married a Warsaw merchant, who became a striking figure in a Paris filled with striking figures. There was Victor Hugo, the poet of romanticism, and there was Alexander Dumas, the Chevalier Bayard. There were Lamartine and Chateaubriand and Lamennais, a new John the Baptist; there was Heine, a new Demostocles; there was Daudet, the French Jules Verne; there was Meyerbeer and Berlioz were making music; there was Schiller and Delacroix were painting; there was Victor Hugo writing history; there was a group of geniuses he met "the women with the somber eyes." Amantine Lucile Aurore Dupin had been married to M. Dudevant when Chopin was a boy of

Tonight's race, however, was run on a board track, while Shrubb raced over a specially constructed tank track.

Jones and Gustave Olsen, trustees, which said:—"As we have made arrangements for special evangelistic services, to commence the beginning of the New Year, we must have the building on the first of January, 1909."

The evangelistic services were not begun. This morning's Telegraph contains the following letter from Rev. B. Beatty:

To All Whom It May Concern:—

Allow me to make a statement through the press concerning the property known as the People's mission hall in Waterloo street in this city. In order to wind up the business affairs of the mission hall, I have disposed of the said property and will satisfy all legal debts as a business proposition. I also refund subscriptions to all bona fide subscribers who so desire and will make their application in writing within three months. The ready money, after all obligations are met, will be applied to evangelistic work to the best of my ability as the Lord may direct.

The Telegraph incorrectly says that a meeting of those interested was held on Saturday evening. Those who met were Mr. Beatty and Charles T. Jones. Mr. Olsen, E. W. Rowley (a former trustee) and others, actively interested were not notified. Mr. Beatty transferred the hall to Mr. Jones for a stated sum, and Mr. Jones holds it as a business proposition. What Mr. Olsen, Mr. Rowley and others desired was that the mission should either be resumed or the hall handed over to the Every Day Club, which would assume the small mortgage and other charges, and which is actively engaged in real mission work.

Charles T. Jones, one of the trustees, when asked about the matter today, said he had taken over the property from Rev. Mr. Beatty, but at the present time was unable to say what use it would be put to. Hon. Robt. Maxwell, he said, had made an offer of \$1,500 for the property, and

Saturday evening's Halifax Echo published the following about two passengers who were detained at Halifax:
