and the women had to smash them down before they could release the imprisoned wretches.

Of personal complaints against officials of which we have heard—of difficulties in obtaining admission experienced by the rescued, etc.—we say nothing at present, as a rigid examination will doubtless be made. This terrible lesson will not, we trust, have been learned in vain.

The building was insured for \$10,000 each in the Halifax, Phoenix, Acadia, Lancashire and Queen's offices. The Halifax had \$5,000 additional on the outbuildings which were not injured.

The rescued, who numbered over four hundred, were made as comfortable as was possible till Tuesday afternoon. On Tuesday, Messrs. M. H. Richey, M. P., M. B. Daley, M. P., Hon. A. Gayton, Chairman of the Board of Charities, and Mayor Fraser sent a joint telegram to the Minister of Public Works at Ottawa asking permission to use the old penitentiary at the North-West Arm to house the saved, and it was accorded. The men were taken there in Walker's buses that afternoon. The women and children were lodged in the Public Garden skating rink till accommodation could be provided for them in the Penitentiary.

It is not probable that any steps will be taken to rebuild the Ayton this winter.

Lord Lorne in British Columbia.
AN ADDRESS TO THE INDIANS.
The following speech was delivered by the Governor-General to nearly two thousand Indians assembled at New Westminster, B. C.

"The Queen's laughter and myself are very glad to see you. The Queen's daughter has come a long way to see you and you have come to see her. I am glad to hear from you that you appreciate the Queen's Government, and that there is equal justice between white and Indian in this country. I shall tell the Queen that you are progressing well, and that you are happy and contented. Last year on the plain, and elsewhere, I had opportunities to see many many thousands of red men, and I have nowhere heard better accounts than here. It gives me great pleasure to find how you are becoming like the white men, and work for yourselves, and that, under the advantages of the Queen's Government, you have become independent. I shall enquire with reference to the possibilities of supplying you with schools, and I shall expect you to help yourselves in providing them. I have been a little disappointed in one respect—that in hearing that you are not so proud as I should have expected. I only mention this for your own good. When you get money, instead of spending it all at once, on paddles and other foolishness, you should put it in the savings bank, as the white men do, and then you should have the use of it for a long time. I know that the agent of the Government will look after you here and anything you report to agents will be sent on to the Government and the Government will consider it for you. Now we shall say good-bye to you, wish you all well, and shake hands with you all."

Several presents were made to H. R. P. Princess Louise at the conclusion of the Marquis of Lorne's address.

Zimnoch, an old chief, presented the Princess with a pair of blankets of Indian manufacture, made from the wool of the mountain sheep, and he asked Her Royal Highness to give him a receipt. The Princess with her usual grace and gentleness, returned for a moment and wrote the desired receipt, returning and handing it to the chief, who carefully folded and pocketed the prized souvenir.

Journals which Caused Death.
Dr. D. F. Collins of Minneapolis, Minn., whose brother was scientific leader of the unfortunate Jenette expedition in the northern regions stated, on 2nd inst., as follows, to a reporter of the Tribune:

"We have evidence that Captain De Long used his official position as commander of the expedition to persecute in every conceivable way some of the members of the commission. My brother was placed under arrest for no reason whatever. This Lieutenant Daneshower admitted to me when I saw him in New York. Captain De Long refused to allow my brother at certain times to do any kind of work, and purposely allowed all notes, photographs and records of the expedition prepared by my brother to sink. We have evidence that the captain forced him to remain behind when he volunteered to go ahead with Nindemann and Xerox to search for relief, my brother being in the best condition of any member of the party to do so. We have evidence that Bartlett, in possession of full powers, but who believed he had been sent to Siberia purposely by the officers of the expedition, so that his testimony may not get before the board. We are also in possession of full information that on Melville finding the bodies of the De Long party he used most blasphemous and scandalous language concerning my brother's body. We also have reason for believing that the weather, which he alleged prevented him from going to the relief of De Long's party, was false for the dates on which he was absent, and that he had been shown to have been good." Dr. Collins further asserts that jealousy existed between certain officers of the expedition, the trouble first beginning, as he learns, over an order to the effect that all of the men should undergo a physical examination. Neither Marley, Collins nor Daneshower was permitted to assist in the treatment. Dr. Collins adds:—"We happen to know that Kusnig requested Melville to go to De Long's relief himself or send some one, and that Melville would do neither. He first gave the order to Daneshower to go and then countermanded it. Kusnig and Shagra were fifteen days in making the round trip to Bulun from the spot at which Melville's party was. Two days each way was ample time for the journey. During the trip these men got drunk, and Melville knew it. While they were gone in search of De Long, Melville and those with him made chessmen and checker boards, and amused themselves, leaving the work of searching for their companions to two ignorant and drunken natives. We have reasonable ground for believing that there was a considerable amount of intoxicants drunk during the fifteen days they waited for the return of the two natives. We know from conversations with surviving members of the expedition that certain letters and papers which we believe were on my brother's person have never been produced. We want to know what has been done with these papers."

"If Melville had gone with the natives, as he ought to have done, no doubt De Long and his party would have been saved. He would have seen the beacon fires that had been lighted on bluffs, as stated in De Long's journal which was found, even if he had started out when Kusnig and Shagra were overdue."

"We therefore make the charge that Melville did his duty instead of spending his time in playing chess and checkers. De Long and his party would not have died. Melville left them to die and it is responsible for their deaths."

Dr. Collins will print his statement in pamphlet form with documentary evidence, and lay it before Congress.
