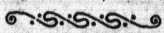

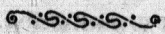

Montreal to Lachine Locks,

returning by the lower road, 22 miles.—A very enjoyable ride for a summer evening is to go by the upper road via Blue Bonnets to Lachine Locks, crossing the canal and returning by the lower or river road, following the St. Lawrence all the way home. The scenery is magnificent and the roads are very good.

Around the Two Mountains,

About 12 Miles.

Another fine evening ride, up Bleury St. past the Exhibition grounds and through the village of Cote de Neiges, returning by the Cote St. Luc road. The road is splendid all the way, and just enough grades to make the ride pleasant.

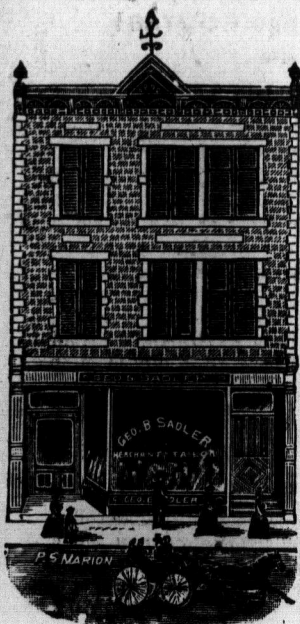

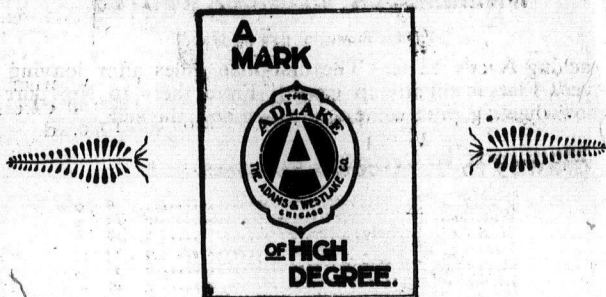

RULES OF THE ROAD.

1. In meeting riders, pedestrians, and vehicles, keep to the right. In overtaking and passing them, keep to the left.
2. In turning corners to the left, always keep to the outside of the street.
3. In turning corners to the right, keep as far out as possible without trespassing on the left side of the road.
4. Never expect pedestrians to get out of your way; find a way around them.
5. Never ride rapidly by an electric car standing to unload passengers.
6. Never coast down a hill having cross streets along the way.
7. Never ring your bell except to give notice of your approach.
8. In meeting other riders ascending a hill, where there is but one path, always yield the right of way to the upriders.
9. Bear in mind that a rider meeting an electric car carrying a strong headlight is unable to see beyond the light; keep out of his way.
10. When riding straight ahead, never vary your course suddenly to the right or left, without first assuring yourself that no other rider is close in your rear on the side toward which you turn.
11. Always ring your bell in overtaking riders and pedestrians to give warning of your approach. This does not mean that they are to get out of your way.
12. Do not ride too close to a novice, and in meeting a novice give plenty of room.

WHAT TO DO WHEN AN ACCIDENT OCCURS.

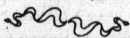
BROKEN ARM—Apply splints—any flat and strong pieces of wood will do—inside and outside the arm ; tie them firmly and place in a sling. This is for the upper arm; the same for the forearm, only bend the arm, having the thumb upward.

BROKEN LEG—Put long splints, such as the stick of an umbrella or small walking stick, or anything of the kind available, on both sides of the leg, and bandage them tightly above and below the fracture, and then tie both the limbs together.

BROKEN COLLAR BONE—Support the shoulder by a pad under the armpit, sling the arm round the body very tightly, put a broad bandage, having inside it the elbow and forearm pressed tightly against the body to keep the broken bone in place. One of the usual signs if a collar bone be broken is the inability of the sufferer to let the arm hang without great pain.

FLESH WOUNDS.—Wash and apply a wet rag or a handkerchief. If an artery is cut, the blood will come in jerks and be of a bright red color ; so apply a bandage very tightly on the side nearest the heart, and if possible on the artery when it passes over a bone near the wound.

VENEUS BLEEDING—Is slow of running and is of a dark purple color, and is stopped by bandaging with a tourniquet—a bandage with a knot in it is one, the knot being pressed on the vein or artery and tied securely.

CLOSE SEASON FOR GAME.*Province of Quebec.*

Not to be hunted, killed or taken :—Caribou, from 1st Feb'y to 1st Sept.

Deer and moose, from 1st Jan'y to 1st Oct.

N.B.—The hunting of moose, caribou or deer with dogs, or by means of snares, traps, &c., is prohibited. Except in the counties of Ottawa and Pontiac, red deer may be hunted with dogs from 20th October till the 1st of November of each year.

It is forbidden to hunt, kill or take deer or moose by "yarding" or "crusting," or to hunt, kill or take at any time fawns or the young, of less than one year's age, of moose, deer or caribou.

No person (white man or Indian) has a right, during one season's hunting, to kill or take alive—unless he has previously obtained a permit from the Commissioner of Crown Lands for that purpose—more than 2 moose, 2 caribou and 3 deer.

After the first ten days of the close season all railways and steamboat companies and public carriers are forbidden to carry the whole or any part (except the skin) of any moose, caribou or deer, without being authorized thereto by the Commissioner of Crown Lands.

Bear, prohibited from 1st July to 20th August.

Beaver, prohibited until November 1st, 1900.

Mink, otter, marten, pekan, fox or lynx, from 1st April to 1st November.

Hare, from 1st Feb'y to 1st November.

Musk rat, from 1st May to 1st Jan'y, following.

Woodcock, snipe, plover, curlew, tattler or sandpiper from 1st Feb'y to 1st September.

Partridge of any kind, from 1st Feb'y to 15th September.

Black duck, teal, wild duck of any kind, except sheldrake and gull, from 1st March to 1st September.

And at any time of the year between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise. It is also forbidden to keep exposed during such prohibited hours, lures or decoys.

Hunting by means of snares, springs, cages, &c., of partridge, woodcock, snipe, black duck, teal or any wild duck is strictly prohibited.

N.B.—Nevertheless, in that part of the Province in the east and north of the counties of Bellechasse and Montmorenci, the inhabitants, may at all seasons of the year, but only for the purpose of obtaining food, shoot any of the birds mentioned in the foregoing section.

Birds known as perchers, except the falconidæ, wild pigeons, king fishers, crows, ravens, waxwings, (recollets) shrikes, jays, magpies, sparrows and starlings, from 1st March to 1st September

To take nests or eggs of wild birds at any time of the year.

N.B.—Fine of \$2 to \$100, or imprisonment in default of payment.

No person who is not domiciled in the Province of Quebec can at any time hunt in this Province without having previously obtained a license to that effect from the Commissioner of Crown Lands. Such permit is not transferable.

FISHERY LAWS.*IT IS UNLAWFUL TO TAKE*

Salmon (Angling), from 15th August to 1st February.

Ouananiche, from 15th September to 1st December.

Speckled Trout, (*Salvelinus fontinalis*), from 1st October to 30th April.

Large Gray Trout Lunge, &c., from 15th October to 1st December.

Pickrel or Doré, from 15th April to 15th May.

Bass, from 15th April to 15th June.

Maskinonge, from 25th May to 1st July.

Whitefish, from 10th November to 1st December.

All these dates are in lusive.

Net or Seine Fishing without License is Prohibited. Nets must be raised from Saturday night until Monday morning. Nets cannot be set, or Seines used, so as to bar Channels or Bays.

Fine of \$5 to \$20, or imprisonment in default of payment.

N.B.—Angling by hand (with hook and line) is the only means allowed to be used for taking fish in the lakes and rivers under control of the Government of the Province of Quebec.

No person who is not domiciled in the Province of Quebec, can, at any time, fish in the lakes or river under the control of the Government of this Province, not actually under lease, without having previously obtained a permit to that effect from the Commissioner of Crown Lands. Such permit is only valid for the time, place and persons therein indicated.

This applies to Indians as well as white men.

Fishing by means of Nets is prohibited in the following rivers with limits extending one half mile on each side of the mouth of each: these rivers being set apart for the natural and artificial propagation of Fish.—North River, County of Argenteuil; Salmon River, County of Huntingdon; Magog and Massawippi Rivers, Counties of Stanstead and Sherbrooke.

No person shall, during such prohibited time, fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell or have in possession, any of the kinds of fish mentioned above.

Any person guilty of violating these regulations is liable to fine and costs, or in default of payment, is subject to imprisonment.

Sportsmen and others desirous of aiding in the work of enforcing the Game and Fishery Laws in the Province of Quebec, are urgently requested to send particulars of such cases of violation of the laws as may come under their notice, to the Secretary of the Fish and Game Protection Club.

WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF THE APPARENTLY DROWNED.

- 1.—Loosen the clothing, if any.
- 2.—Empty the lungs of water by laying body on its stomach, and lifting it by the middle so that the head hangs down. Jerk the body a few times.
- 3.—Pull the tongue forward, using a handkerchief, or a pin with string, if necessary.
- 4.—Imitate movements of respiration by alternately compressing and expanding the lower ribs about twenty times a minute; alternately raising and lowering the arms from the sides up above the head will stimulate the action of the lungs. Let it be done gently but persistently.
- 5.—Apply warmth and friction to the extremities.
- 6.—By holding the tongue forward, closing the nostrils and pressing the “Adam's Apple” back (so as to close entrance to stomach), direct inflation may be tried; take a deep breath and breathe it forcibly into the mouth of the patient, compress the chest to expel the air, and repeat the operation.
- 7.—When breathing begins, get patient into a warm bed, give warm drinks or spirits in teaspoonfuls, fresh air and quiet.
- 8.—Don't give up! People have been saved after *hours* of patient, vigorous effort.
