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

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Practice Court and Chambers.—One of the Common Law Judges holds a Court during each Term, called the "Practice Court," for hearing matters relating to the adding or justifying bail, discharging insolvent debtors, administering oaths, hearing and determining matters on motion, and making rules and orders in causes and business depending in either of said law courts. Chambers are held each day in Common Law and Chancery by one of the judges of the said courts, for such business relating to suits therein as may be transacted by a single judge out of court. W. B. Heward, clerk, common Law. John Black, clerk, Chancery.

Heir and Devisee Courts.—Commissioners, the Judges of the Superior Courts, and such other persons as may be appointed by commission under the Great Seal. Their duties are to determine claims to lands in Upper Canada, for which no patent has issued from the Crown in favour of the proper claimants, whether as heirs, devisees or assignees. Sittings at Toronto, first Monday in January and July in each year. W. B. Heward, clerk of Commissioners.


County Courts.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed  $\pounds 50$ ; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to  $\pounds 100$ ; and to all bail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to any amount; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel, slander, orim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These Courts also possess equity powers, to the amount of  $\pounds 50$ , subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

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

#### JUDICIARY (continued).

Surrogate Courts. - The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Upper Canada, and all matters arising out of, or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts. C. Fitzgibbon. Toronto, clerk.

Courts of Quarter Sessions .- Chairman, the County Judge in each county, who, with one or more Justices of the Peace, holds a Court of Quarter Sessions in his county four times a year for trials by jury in cases of larceny, misdemeanor and other offences.

Recorders' Courts .- In the Cities of Toronto, Hamilton, London, Kingston, and Ottawa, the Recorders' Court takes the place of the County Sessions, the Justices for Counties having no jurisdiction in the Cities—the care of which in confided to the Recorder, Mayor, Aldermen and Police Magistrate of each City. Lewis, Ottawa, Recorders. *Insolvent Debtors' Courts.*—The County Judge in each county presides. *Division Courts.*—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract amounting to £25; injuries of torts to personal chattels amounting to £10 ; but not to actions for gambling debts, liquors drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title in land, &c., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P. for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Courts of Quarter Sessions.

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

#### OFFICERS OF THE COURTS.

Clerks of Assize .- The Deputy Clerks of the Crown are ex-officio Clerks of Assize and Marshals in their respective counties.

Deputy Clerks of the Crown.-The Clerks of the County Courts will be exofficio Deputy Clerks of the Crown and Pleas of their several counties as the present incumbents vacate by death or otherwise.

Deputy Registrars and Masters in Chancery .- These officers are appointed by the Court, for each County, as occasion requires .-- (See title Master's office in Chancery.)

Clerk of the Process .- Robert Stanton, "Assistant, A. H. B. Wadsworth.

TERMS OF THE COURTS.

Appeal Terms commence on the fourth Thursday next after Hilary, Easter, and Michaelmas Terms.

Law Terms .- Hilary begins first Monday in February, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week : Easter begins 3rd Monday in May, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Trinity begins Monday next after 21st August, and ends on the Saturday of the ensuing week ; Michaelmas begins third Monday in November and ends Saturday of the ensuing week. The Court also sits every Tuesday (except during regular vacations) throughout the year, for hearing motions for Decrees, motions for or to dissolve special injunctions, and appeals from the reports, of the Master or Deputy Masters. Long vacation from the 1st July to 21st August.

Sounty Court Terms commence on the first Monday in Jan., April, July and Oct., and end the following Saturday.

Mails for Canada from England.—Two Ocean Steamers carrying mails for Liverpool in each week, viz.:—a Canadian Packet on every Thursday, via Derry on Friday, sailing to Quebec in summer, and Portland in winter, by which the Postage rate is 6d. sterling per  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz.; and a Cunard Packet every Saturday, via Cork on Sunday, bringing Mails for Canada, alternately to Boston and New York, by which the Postage rate to Canada is 8d. sterling per  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letter bears a special direction— "By Canadian Packet" or "By British Packet,"—and in that case they are kept over for the Packet designated. "By Canadian Mail" is not a distinctive superscription; for any Mail for Canada is a "Canadian Mail," by whatever Packet forwarded.

Registration of Letters.—Persons posting Letters containing value, should be careful to require them to be registered, and to obtain from the Post Master a Certificate of receipt for Registration.

One cent per oz., payable in advance by Postage stamp, is the rate on Printed Circulars (Printed Circulars, if sent in envelopes, whether sealed or unsealed, are liable to letter postage), Prices Current, Hand Bills, and other Printed Matter of a like character, and on Books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The postage upon Printed Circulars and Prices Current addressed to the United Kingdom is two cents each, which must be prepaid by postage stamps, (not in envelopes) or they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office to be returned to the senders.

The charge on Books, etc., by Book Post to England, is 7 cents on packets not exceeding 4 oz. in weight,  $12\frac{1}{2}$  cents on  $\frac{1}{4}$  lb packets, and  $12\frac{1}{2}$  cents additional for every additional  $\frac{1}{4}$  lb. These charges must be prepaid. Photographs, provided they are not upon glass, or in cases containing glass, may be forwarded to England at the Book rate of postage.

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The Book Post regulations between Canada and England apply to matter between Canada and France.

Newspapers and Periodicals.—Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by Post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates, if paid quarterly in advance by either the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the delivering post office :—

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When the above rates are not paid in advance by either publisher or subscriber, such Papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

Transient Newspapers—that is to say, Canadian Newspapers posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be prepaid 1 cent each, by postage stamp, or they cannot be forwarded—except only British Newspapers distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian Booksellers or Newsagents—such papers pass free as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mails.

#### POST OFFICE (continued).

Newspapers by Mail from England or United States—Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet Mails are charged 2 cents each on delivery. (This is the American transit charge.)

United States Newspapers, brought by mail into Canada, are charged 1 cent each on delivery.

Periodical Publications.—The rate on Periodical Publications is 1d. per 4 oz. Periodicals, printed in this Province, other than Newspapers, when specially devoted to the Education of Youth (both religious and general), to Agriculture, to Temperance, or to any branch of science, and addressed directly from the office of publication, to be transmitted to any post office in this Province, are exempt from charge.

Periodicals received in Mails from  $\leftrightarrow$  he United States are charged with the rates named in the 1st clause of this section.

Money Orders.—Money Orders payable in the Province may be obtained at any Money Order Office, at the following rates of commission:—

N.B.—No half cents to be introduced in the Orders. No single Order can be issued for more than 100 dollars.

Money Orders, payable at any Money Order Office in Great Britain and Ireland, can be obtained at any Canadian Money Order Office. The Orders are drawn in sterling, the commission chargeable being:—for  $\pounds 2$  and under, 25c.; over  $\pounds 2$  and up to  $\pounds 5$ , 50c.; over  $\pounds 5$  and up to  $\pounds 7$ , 75c.; over  $\pounds 7$  and up  $\pounds 10$ , 1 dollar. No Order can be drawn for more than  $\pounds 10$ , but any number of Orders of  $\pounds 10$  each may be procured.

Postage Stamps.—Postage Stamps are provided for sale of the respective values of 1 cent for Newspapers; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial Letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cents for Canadian Packet; and 17 cents for Cunard Packet.

Letter Envelopes are provided, impressed with medallion stamps, and equivalent to the prepayment of postage to the amount of 5 cents and 10 cents respectively.

The 5 cent envelopes will be sold to the public at the rate of 5 dollars 50 cents per hundred, or 66 cents per dozen. The price of a single envelope is 6 cents.

The 10 cent envelopes will be sold at the rate of 10 dollars 50 cents per hundred, or 1 dollar 26 cents per dozen. Single envelopes 11 cents.

Penal clauses .- The Act contains the following penal clause :-

To inclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a Parcel posted for the Parcel Post, shall be a misdemeanor.

To inclose a letter or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to inclose any other thing in a newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers, (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers,) shall be a misdemeanor.

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

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
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
