## Miscellaneous.

Rules for the care of Sheep.

The general agent of the American Sheep Company gives the following:

Keep dry under foot with clean wool necessary. Never let them feed in the same place.

15. Cut tag-locks early in spring.

16. For scours give pulverized alum in wheat bran; prevent by taking great care in changing dry for green feed.

17. If one is lame, examine the foot, clean out between the hoofs, pare the hoof if unsound, and apply tobacco with blue vitriol, boiled in a little water.

18. Shear at once any sheep commencing to shed its wool, unless the weather is too severe, and save carefully the felt of any sheep that dies.

19. Have at least one good work by you for reference. This will be money in your pocket.
