E., to Sir Charles Tupper, Minister of Railways and Canals. These, together with a pamphlet printed at the office of the Chignecto Post, give full details of Mr. Ketchum's plan for transporting vessels and their cargoes across the isthmus by rail.

His proposition, fortified by the opinions of the most scientific engineers of the day as to its entire practicability, is to build a railway having three tracks, or six rails, with road bed and rails of sufficient solidity to sustain the weight of a 1000 ton ship and cargo, from the mouth of the La Planche to the mouth of the Tidnish. Hydraulic power at each end, where docks could be formed, would lift ships and cargoes, secured on suitable trucks, from the water to the level of the railway, and they would be lowered into the water by the same means. 
