UNCLE SAM PREPARING FOR AN EMERGENCY.
NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 20.—The Register prints a story that the Government will to-day place an order with the Winchester Arms Company for 100,000 rifles of the Lee pattern, the standard small arm of the American navy. This announcement is made on the authority of a statement by a commercial agent who had it from an official of the Winchester Company. According to the agent the contract is due to the relations between the United States and Spain and a desire on the part of the American Government to be prepared for any emergency.

General Intelligence.
A TOTAL ABSTAINER.
The one characteristic of the recently appointed Archbishop of Canterbury, which has most impressed itself on some of the cable correspondents, is his advanced position on temperance. The London Correspondent of the New York Sun ventures on the observation that Dr. Temple is the first Archbishop of Canterbury who has been a total abstainer. This is a daring statement, and if exact would imply a wide knowledge of church history on the part of the person who made it. But it is a fact that though Bishop Temple drank wine during the first half of his adult life he has long been a teetotaler. So late as last week he explained his position at a temperance meeting. He is reported to have said: "I had been a hard working man for many years, and he did not find when he gave up intoxicating liquors that his health, strength, or power to labor was impaired. He could not agree with those who said that if a man took too much intoxicating liquor at all he was sure to get worse and worse. He had drunk intoxicating liquors for a good many years of his life, though few and twenty years ago he gave it up altogether. But he had never at any time felt that he could not check or control himself in the use of it. Then why did he become a total abstainer? Because when he looked into the social condition of the country, and particularly of those who were nearest to his own heart, the men who lived by the labor of their own hands and the sweat of their bodies, he felt that the best thing he could do for them was to fight the battle side by side with them against this terrible evil that was ever driving them down."

THE WHEAT FAMINE IN INDIA.
AGENTS ON THEIR WAY FROM BOMBAY TO RUSSIA TO MAKE LARGE PURCHASES.
ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 16.—The Journal of Commerce announces that agents from Bombay are on their way to Russia for the purpose of making large purchases of wheat. All of the leading newspapers in St. Petersburg have opened subscription lists for the relief of the sufferers of the famine in India. The price of wheat in all the grain markets of South Russia and the rates for the transportation of freight have advanced materially in consequence of the foreign demand for grain. Returns received by Sir Donald Smith show that the yield of the principal cereals in fifty governments of Russia is 16,500,000 quarters below the average yield during the last thirteen years. The Viedonisti prints an article upon the effects of the famine in India upon the grain trade in which it urges the government to take advantage of the famine to dispose of Russia's surplus stores of grain and to enter into negotiations with Great Britain regarding the price to be paid and the quantity to be delivered, after which large stocks could be bought and transported to Black sea ports, where they could be conveyed to India in British vessels at a low rate of freight. The writer claims that there is now a rare chance to combine charity with the promotion of the country's own interests.

JOHN L. SULLIVAN'S FLIGHT.
THE FORMER CHAMPION MAY LOSE HIS ARM—SPORTING MEN INTERESTED.
NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—The Evening World says—
"The pitiable condition which the former champion, John L. Sullivan, has moved the big-hearted sporting men of the country as they have rarely been moved before.
Sullivan is suffering from a cancer on the right hand, and, although he has had the best medical treatment in one of the Boston hospitals, the disease has become so firmly seated, and has developed so rapidly, that it is about settled that the champion can only save his life by losing his arm. This is the present conviction of the doctors who, perhaps, would have performed the amputation but for Sullivan's pleadings to spare him as long as there is a ghost of a chance of saving him from being made a cripple for life.
John L.'s unhappy condition has only been known to the sporting men of the country for a few days, and a number of them have suggested that it would be the right thing to give the game old boxer a benefit."

SIR DONALD SMITH ON THE COLONIES.
SHEFFIELD, Nov. 19.—The annual banquet of the Master Cutlers Association was held here to-night. Among the speakers was the Right Hon. Arthur J. Balfour, Government leader in the House of Commons, who spoke on commercial topics, not touching upon party politics. Sir Donald Smith, Canadian High Commissioner to Great Britain, responded to the toast "The Colonies." He cited statistics showing the development of the Colonies and predicted that their forward progress would be greater in a few years, while at the same time he said he hoped that their relations with the Mother Country would grow closer. Sir Donald also advocated the establishment of commercial relations as pronounced by the recent Intercolonial Conference at Ottawa.
The following is taken from the Montreal Star of 17th inst: "The 'stretcher' will have another stock to deal with, as the board listed yesterday The Halifax Electric Tramway Co. A few sales have been made at 65 to 70. The stock reported as being owned by the company having on the directors' board some very wealthy Montreal and Boston gentlemen, well posted in the management of such concerns. According to a statement the company has a share capital of \$600,000 with power to increase to \$1,000,000 and a bond capital of \$600,000. The surplus earnings for three months ending September were \$17,982. An estimate of the probable receipts and expenditures has been compiled as follows: Gross earnings, \$183,000; expenditures, \$65,335; leaving a profit of \$117,665, of which \$30,000 goes for interest on the bonds."
SANDWICH ISLAND RIOT IN CLEVELAND.
CLEVELAND, Nov. 23.—A riot occurred here late last night between a score of Europeans and as many Irishmen, in which many men were stabbed. Knives, clubs and bats were freely used and nearly all of the combatants were more or less injured. Two men were taken to the hospital in a dying condition, two others cannot survive their wounds and seven others are dangerously wounded. It is probable that the entire party would have been wiped out had it not been for the police. A patrol wagon packed with police officers dashed into the crowd of battling men. There was a rush to escape and nearly all who were not too severely wounded to run got away. The police found lying on the battlefield Jas. Carter, who was stabbed in the head and had his skull fractured; his father, Sylvester Carter, twenty stab wounds; Billy Maloy, twelve deep stab wounds and head supposed to be fractured; John O'Neil, stabbed in face and back; Henry Schaefer, clubbed into insensibility; William Zecker, cut in the head and injured internally. The police arrested Joseph and John Sprands, Michael Zebrek, John Koesher, Anton Ballash, Michael Zirks and John Sposter. They were locked up and charged with rioting.

ACADIA SUGAR REFINERY COMPANY.
HALIFAX, Nov. 25.—The annual report of Acadia Sugar Refinery Company has just been given out. It covers operations up to September 30th, and says that owing to the great decline in the value of sugars during the last half of the financial year and the close competition in the home market, the year's business has resulted in a net loss of \$24,790.07. A balance at the credit of profit and loss of \$51,822.45 was brought down from last year. Two dividends amounting to \$95,386.62 were paid during the year and the sum of \$68,354.24 at the debit of profits and loss is carried forward. During the first part of the financial year the business of the Company warranted the Directors in declaring an interim dividend of six per cent on the preference stock, but during the last six months, for the reasons given above, the operations of the Company entailed heavy loss. Business in Canada was interfered with by the elections in June last.
BEHRING SEA CLAIMS COMMISSION.
VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 25.—The opening of the Behring Sea Claims Commission witnessed some preliminary fencing between Mr. P. C. Peters, senior British counsel, and Mr. Don L. Dickinson, senior counsel for the United States. Mr. Chandler P. Anderson, of New York, was chosen Secretary. The rules of procedure were then taken up. Both sides agreed on all but one, and here they were diametrically opposed. Mr. Peters wanted the Canadian claims dealt with singly, but to this Mr. Dickinson strongly objected, arguing that the British sealers should put in all their claims and then the United States authorities would submit their defenses at San Francisco. Mr. Peters replied that it might not be necessary to sit at San Francisco. The point was finally settled in favor of the British contention. Sixteen British claims, with a total of \$450,000 and with interest added from the time of seizure, were filed yesterday and more will follow.

HAD HIS HEAD CUT OFF.
CEDAR RUN, Pa., Nov. 23.—While hunting pheasants on the mountain side here yesterday, Joe Champagne had his head cut off by a falling stone in a most remarkable manner. His ten-year old boy and two playmates were on the steep mountain side about fifty yards, tumbling rocks down its precipitous side in order to see them splash into the creek. A big stone started by young Champagne on its downward course struck the elder Champagne and knocked the back of his head off as clean as though it had been cut with an axe.

WRECKED.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 23.—The Southern Pacific Railway Company's steel screw collier 'San Benito', coal laden, from Tacoma to San Francisco, was driven ashore in a gale yesterday afternoon near Point Arena, Cal. The 'San Benito' carries a crew of 45, of whom five have reached the land in safety. The others are reported to be perishing in the rigging and at the mercy of the waves. Point Arena is a considerable distance from any telegraph station and details are meagre. The steamer 'Wrot' arrived yesterday afternoon and tried to assist the wrecked steamer 'San Benito', but found that she could do nothing. The watchers on shore tried to send a line over the wreck by shooting from shot-guns and rafts but without success. After the vessel parted just about midship the stern portion swung around and drifted to within 300 feet of the beach, while the forward section, in which the crew was clinging, turned broadside to the sea and then remained stationary. A huge wave washed three sailors from the mainmast, two of them sinking and the third being dragged ashore by the life saving crew more dead than alive. After dark bonfires were lighted on shore and by the glare from them it was seen that the poor seamen were still struggling to retain their hold in the rigging, continually drenched by

ANOTHER DISASTROUS SNOW-STORM.
SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 23.—Seattle and the entire north western portion of the State are just recovering from another disastrous snowstorm lasting from Friday last until one o'clock yesterday. Much of the snow continues to melt as rapidly as it is now doing it will bring destruction to the Cascades divisions of the railroads and inevitable damage to private property. A special from Mount Vernon concerning the damage by floods to the town of Hamilton, Okapi County, says—The town is a complete wreck. Water is in every house in the lower part of the town and some of the people were kept prisoners in the second stories of their residences until Sunday noon, when they were taken off in boats. The Seattle and Northern Railway tracks between Wolley and Hamilton have been destroyed.

THE 'THUNDERER' ON THE COLOMBIANS.
The Times referring to the Colonial Conference now sitting in London, expresses belief that both the Pacific cable and steamship service projects are well on the way toward realization. In noting the tendency of South Africa and Canada in the direction of free trade rather than protection, the Times says:—
"These are signs of the times deserving a careful consideration and give a reason before too hastily associating impending sympathies with the acceptance of the principles of fiscal protection."
AN EDITOR'S ESCAPE FROM CUBA.
Manuel Mesa Garrido, who as editor of La Dedicacion, a Havana newspaper, incurred the displeasure of Captain General Weyler, and was obliged to leave the island surreptitiously to avoid arrest, arrived in New York yesterday. His escape from arrest was filled with exciting incidents. He is unable to speak English, and declined to relate his experiences until after he had had an interview with President Palmer of the Cuban Junta.

STILL GRINDING OUT DIVORCES.
CHICAGO, Nov. 23.—A special from Tappan, N. Y., says:—The officers of a Tappan charitable institution have made the remarkable statement that there are over 400 deserted wives in this city and every day add to the list of deserted or divorced women who appeal for work or solicit funds with which to buy bread for themselves and help their children in a city of 25,000 inhabitants. The divorce mill in Tappan is running on steadily, every week divorces are granted to men and women, incompatibility of temper being the general charge.

IMPORTANT TO TRAVELLERS.

MR. MCGILLIVRAY'S SUIT AGAINST THE PULLMAN CAR COMPANY.

The case of James J. McGillivray vs. The Pullman Car Company was taken up this morning. This case has been before the courts for a long time, but only got down to trial today. It is being tried before a jury. The case is an important one to the public, and the outcome will be awaited with interest by those who are frequently compelled to travel. The facts of the case are perhaps still fresh in the minds of the public. Mr. McGillivray, who is the well-known tea merchant, while travelling in one of the Pullman palace cars caught a severe cold and had a severe illness occasioned he says by the fact that the car was not kept heated. He is suing for \$5,000 damages on that ground. The defence is that the car was heated, and the company, therefore, not negligent.

WEYLER'S FAILURE IN CUBA.

PUBLIC OPINION IN SPAIN AGAINST HIM—HE IS INDIFFERENT.

MADRID, Nov. 25.—Several of the leading newspapers of Madrid are very bitter in their criticisms of the return of General Weyler to Havana, and declare him to be morally ruined. All of these papers demand that Gen. Ascarague, the present Minister of War, be sent at once to Cuba to supersede Gen. Weyler.

HAVANA, Nov. 25.—The Captain General gave an interview last night to a New York Herald correspondent. "Did you change your mind about staying at San Cristobal till Christmas, or did the correspondents make a mistake," was asked. "I never said so," replied General Weyler. "I said that perhaps I would stay one day or six months. I never propose to call any correspondent of my press in advance. There are things regarding my attention at Havana at least every twenty days, and being so near I have come in this distance and shall do so whenever I see fit." Gen. Weyler would not say whether he would go east or west when he leaves Havana again. "How does Mr. McKinley suit you?" was asked. "I am absolutely indifferent as to one or the other, as it is indifferent to me if the United States accords belligerent rights to the insurgents. In that case the protocol would be annulled and I could treat American citizens like any others, which would do much to simplify matters and make filibustering expeditions fewer." General Weyler said this pleasantly and spoke again of his agreeable relations with General Lee and Mr. Williams, though the inference was that he would have been less annoyed by them if the granting of belligerent rights had removed the protocol.

THE DJUCHER TRAGEDY.

SULLIVAN COMMITTEE.

The preliminary examination into the charge against Sullivan of complicity in the Dutcher tragedy was resumed in the police court before Stipendiary Worman Wednesday afternoon. The court room was crowded.

Mr. F. A. McCully representing the crown said:—

"We were in hopes that we would be able to submit to your consideration at this enquiry that which we supposed might be the most important evidence of Maggie Dutcher. The medical attendants and the crown have consulted in the matter and are all of the opinion that in her present state of health, to subject her to the strain of an examination might possibly prevent her permanent recovery. She is rapidly recovering but is still in a very nervous and weak state and especially nervous. Any excitement from the examination might be attended with very serious effects upon her. Therefore the crown decided not to call her at this stage, and we will have no other witnesses to call."

Mr. R. Barry Smith for the prisoner consented to dispense with the reading of the depositions already made. The reading it is understood would have taken three full days.

The prisoner was then called upon to plead and he pleaded "Not guilty."

Mr. R. Barry Smith for the prisoner, said his client had the utmost confidence in the statements of the crown as to the judgment of the medical attendants, but the prisoner would like to have a most important witness—Maggie Dutcher. We would especially desire to have her evidence, and therefore suggest an adjournment for eight days. We also would like to have Dr. Chandler or some other doctor appointed to see whether in his opinion Maggie Dutcher is fit to be called, or able to give testimony. If she is able then we wish her called.

Stipendiary Worman.—Why don't you call your own client; you have him right on the spot.

Mr. R. Barry Smith said he proposed to call no other evidence. He had a right to call her irrespective of the medical attendants' opinion but he would not do so. It was therefore he wished Dr. Chandler in the prisoner's interest to see if Maggie Dutcher could be subjected to an examination.

Stipendiary Worman—I do not think the child is fit to come here.

Mr. Smith repeated his request and said surely he had a right to have her evidence.

Stipendiary Worman—You have the consent report as to the child's condition.

Mr. Smith—I know that common report is lying surprisingly to the square inch about John Sullivan. I therefore do not suppose there would be any objection to Dr. Chandler seeing her.

Stipendiary Worman—Nobody objects to Dr. Chandler; he is a very good man.
