WALTERSCOVILL SHOT HIMSELF SATURDAY.

Well Known St. John Traveller Ends His Life in Tragic Manner.

WAS VERY POPULAR.

NEW GLASGOW, Mar. 7.—Walter B. Scovill, a traveller for Frothingham & Workman, hardware merchants, Montreal, shot himself in his room in the Norfolk Hotel, New Glasgow, Saturday night. He arrived at six o'clock and after registering was shown to his room. The clerk pointed out the door and left him. A fellow boy on going to his room to ask if he was coming down to supper, saw the body stretched on the floor and there was a smell of powder in the room. The suicide still held a revolver in his right hand, having shot himself through the right temple. No reason is known for the act other than the deceased had been drinking heavily of late. His wife was notified of the occurrence and an inquest will be held Monday. His home is in Newcastle, N. B. and for years he travelled for a St. John firm.

Mr. Scovill was well known on the North Shore, being a frequent visitor in his capacity as traveller and his many friends here who will be greatly shocked by his untimely end.

PROV. SECRETARY DELIVERS BUDGET.

Endeavors to Make a Good Showing for Government But is Not Successful.

THE AUDITOR GENERAL

FREDERICTON, Mar. 3.—The most astonishing characteristic of Hon. Mr. Fleming is his amazing audacity. And he has rarely displayed this characteristic in a more striking way than he did in the delivery of his budget speech on Friday afternoon.

About half past four when in the midst of his speech he devoted quite a bit of time to standing the government's practice for passing the Auditor General and for making the Auditor General what he was pleased to describe as independent of the government or any one else. Nobody but the Auditor General, he said, can pay the accounts. There is only one door to the Auditor General's office and everything must be done regularly. There can be no over-running of the Auditor General by the government as there was in the old days.

Not six hours before the Provincial Secretary was making these statements a letter of the Auditor General himself was read in the Public Accounts Committee stating that he refused to pass a certain account on the ground that the charge was excessive. The Auditor General was present in the committee room. He was asked on whose recommendation the bill was passed. (The bill, by the way, was one rendered by a defeated Hansen candidate in Gloucester. The bill was recommended by the Provincial Secretary.)

The payment was made on an order-in-account of the government. This occurrence shows how independent the Auditor General really is under the Hansen party. But there is more to be told.

At the same meeting of the committee another account was under consideration. The vouchers and other papers in connection with it were called for. Among them was a letter from the Deputy Surveyor General to the Auditor General drawing attention to the fact that in the opinion of the former official the charges were too large. Another letter in the bundle was from the Auditor General to the Deputy Surveyor General, in reply to the former's letter, stating that the charges were "very excessive" and that there must be an over-charge somewhere. Despite these facts Mr. Fleming had the audacity to attempt to show that the Auditor General is absolutely independent of the government, that there is only one door to the Auditor General's office. Independent. The Auditor General is no more independent of the government than the clerk is independent of the manager. Whenever the ministers wish to do so they can go over the Auditor General's head and use the people's money in absolute accordance with their own sweet will.

The budget speech was not a particularly noteworthy one. It may be remembered for Mr. Fleming's astounding statements regarding the Auditor General. It may be remembered because of the fact that the Auditor General's reply to the letter of the Deputy Surveyor General was that he was not in the habit of passing an order-in-account of the government on the ground that the charges were too large.

It is great to be a lawyer and a friend of the Hansen government in the same time. It is particularly pleasant now since Hon. Mr. McLeod has laid down the dictum before the Public Accounts Committee that the government will employ whom it likes. This is done apparently even in cases which could be undertaken by the Clerk of the Peace. Up in Fredericton, it was stated in the Accounts Committee a day or so ago, Mr. W. A. Mott was brought from Campbellton to Dalhousie, the home of the Clerk of the Peace, to take a case that the latter gentleman could as well have handled. And, of course the province has to pay Mr. Mott for his services.

Why does the government wish to deprive a large number of the provincial Academics of the opportunity of reading the report of the official? In the Public Accounts Committee last week Hon. Mr. Lablanc urged that the committee recommend to the government that the debate be postponed to the other Academies paper, L'Espresso. He did not ask that the Minister be discriminated against. He moved that L'Espresso be paid \$100 for translating and publishing.

year there were over-expenditures totaling something like \$100,000. It may be remembered because of the fact that instead of being a cash, the Auditor General's report was a statement of the government's expenditure for the year.

Mr. Fleming estimates that the expenditures for 1910 will be \$1,257,083.25. This is assuredly a growing time for New Brunswick's expenditures. The total cost of the year was considerably over the estimates, and a record spending of provincial money took place. But 1910 is not good which Mr. Fleming promises to do.

Fleming has his way. And Dr. Landry and the others who declared so loudly against the \$300,000 expenditure of the old administration did not mean to say that Mr. Fleming was to rush onward.

The premier and his associates profess great friendship toward the people of the province. It is not to be wondered at that in all sections people are awaiting the coming of the elections to give them the chance to save themselves from these friends.

Speaking of friends, many New Brunswickers are finding the present ministers very good friends to them.

Last year the Attorney General and the Solicitor General were paid something more than \$5,000 by the province. They were the law officers of the government. It will be remembered that before they came into power Mr. Hansen and his friends declared that the law officers would do all the legal work of the crown if the Conservatives took office. Well, \$5,000 is a pretty tidy sum to pay two lawyers for the province. How much does the Auditor General's report show?

It shows that a large number of lawyers were employed by the government last year. Between them they were paid not less than \$15,126. 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HON. C. W. ROBINSON ON BUDGET DEBATE

Shows up Acts of Present Administration and Accuses Them of Broken Promises

DEBATE STILL ON

FREDERICTON, Mar. 7.—The budget debate was continued today by Hon. C. W. Robinson, who complained that the province had not got the best terms when the London Loan was negotiated and that instead of 102 which the provincial secretary claimed was received, the province actually got 100.

He quoted in London at 104. He contended that Mr. Fleming's loan with Mr. Tweedie's million dollar loan, when the latter got the money by tender at 90 for three per cent. bonds. He charged the government with misrepresentation of the financial position of the province at the time of the election in 1908, and claimed that under their administration the public debt and ordinary expenditure had increased faster than under the old government.

He charged the government with a double liability, and it is the opinion of some bond holders that the shareholders will be the only sufferers. Whether or not they will suffer to the full extent of their double liability, time properly kept they would show a balance of expenditure over revenue of \$100,000. He wondered what the expenditure would be if it had not had the taxes received under the old Highway Act to use, notwithstanding Mr. Fleming's assertion to the contrary. Hon. Mr. Robinson claimed that the auditor general's report had showed that items chargeable to 1908 were carried over to 1909, and thousands of dollars charged in the last year were for work done in 1908. There was a large increase in salaries and expenses of the executive. He found fault with the government's handling of the money and said the 1909 budget was not so small as usual. He blamed the government for not bringing the Highway Act into effect as it was promised. The government was still spending money in lawyers although they blamed their predecessors for doing so and they had shown over their shoulders to treat Liberals and Conservatives alike. He ridiculed the Auditor Act, which he said made no real alteration in affairs as they existed. He said the Auditor's office was costing thousands of dollars yearly no matter what the government did to the contrary.

The debate was adjourned, the speaker general having said the "good."

During the debate, Hon. Mr. Robinson said: "Not a bit of it, Dr. Bourque, of Kent, a government member, moved that the old arrangement stand as last year and on a straight party vote his motion was carried."

Naturally, it is not to be expected that the same people will subscribe to the same policy and it is only reasonable to expect that if money is to be given papers for publishing the debates there should surely be equal treatment for all. The only explanation of the stand of Dr. Bourque and the government is that possibly they like the "policy" of the Minister particularly well.

of Home Secretary will be to pass a bill to provide for an Empire naturalization.

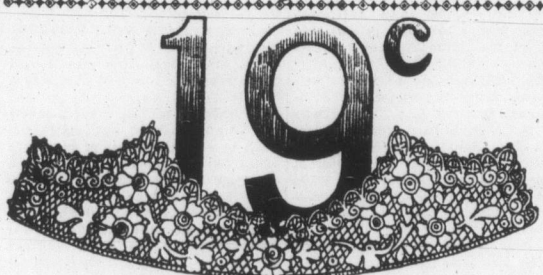
It may not be generally known that an alien who becomes naturalized in Canada is only a British subject so far as Canada is concerned. If he goes into trouble in a foreign country he finds that he has no standing as a British subject.

For instance, Sir Wm. Van Horne, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, J. Caswell Hynes and a host of other men prominent in Canada are naturalized British subjects here, but if they went to France or Germany or Russia they would find that they would have no standing as British subjects, because "British subject" does not recognize "colonial naturalization."

The subject is not a new one, "being brought forward by Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself at the Imperial Conference of 1906 but so far it has been allowed to drift.

A reform in this direction by the Imperial Parliament recognizing naturalization of aliens as British subjects with standing the whole world over should not be difficult of realization and when the pressing domestic questions have been disposed of as Westminster, there should be no difficulty in bringing it about.

Once a British subject always British subject is a good motto; but a better one would be "A British subject anywhere in the Empire, a British subject all over the world."

OUR OTTAWA LETTER

Notwithstanding the fact that the Naval Bill now before Parliament has met with obstacles and delays, so far as Ministers are concerned, yet it will undoubtedly receive a generous sanction when it reaches a vote in the Commons. A few peculiar instances can be mentioned in this connection. First the promoter of the bill, Mr. L. P. Brodeur, had no second opinion in its favor.

The Prime Minister, shortly after he had flattered the bill, also fell ill and was absent from the House for ten days. Again, unfortunately, Sir Frederick Borden, recently appointed Minister of the Interior, was absent from the House for the same reason.

The naval debate drew nearly a long. The discussion last week was uninteresting and devoid of sensation except that Mr. E. N. Lewis (Con.) W. Huron, kicked over his parties traces. He declared himself opposed to the spending of \$25,000,000 for Dreadnoughts. He opposed a plebiscite and was adverse to the government's programme for a Canadian navy. Yet during the course of his remarks, he considered that both parties were of one mind insofar as the principle embodied in the bill was concerned. It looks as if Mr. Lewis had made his speech before deciding what he really did want.

Once more has the Commons heard from Sir John Hughes regarding the Ross rifle. The Col. declared that Canadians had been freed while at Blantyre last year, to use the Lee-Enfield rifle which would be sold to them for £15. But he was gratified to know that they preferred a rifle to the Ross at \$35 and its second had justified their choice. He said that the new regulation of the National Rifle Ass. of Great Britain, requiring samples of the rifle to be used at Blantyre next year be submitted to the N. R. A. council three months before the meet, was an undue discrimination against the official arm of Canada. This new regulation, remarked Mr. Hughes was tantamount to charging the Canadian Government with fraud and no self-respecting association should tolerate such treatment of its rifle. The Ross rifle was declared the best in the world and the objections to it had been engineered by conspirators in Canada, possibly in the pay of the Small Arms Co. of England. He advised that not a single Canadian rifleman

go to Blantyre this year, unless assured that the rifle would be allowed to use the Ross rifle, the official arm of Canada. WILL HOLD MEETINGS

The Laymen's Missionary Movement is planning a series of meetings for the Maritime Provinces from April 2nd to 15th.

Secretary Sasse of the Inter-Denominational Office in Toronto, with several of the Denominational Secretaries will be in St. John March 18th, and from that time on will give their time exclusively to preparations for the meetings in this section.

They are already in correspondence with the clergy and laymen of different points, and anticipate holding meetings at the following centres: provided the laymen and clergy at these points desire the meetings:—

April 2, 4, 5—St. John; 5, 5—St. Stephen and Moncton; 6, 7—Fredericton and Chatham; 7, 8—Woodville and Campbellton; 10, 11, 12—Halifax; 12, 13—Kentville and Truro; 13, 14—Amherst and New Glasgow; 14, 15—Sydney, North Sydney and Charlottetown.

There will be a two day session at each place, opening with a supper the first night, and a conference the second day as to the scope of Work in the Community and the Individual Congregation.

It is expected that in addition to the Laymen's Secretaries there will be one or more laymen from both Montreal and Toronto, as well as representatives of the movement from St. John and Halifax, who will assist in the meetings.

It is expected that the points where meetings are not held will arrange to send delegates to the centre that is nearest them, in order to carry the enthusiasm of the meetings back to their own parish, as has been done all through Ontario and the Western Provinces.
