MARYSVILLE INCORPORATED.
 On Monday the initial step will be taken in the incorporation of the town of Marysville. Elsewhere we give a history of the locality for the last two hundred and fifty years. We congratulate our neighbors upon the new and important step which they have taken. In population they are sufficiently numerous for a town and the growing necessities of the place will make some kind of local government necessary. They are a very orderly lot of people, but even in the most orderly locality there needs to be some sort of organization. One remarkable feature of the case is that although nearly the whole town belongs to one man, the humblest ratepayer in his employ has an equal voice with him in the management of the town affairs. It is an instance of democracy in its broadest form. We anticipate something in the nature of a model town. The powers of the corporation are of course as extensive as those of any similar body, but we do not suppose they will be exercised to any very great extent. The trouble with most towns is that they are too much governed. Councils often seem to think that they must use all the powers delegated to them, when, as a matter of fact, one half their authority would be the better for not being exercised at all. Mr. Gibson is certainly to be congratulated upon the success which has crowned his career at Marysville. As we pointed out elsewhere his predecessors with equal advantage in financial backing and trade connections across the Atlantic, and with vastly superior advantages both as to the supply of the round lumber and the price of the manufactured article, failed to make a fortune out of their venture. In like manner he entered the cotton trade, not it is true after some one else had failed, but at a time when all trade, and that line especially, was in a state of extraordinary depression, and he has made a thorough success of that branch of his business. His record is a wonderful one. Probably he has himself personally transacted more business than any other man in Canada. He knows all about and manages all his own affairs. He is the least commendable thing about him is the example he sets to those around. Possessed of abundant means he gives no thought to rest, but employs his energy and his wealth in benefiting the community. Shrewd and clear-headed he does not speculate, but engages in labor employing industries. If he makes large sums it is because he pays out large sums for material and wages. In his life he is simple and straightforward—in every sense of the word a good citizen and a good neighbor. We wish success to the town of Marysville, and long life and added prosperity to its founder.

ELECTION RUMORS.
 It seems to be conceded that the date of the Dominion elections has been fixed for an early day in February. If this is the case a great mistake has been made. It is a scandalous thing to bring on an election in the depth of winter. January would have been bad enough, but it would be better than February, when the snow is deepest and a storm may keep half the people in a constituency from the polls. We speak particularly now from a New Brunswick standpoint, although what we say must be true of parts of all the other provinces. But this makes no difference to the party now in power. With them the convenience of the people counts for nothing. All the government thinks about is to fix on a date which will be most likely to be favorable to their own interests. We admit that the house of commons ought to be dissolved before another session in a strictly constitutional sense, but we claim that it should have been dissolved long ago. We shall welcome the contest when it comes. The sooner the battle, the sooner the victory. But we at the same time feel in duty bound to protest to the delay over months in every way suited for an election contest and the prejudi-

DOMINION ELECTIONS.
 Thursday, February 10th,
 Said to be Fixed for
 Polling Day.

Sir Charles to Enter the Cabinet, and to be Actual Leader After Elections.

 OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—The government organs this morning contain no announcement pertaining to the dissolution of the Dominion parliament, neither do they contain any denials. In conservative circles it is stated the nominations will be on Thursday, February the third, and polling on Thursday the tenth. Tupper is certainly retarding to enter the cabinet and in all probability will be the actual leader after the elections though Sir John may retain the nominal leadership. A number of the ministerial organs admit that the announcement of dissolution is only a question of a few hours.

A substance resembling celluloid may be made from potatoes by peeling them, and, after soaking in water, impregnating with eight parts of sulphuric acid, then drying and pressing between sheets of blotting paper. In France pipes are made of the substance scarcely distinguishable from urethaneum. By subjecting the mass to great pressure a substance can be made of it rivaling ivory in hardness.
 Italy is becoming a land of monuments. One has been erected to Victor Emmanuel at Turin, costing \$200,000, all of which was paid by King Humbert. Another is going up on the Janiculum in Rome to Garibaldi, to cost as much. Milan, Naples, Genoa, Palermo and Bologna are putting up monuments to Victor Emmanuel, costing from \$50,000 to \$100,000 each, and Genoa is spending \$30,000 on one to Mazzini.

The Prussian army has a watch dog battalion which is carefully trained for service. These canine soldiers are intended primarily to convey intelligence from the advance posts to the main army, and are taught to trot to and fro with small portfolios of despatches around their neck. A part of their duty is to warn the outposts of the approach of enemies during the night, and they are also trained to hunt up the wounded. Two dogs are attached to each company of chasseurs.
 That Gen. Logan died a poor man after a long service in Congress has led by Sir John's contractors and jobbers. New York Herald to examine the records of the venality of Congressmen. He finds that it is very rare for a member of the Senate or House to be even under suspicion of corruption and those who are are compelled to live almost by themselves. There are, of course, many men in public life at Washington who were possessed of large fortunes before they accepted office, but the number of those who have made money out of position at the National Capital is very small.

HONORS TO A CANADIAN.
 Captain Prevost's Appointment to a Commission in the French Army confirmed.
 The appointment of Captain Prevost, late of the 65th battalion, to a commission in the French Army, has been confirmed by a cablegram received by Mr. Larocque. It appears that by special favor, upon recommendation of General Boulanger, minister of war, Captain Prevost has been gazetted. The pleasant news was conveyed to the gallant captain on New Year's day, with a very flattering letter in which the president of France speaks in very high terms of the affection of French Canadians to the old "mère patrie." Captain Prevost had been kind enough to solicit such a favor from General Boulanger, in August last. The brave captain expects to go to Tonquin, where, no doubt, he will cover himself with glory. His many friends in Canada will follow his career with interest.—Montreal Star.

The Total Eclipse of 1887.
 Rochester, N. Y., Dec. 28.
 The year 1887 has been a store for astronomers a total eclipse of the sun, which can be observed from convenient stations in Europe. This eclipse occurred on the 18th of August and the line of totality passes through Berlin, and a little to the north of Moscow. The event will give astronomers an excellent opportunity to pursue their studies of the sun's surroundings. Our government ought to make immediate preparations to send a large and well equipped party to observe this eclipse. We believe excellent results might be obtained in determining the extent of the sun's surroundings by the use of rapid photograph lenses of wide angle, in ordinary cameras. A lens of six inches focus would produce a very small image of the sun, but would include a wide field of the heavens, and with very rapid plates, the faint illumination about the sun might be photographed.
